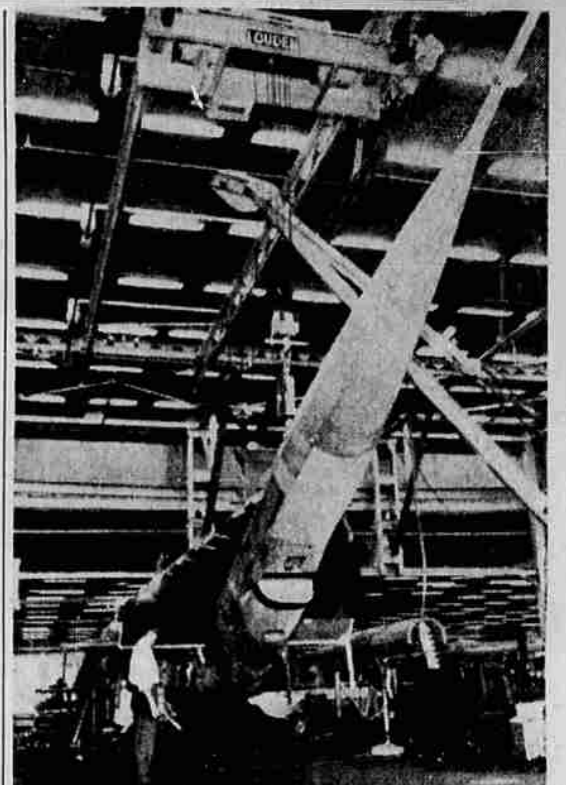

Benson Visions Farm Program Gaining Support

Washington — (UPI) — Agriculture Secretary Ezra T. Benson returned from abroad today insisting that his farm program, which Vice President Richard M. Nixon has disavowed, will gain support from American voters "as time passes."

Asked if he thought this support would grow between now and the November presidential elections, Benson said, "Yes, I do."

Benson made his prediction upon returning from a 17-day overseas trip.

No Definite Plans

Asked if he would campaign for Nixon, the GOP presidential candidate, Benson said he had "no definite plans."

He was asked if he expected the Republican ticket to win support in farm areas.

"I can't help but feel that the farm program which President Eisenhower and his administration have advocated will gain support as time passes," Benson said. "It's economically sound and fair. It has been developed on the basis of seeking sound economic answers to economic problems. That is what the farmers expect and that's what we should do."

Sees Wheat Attention

The secretary said he "can't believe they'll go home without giving attention to wheat."

Benson was not asked, and volunteered no comment, on Nixon's departure from the Eisenhower-Benson farm policy in favor of a new stand on agricultural problems.

The secretary flew back to Washington with his wife and daughter, Beth, 16, aboard an Air Force plane which had carried them to Belgium, West Germany, The Netherlands, France, Egypt, Jordan and Israel.

Hood River To Get District Judge

Salem — (UPI) — Hood River county is going to get a district judge, Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. said Wednesday.

The county is to elect a district judge because its population is now over 13,000, he explained.

The position of justice of the peace in Hood River, even though it was on the primary ballot will not be up for election in November.

Term of the incumbent justice of the peace, George E. Johnson, will end the day preceding the first Monday in January.

Appling said that final day for candidates to file for the position is Aug. 29.

Gnat Creek Hatchery Will Open Saturday

Portland — (UPI) — The Gnat Creek fish hatchery is slated for official opening Saturday.

State Game Director Phil Schneider said the plant will produce steelhead in behalf of important fishery resources of the Columbia river.

Regional Building Lag Noted in July

Oregon's dwelling construction for last month was seven per cent over that of July, 1959, according to figures just released by the statistical department of Equitable Savings and Loan association.

Total for Medford for last month fell 91 per cent over July 1959, because of the permit issued last year for construction of the Rogue Valley market. Last month's total building in Medford was \$465,439, compared with \$5,227,557 for the same period last year. Dwelling construction totaled \$104,500 in July, 1960, compared with \$220,500 in July the year before, a drop of 53 per cent.

Pacific northwest building lags, according to the department, with construction in the area's 64 key cities having dropped by 40 per cent for dollar volume and 12 per cent in permits in July.

Building in Salem was up 134 per cent over July, 1959, with a total dollar volume of \$1,063,127. Portland reported \$4,711,610 compared with \$4,707,510 in July of last year. Equitable reported that building activity across the nation is also slow, though not as slow as figures indicate. Last year was the biggest construction year the Pacific northwest has had in a decade.

Group Organized To Push Nixon

Portland — Announcement has been made of the formation of the State of Oregon Activities Committee for the Volunteers for Nixon, a non-partisan organization dedicated to the election of Richard M. Nixon as President of the United States. Mrs. Cleo Jensen was elected chairman.

"The Volunteers for Nixon is an independent organization of people who, regardless of political affiliation, look to Vice President Nixon as the best qualified man in the United States today to ably discharge the complex duties of the Presidency," Mrs. Jensen said.

Mrs. Jensen added that the organization welcomes the membership of "Republicans, Democrats, and independent voters who recognize the compelling demand for a man of Mr. Nixon's experience, ability, and great integrity in the White House."

Other committee members include Mrs. Jehu Clifton, co-chairman; Mrs. James G. Kirkman, assistant to co-chairman; Mrs. L. L. Riggs, headquarters liaison; Mrs. Gordon Burlingham, membership, and Warren Porter, public relations.
