

Doctors Schedule Postgraduate Session Tuesday

A postgraduate session for medical doctors will be held at the Rogue Valley Country club, Tuesday. Topic for the session will be "alcohol addiction and alcoholism" and "Recent trends in pediatric drugs."

According to Dr. Malcolm Byers, president of the Jackson County Chapter of the Academy of General Practice more than 50 medical doctors from southern Oregon will attend.

The program will begin at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday with registration. First speaker will be Dr. John R. Montague, clinical associate in medicine at the University of Oregon School of Medicine. He is also the medical director of the Raleigh Hills hospital in Portland.

He will discuss "Diagnosis, Treatment, and Management

of Alcohol Addiction, and Alcoholism" at 2 p.m. Second speaker will be Dr.

Three tugboats tried to move the barge but were unable to shake it loose. A helicopter was being used to transport workmen to the barge, which is inaccessible from land.

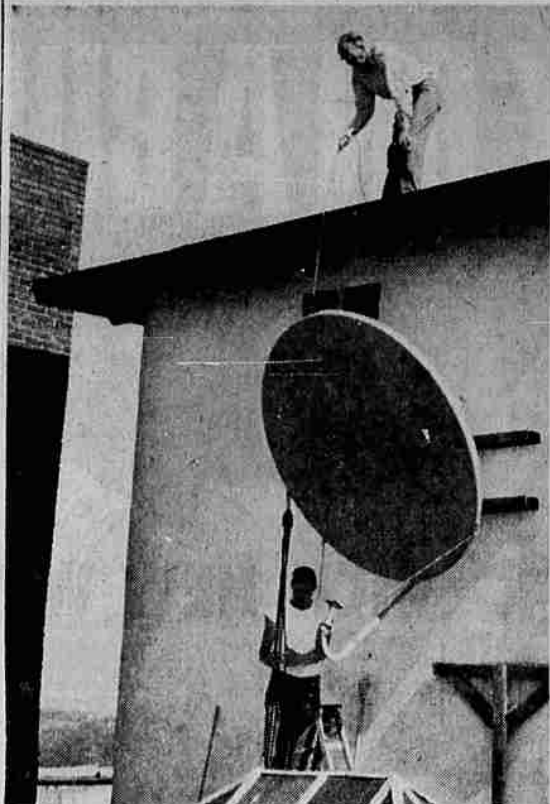

Cable to Carry 5 TV Station Signals

Medford people will have a choice of five television station signals on the community antenna system being installed by Jackson Cable, according to Everett Faber, vice president of the Oregon Broadcasting company.

Installation of microwave and "headend" facilities for the cable television system was completed Thursday at the Medford hotel, Faber said. This will link the already finished installations on four mountain tops north of Medford with the distribution system in Medford.

The distribution area will initially stretch from Columbus ave. on West Main st. to the intersection of Valley View dr. and Hillcrest rd., Faber noted.

Faber said that stockholders of the Oregon Broadcasting company were told by its officers at a recent meeting that the three signals originally intended for the system will be followed by two more as soon as the additional necessary equipment can be installed. Stations involved in the five signals are located in Medford, Klamath Falls, Roseburg, Eugene, Corvallis, and Portland. The same signals will be available on antenna systems in Ashland and Grants Pass.

Already signals are being fed to the receiving point for Medford in the Medford hotel, Faber said.

While the microwave equipment was being installed, contractors were hanging the messenger cable through the


initial distribution area in Medford, Faber noted. This portion of the project, the last remaining before individual home service connections are made, is expected to be completed in the near future, according to Faber.

School Maturity Tests Announced

School maturity tests for children whose sixth birthday falls between the period Nov. 16 and Dec. 31 will be given on appointment as arranged through the Medford school administration office by calling Spring 3-3683.

Children successfully passing the test will be permitted to begin the first grade. The approved score is set at a level that would enable a child to compete successfully with other children in his first grade class.

Oregon school law provides for children starting the first grade at school when their sixth birthday is on or before Nov. 15.

The school maturity test is provided to enable children with greater maturity than the average in matters of span of attention, application, academic aptitude, etc., to commence school even though their sixth birthday falls beyond the Nov. 15 date.

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
STAMPS HONOR AUTOS
