

Gongola Hit Gives Bevos Second Win

Fifth place Sacramento put all its eggs into two baskets Thursday night and bombed league-leading Spokane, 8-3, in Pacific Coast league play.

Solon starter Bud Watkins was credited with four strike outs in notching his fourth season win against two defeats. At the same time however, Seattle carried its scoring eggs in two baskets also and hatched a victory over second-place Tacoma, 4-2. Last place Portland shelved San Diego, 3-2, and Salt Lake feathered a 6-3 win against Vancouver. Sacramento's five big runs came in the eighth with the score tied, 3-3. The first trio of tallies occurred in the fifth. The victory markers came on four singles and a double. Both Spokane and Sacramento have now won 11 games against each other this season.

Portland waited until the ninth inning before Pete Gongola decided to win the game with a bases-loaded single. It was the second night in a row Gongola had won the Beaver game. Wednesday he smashed a two-run homer for the victory. Reliever Bill Kennedy, working the ninth frame, took the win, his second against four losses.

The Beavers had trailed, 2-1, in the eighth when a double and single knotted the count setting the stage for Gongola's heroic antics.

Salt Lake City didn't deserve to win their contest but Vancouver apparently owed them a present. The Bees scored four unearned runs in the eighth inning to notch their 16th victory over the Mounties.

Aussies Are U.S. Foes At Newport

Newport, R.I.—UPI—Earl Buchholz of St. Louis and Ron Holmberg of Brooklyn, N.Y., last surviving Americans in singles play at the 79th Newport Invitation tennis tournament, took on two Australians in quarterfinal matches today.

Buchholz sought a semi-final spot against Bob Hewitt who started the tournament at Newport Casino unseeded but promptly knocked eight-seeded Donald Dell of Bethesda, Md., out of the running. Holmberg, second seeded, met fifth-ranked Bob Mark.

The winners of the two matches will meet each other Saturday while ranked Rod Laver, bidding for a fourth consecutive grass court title, takes on England's Bobby Wilson in the other semi-final round.

Laver, who has made it clear he won't be easy to stop, eliminated Whitney Reed of Alameda, Calif., Thursday, 6-3, 6-4, 6-3.

Wilson, Britain's top player, was down two sets to one in his match with U.S. Davis Cupper Chuck McKinley of St. Louis but rallied from behind to win, 6-4, 4-6, 10-12, 6-3, 6-3.

Corvallis—UPI—Oregon State's grid staff got a worry earlier this summer when it was learned that first-string tackle Mike Kline had suffered a bad ankle injury while working in the woods. It turned out to be something far less serious than had first been imagined, however, and Kline says he'll be fit as a fiddle when practice sessions start here on Sept. 1.
