

Otis Davis Barely Misses World Record at Swiss Track Warm-Up

Slow Track Makes Most Runs Poor

Bern, Switzerland—(UPI)—Otis Davis of Los Angeles missed the world record for the 400-meter run by just four-tenths of a second last night as the U.S. Olympic track and field team warmed up for the beginning of the Rome games next week in an international two-day meet here.

Davis brought a crowd of more than 15,000 fans in Neufeld stadium to its feet when he covered the distance in 45.6 seconds, the year's second best time for the 400-meter run. Lou Jones holds the mark for the event.

Jack Yerman of Woodland, Calif., won the other 400-meter event with a clocking of 46.5.

Glenn Davis of Columbus, Ohio, won the 200-meter hurdles in a sparkling 22.5 seconds, missing the world record in the event by only six-tenths of a second. Teammate Dick Howard of Albuquerque, N.M., was second in 22.8. Edmond Roudniska of France was third and Italy's Sar Franco was fourth.

Athletes from nine nations competed in the meet which got underway under cloudy skies and a temperature of 55. The running track was slow as a result of recent rain, so both Davis' times were considered rather extraordinary in view of the fact that other members of the team fared rather poorly.

Ray Norton of the Santa Clara club, won his series in the 100-meter event, as expected, but he was timed in a slow 10.4 seconds, well off his own best time of 10.1. Dave Sime of Durham, N.C., who had done so well during the American Olympic team's training period, took the second series in 1.5. Paul Winder of Pleasantville, N.J., was second, also in 10.5, while Polish sprint ace Marian Folk was third in 10.6.

World record holder Harold Connolly of Santa Monica, Calif., who was the most critical of a number of American athletes of the decision to come here—branding the trip a "silly sightseeing tour"—beat Poland's Tadeusz Rut by a little under 10 inches in the hammer throw. The American Olympic favorite, who set a world record of 230 feet, 9 inches two weeks ago at Walnut, Calif., was first tonight with a throw of 215, 10 1/4 inches.

Al Hall of Southington, Conn., was third with a throw of 205 feet, 6 1/2 inches, while Ed Bagdonas of Templeton, Mass., was fourth with

a throw of 196 feet, 8 3/4 inches.

Max Truex of Warsaw, Ind., the United States' sole representative in the 10,000-meter run at Rome, took the event easily, finishing more than a full minute ahead of Germany's Karl Heinz Paetz. Truex was timed in 29 minutes, 35.8 seconds.

John Thomas of Boston university, the world record holder in the high jump, failed to make seven feet in a listless effort. He cleared the bar at 6 feet, 9 1/4 inches to win the event, falling far short of his record of 7 feet,

3 3/4 inches. Young Joe Faust of Los Angeles was second with a leap of 6 feet, 7 1/4 inches.

Phil Coleman of Champaign, Ill., finished fourth in the 1,500-meter run won by Austria's Joseph Cegledi, who was clocked in a slow 3:46.8. Coloman's time was 3:47.6.

The American relay team of Hayes Jones, Paul Winter, Stone Johnson and Ray Norton took the four by 100 meter spring in the excellent time of 40.2 seconds, almost one and half seconds before an Austrian-Polish combination clocked in 41.6.

Al Oerter of West Babylon, N.Y., won the discus throw event over rival Rink Baka of Manhattan Beach, Calif., who had tied the world record of Poland's Piatkowski with a throw of 196 feet, 6 1/2 inches, two weeks ago.

Oerter's best effort was measured at 190 feet, 8 3/4 inches, while Baka reached 182 feet, 6 1/2 inches. Third was Dick Cochran of Brooksfield, Mo., with 178 feet, 5 1/2 inches.

Ira Davis of Philadelphia won the hop, step and jump with a best effort of 52 feet, 4 inches.

Oakland Is 3rd Victim Of Chargers

San Francisco — (UPI) — The Los Angeles Chargers today looked like the team to beat in the new American Football league.

They overcame fog, bad breaks and a stubborn Oakland Raider outfit Friday night to win a see-saw 24-17 exhibition contest. It was their third pre-season win without a setback.

A crowd of 6,521 sat in on the contest. The low total was understandable since the weather was cold and windy and the fog so thick that it was impossible to see across the field.

The Charger offense was carried by Paul Lowe, pencil slim back from Oregon State, and Howie Ferguson, who starred for many years for Green Bay in the National Football League.

Lowe took a 43-yard pass from quarterback Jack Kemp to score the Chargers' first touchdown. Ferguson bulled over for two touchdowns in the third quarter to overcome a 17-10 Oakland halftime lead.

Lowe picked up 77 yards on 13 tries, while Kemp was again effective as he clicked on 15 of 25 fog-shrouded passes for 233 yards.

Oakland relied mostly on the passing arm of Tommy Flores, who is expected to wage a battle with veteran Babe Parilli for the first string quarterback berth.

Flores hit on 16 of 39 tosses for 188 yards. He passed 4 yards to Brad Myers for one score and 6 yards to Billy Lott for another.

Each team also had a field goal as Henry Wallace booted one from the 15 for Los Angeles and Oakland's Larry Barnes scored one from the 29.

Yankees Beat Senators 9-5; White Sox Blank Athletics

Bill Skowron's 23rd homer with Mickey Mantle aboard highlighted a four-run rally in the 11th inning and gave the New York Yankees a 9-5 victory over the Washington Senators Saturday in a wild game marked by dramatic ninth-inning rallies by both sides.

Pedro Ramos had a 2-0 victory in his grasp when he retired the first two men in the ninth. The Yanks went on to score five unearned runs, thanks to two errors by Jose Valdivielso, Washington shortstop. Cletis Boyer put the finishing touches on the rally with a two-run homer, his 10th.

The Senators, in their turn, rallied for three runs, climaxed by Pete Whisenant's two-run pinch homer off Bobby Shantz which tied the score.

Mantle Doubles
Mantle doubled off Chuck Stobbs to open the 11th. Skowron, hitless all day, homered into the left-field seats. The Yankees then went on to score two more insurance runs. It was Skowron's grounds in the ninth which was bootied by Valdivielso for the latter's first error and which cost Washington the game.

Bob Turley pitched the first seven innings for the Yanks and struck out 11, a season's high for a Yankee pitcher this year. However, Turley gave up homers to Earl Battey, his 11th, and Bill Gardner, his eighth.

Eli Grba, who took over after Shantz yielded Whisenant's homer in the ninth, got the victory. Stobbs was the loser.

Southpaw Herb Score handed the Kansas City Athletics their 10th straight defeat when he pitched the Chicago White Sox to a two-hit 3-0 victory.

Larsen Retires 14
Loser Don Larsen, who retired the first 14 batters to face him, held the White Sox scoreless until the eighth

when they put together a single by Jim Landis, a sacrifice and single by Luis Aparicio for their first run. Al Smith hit a two-run homer off reliever Ken Johnson in the ninth to clinch Score's fourth victory.

Home runs by Harry Chitt and Norm Cash carried the Detroit Tigers to a 4-2 win over the Cleveland Indians. Bob Bruce, the winner, stopped the Indians on five hits and innings but yielded to Hank Aguirre in the ninth after Tito Francona led off with a homer. Barry Latman was the loser.

Ted Williams smashed a pair of three-run homers to pace the Boston Red Sox to an 8-6 victory over the Baltimore Orioles in the opener of a day-night doubleheader. The homers were Ted's 514 and 515 of his career and brought his season total to 23. Both

homers came off loser Chuck Estrada. Bill Monbouquette was the winner. Ron Hansen hit a three-run homer for the Orioles.

Skinny Brown scattered eight hits to pitch the Red Sox to a 6-0 victory over the Red Sox in the nightcap. The split left the Orioles 2 1/2 games behind the pace-setting Yankees.

Brown, pitching his first complete game of the season, allowed only one Boston runner to get as far as second. The victory was his ninth. Marv Breeding hit doubles in the third and fifth innings and scored each time. The Orioles got to loser Earl Wilson for three more runs in the seventh.

Roy Face, last of the three Pirate hurlers, picked up the victory after starter Tom Cheney failed to go the necessary five innings.

Ten batters went to the plate in the second inning as the Pirates picked up six runs while sending 20-year-old Jim Maloney to the showers. All but one of the six runs came after two were out. Bob Skinner's double, which drove home the final two, was the only extra base hit of the inning.

Don Hoak's 11th homer of the season accounted for one of two Pirate runs in the fifth inning during which Joe Nuxhall was replaced by Claude Osteen.

Coleman Homers
Cheney held the Reds scoreless until rookie Gordon Coleman unloaded a three-run homer in the fourth inning. He departed in the fifth as the Reds added three more runs, two of them coming on a homer by Gus Bell.

The Reds bunched three singles for their final run in the seventh. Face replaced Clem Labine and shut out the Reds the remainder of the game while yielding only one hit.

George Altman drove in five runs with a double and a homer to lead the Chicago Cubs to a 9-5 victory over the San Francisco Giants. The loss ended a four-game Giant winning streak.

Altman doubled in two runs off loser Sam Jones in the third inning and belted a three-run homer off reliever Stu Miller to climax a five-run rally in the fourth inning. Seth Morehead, working in relief of Moe Drabowsky, received credit for the victory.

Orlando Cepeda and Ed Bresnold hit homers for the Giants.

Gil Hodges doubled home two runs in the ninth inning to give the Los Angeles Dodgers a 2-1 victory over the St. Louis Cardinals.

Loser Curt Simmons was staked to a 1-0 lead when
