

# MOYER UPSETS KID PARET

## Portlander Is Offered Title Fight

New York—UPI—Handsome young Denny Moyer of Portland, Ore., gets a shot at the welterweight crown next year, if he can still make the weight, because of his upset non-title victory over champion Benny (Kid) Paret at Madison Square Garden Tuesday night.

Harry Markson, Garden managing director, said today, "Moyer can meet the winner of the Paret-Federico Thompson title fight, scheduled for the Garden Oct. 15, if he wants to."

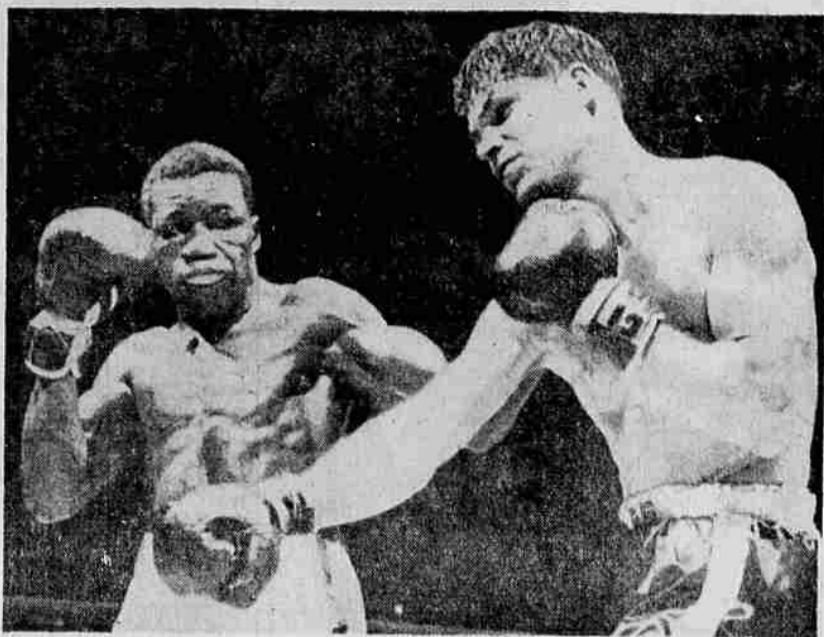
It would be 21-year-old Moyer's second shot at the 147-pound crown. He tried to win it from Don Jordan on July 10, 1959, but lost the decision.

Tuesday night bronze-haired Denny won a split verdict over champion Paret of Cuba before an estimated 4,000 in the non-televised 10-rounder. Moyer was aided by a seventh-round foul. Paret was penalized that session, his best, for two low blows.

Paret's title was not at stake because each scaled over the welterweight: Moyer, 152½ pounds; Paret, 151.

Before the fight, Moyer said it would be his last appearance as a welterweight because he no longer could pare down to 147 pounds. But after his unexpected victory, he and Manager Sid Flaherty agreed he would try to make the limit if he could get a title shot.

Paret, favored at 3½ to 1, said: "The round taken from me cost me the fight. But Moyer is very good and very hard to fight because he ties you at close quarters. I'll be glad to give him a title shot after I beat Thompson."

## Stagg Receives NFF Award At Special Banquet

Stockton, Calif.—UPI—Amos Alonzo Stagg was presented the National Football Foundation's Gold Medal Award Tuesday night at a special banquet in honor of his 98th birthday.

In presenting the rarely given medal, Chester J. La Roche, president of the foundation, called Stagg "the one man who is the very personification of football."

La Roche continued "Amos Alonzo Stagg has done more than any other living man to establish the features, transitions and character-building of football."

Telegrams were read at the ceremony from President Eisenhower and Gen. Douglas MacArthur, the only others ever to receive the foundation's medal.

Stagg was a choice on Walter Camp's first All-America football team and has spent more than 60 years coaching.

## Al Committee Meets To Talk Expansion Move

Boston—UPI—The American league executive committee holds a "preliminary and exploratory" meeting on expansion in New York Aug. 30, it was announced here by President Joe Cronin.

"It is most unlikely that any definite expansion moves can be determined and announced at that time," Cronin said.

He might have been referring to conflict within the league's high command. Dan Topping, co-owner of the New York Yankees, is threatening to block the addition of a National league team in New York unless the American league gets into Los Angeles.

At a Chicago meeting of American and National league representatives it was understood that each league would establish two new teams, moving into four franchises of the stillborn Continental league.

The National league would set up teams in New York and Toronto, Ont., and the American league would move into Houston and Minneapolis-St. Paul. This does not meet the Topping test because New York would be invaded by the senior circuit but the American league would not get a crack at Los Angeles.

In any case, Cronin said, the Aug. 20 meeting would hear a report from its realignment committee.

## Duck Hunting Date To Be Set After Hearing

Portland—UPI—The State Game commission will hold a public hearing Friday after which it will pick dates for the 1960-61 waterfowl hunting season.

The interior department today announced the framework of 1960-61 waterfowl hunting dates for the entire nation. Oregon and Washington game departments will be able to pick their 90-day duck hunting season between the dates of Friday, Oct. 7, and Sunday, Jan. 8.

The duck hunting season will be shortened from the 94 days allowed last year but the half hour before sunrise shooting, taken from hunters last year, was restored for ducks except on opening day when shooting starts at noon.

Bag and possession limit in the 1960-61 federal regulations is four ducks a day and eight in possession. It was five per day and 10 in possession last year. States could take an option of five ducks daily bag and possession.

Redheads and canvasbacks were put on the completely protected list in all flyways this year.

The season on geese will be 94 days with a bag and possession limits remaining six geese but not more than three of the dark species.
