**Wall Streeters See Trend for Stock Market To Move Upward**

New York - (UPI) - Despite the current hesitancy in the business and economic background the consensus on Wall Street is for the stock market to move out of its doldrums and trend upward.

The experts are divided as to when this breakthrough will occur, but they agree that it will happen as soon as domestic business activities perk up.

The market currently is undergoing one of its best recoveries of the year, but a sharp pickup in volume has been lacking, giving the movement the tag of another "technical adjustment" following the July dip.

The Fitch survey sees the list continuing in a stabilizing area the next several weeks, consolidating its position, and less apt to break out sharply one way or the other.

However, the publication notes that while the market is marking time, special situations either in trade groups, illustrated in the more active demand for oils, coppers and steels, or individual issues favored by improved corporate earnings reports on those which have attracted a speculative following, will continue to outperform the averages.

**Other Hopeful Signs**  
Other Wall Streeters say the market will receive some stimulation from a more than seasonal gain in steel activity, a seasonal upturn in auto output, a slight rise in residential volume and a small increase in building and construction activity generally.

The International Statistical bureau sees the list also getting a lift from increased government spending, while the Investors Advisory Institute looks for the Federal Reserve's switching from a policy of neutrality to one of more active credit-ease to fuel a rise in stock prices.

the Dow Jones Industrial Average, from breaking below its resistance level around 600, also should have a salutary influence on investor confidence.

**Disturbing Symptoms**  
Meanwhile, Fitch also points out that there are factors in the business and economic outlook that still are disturbing and could act as a brake on the stock market's anticipated better progress in the fall, unless corrected.

Among these, Fitch mentions lagging steel production, currently around 55 per cent of capacity, and its concomitant creeping unemployment in the industry.

"While this may be overcome shortly as business revives, it has served to spread a pessimistic approach among lower income groups as far as consumer buying is concerned," Fitch stated.

This, it adds, is a second factor which may react unfavorably over the balance of the year and in turn carry overtones into the stock market.

There presently appears to be a sharp cutback of anticipated consumer purchases of durable goods, with the exception of new cars. Consumer spending sagged a bit in July to a three month low.

But the few weak spots in the business and economic pictures are expected to be more than offset by a stronger revival in many important fields of activity over the balance of the year.

**Small Worlds Around Us**

**Body Fluids of Insects are Green**  
The blood of insects is not red, and they certainly are not "blue-bloods." Their blood or body fluids are green or yellowish green in color.

If you think about it you will understand why the creature's body fluids are green instead of red. It's the same coloring material that causes a living plant to be green. This coloring dye is taken into the insect's body as part of its food, for it is fed on green leaves and Nature placed a great amount of that green material in the leaves and stems of the plant; chlorophyll, we call it.

**Lavish Use of Green**  
Nature is pretty lavish in her use of the color green. It is the predominant color of the outdoors, and all plants that grow in the sunlight have it. In the living, growing plant, chlorophyll is associated with the production of carbohydrates. Even with those plants receiving their full share of sunlight, the upper side of each leaf is greenest. The lower, or under surface, receives a little less light, and is therefore somewhat less green.

Chlorophyll, in spite of its general use today for purposes other than coloring a leaf green, is not completely understood. We say it is a glandular pigment, contained in living leaf cells, and brought out by the sun. The leaves of a plant growing in the dark contain very little chlorophyll. Mushrooms and many members of the fungi family contain practically none.

The manufacture of this green coloring material by plants is a complicated process involving the digestion of plant-food, and dependent on many different actions and forces, such as moisture, temperature, amount of light, soil conditions and climate in general. Carbon dioxide absorbed from the air through the pores of the leaves combines with starch and sugar, as well as water from the roots, to furnish nourishment for the plant. Each leaf on a tree is really a tiny factory in itself, working and contributing its tiny bit to the welfare of the entire plant.

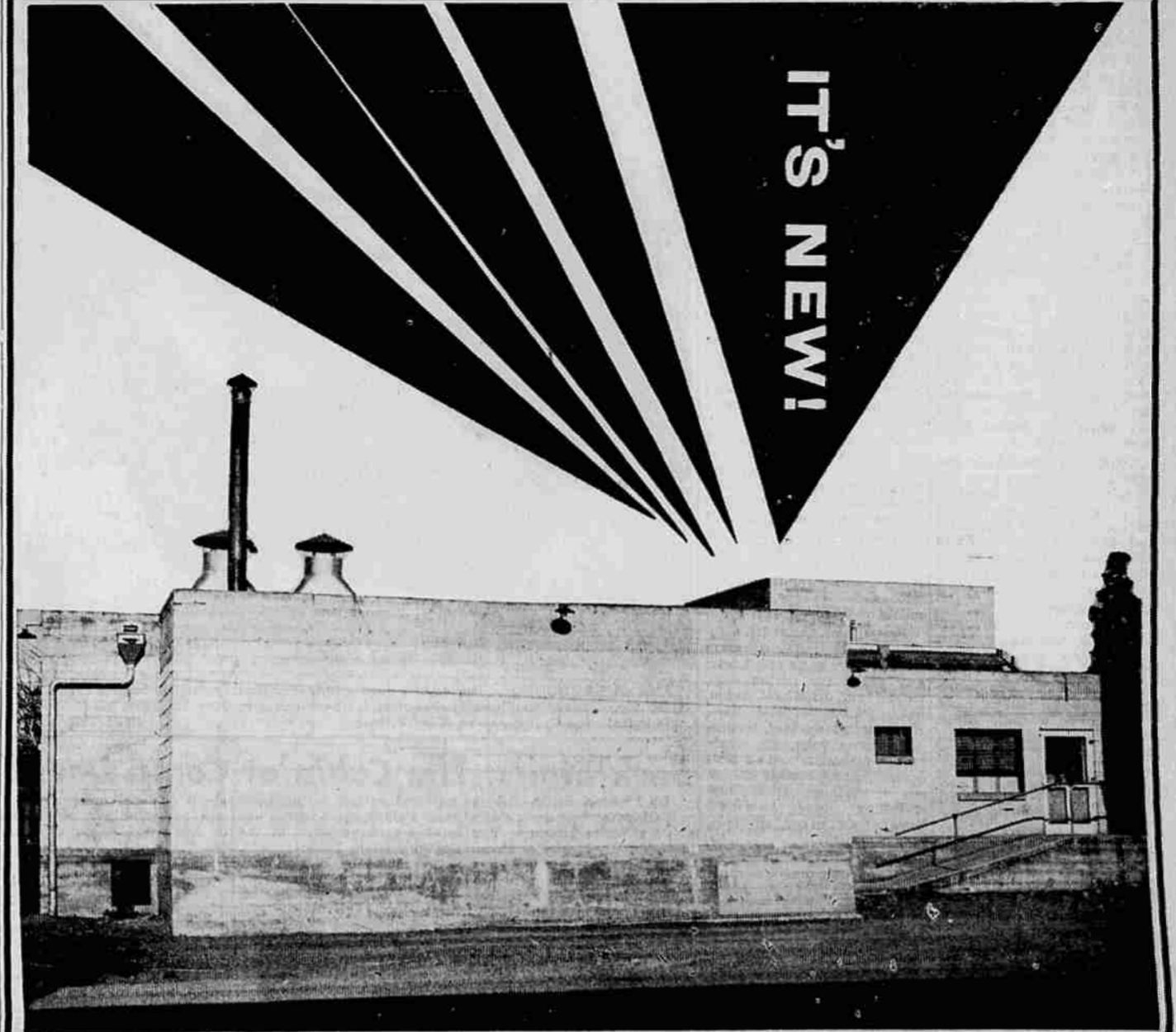
**Board of Health Gives Go-Ahead On Higher Budget**
