

East Gridders Hand West 13-0 Defeat

Lucas Named East Squad Top Lineman

Pendleton—UPI—A 50-yard scoring drive in the first quarter and a 40-yard touchdown run by Dave Wilcox on a pass interception early in the third quarter powered the East to a 13-0 victory over the West in the ninth annual East-West Gridders' hospital football game here Saturday night.

A crowd of 6,748 watched the East squad roll 50 yards into pay dirt the second time it got the ball. Fullback Dick Fulwyler of Vale capped the scoring drive with a 1-yard plunge with 3:52 left in the first quarter. His attempted run for the extra point was stopped short.

Wilcox, voted the game's most valuable player, picked off a flat pass thrown by Bill McMillan of Willamina and scampered 40 yards for the 6-pointer with the second half just 42 seconds old. Bruce Reed of Elgin kicked the extra point.

West Drive Halted
The East defense halted a West drive on the 1-yard line early in the fourth quarter. The West was set up when Frank Ellis of Jefferson took an East punt on the West 35-yard line and rambled 44 yards to the East 21.

George Lucas, a guard from St. Mary's of Medford, was chosen as the East's outstanding lineman and Roy Ames of Umatilla was selected as the East's outstanding back.

Dennis Vitale and Gilbert Truette, a pair of Seaside gridders, were chosen as the outstanding back and line- respectively, for the West.

The victory was the East's third in the annual contest that was initiated in 1952. The West has won five. One contest had ended in a tie.

U.S. Squad Posts Easy Win at Bern

Bern, Switzerland—UPI—The United States track and field team, an overwhelming victory in a two-day warm-up international meet behind it, leaves for Rome Tuesday to test its superiority over a wider assortment of competition in the Olympic games.

Ralph Boston of Laurel, Miss., who broke Jesse Owens' 25-year-old broad jump record on Aug. 12, highlighted Sunday's segment of the meet by beating Owens' record again with a jump of 28 feet, 8 3/4 inches.

The 21-year-old Tennessee A&I student startled the sports world when his leap of 26 feet, 11 1/4 inches at Walnut, Calif., topped Owens' original mark by three inches.

When Boston left for Bern last Thursday, he said he would not go "all out" at the practice meet. Like many of the other U.S. trackmen who turned in surprisingly good performances, Boston felt he would rather "save his best" for the Rome games beginning Thursday.

Grumbles were heard that the Bern detour was just a "sightseeing tour" arranged by the officials. But the spirit of competition that had culminated in Olympic berths after a series of trial eliminations, could not be detached from the efforts of the trackmen. They appeared to go all out in a pre-game showing, apparently designed to throw a scare into the opposition before they even touched the cinders in Rome.

Portland State 1960 Schedule Toughest Ever

Portland—Portland State's football team, facing its toughest schedule ever, begins preparations for the 1960 campaign Tuesday, Sept. 6, when Head Coach Hugh Smithwick calls the opening practice session of the season.

Smithwick, starting his second year as PSC grid coach, expects to greet 15 returning lettermen and an overall turnout of approximately 50 athletes at the first workout.

The Viking schedule includes the annual Oregon Collegiate Conference encounters with Oregon Tech, Southern Oregon, Oregon College of Education, and Eastern Oregon, plus non-league tussles with University of Puget Sound, Lewis and Clark, University of Nevada, and Linfield.

Russia Favored To Repeat Olympic Win

Rome—The experts predict the United States will take home a lot of medals but Russia will sweep to its second straight mythical Olympic team title in the games which begin on Thursday.

With most of the athletes enjoying a day off Sunday, the only activity anywhere along the Olympic village was limited to a g a b sessions in which the various "experts" discussed the relative merits of the U.S. and USSR teams.

The way they see it, the United States definitely has gained strength in track and swimming—events in which it has held a virtual monopoly through the years. But its relative weakness—in Russia—in a number of lesser sports figures to give the big bear the cushion it needs to make it two straight world team titles.

Russia Won 'Team Title'
Russia "won" the unofficial team championship at Melbourne four years ago with a total of 98 medals, including gold, silver and bronze ones, compared to 74 for the U. S. The Soviet total, however, included 23 medals in gymnastics alone, and the total in that sport figures to be as high again.

Based on the opinion of observers from many lands, the United States should win up to 45 medals—of all types—in swimming and track this time around, which would be an increase of 14 over Melbourne. On an overall basis, though, this figures out to a total of 69 medals in all sports for the U. S. compared to 74 four years ago.

Sweeps in the 110-meter high hurdles and the shot put are expected for the Americans, while the men's and women's swimming teams should add 14 more medals to the pile.

U. S. Tracksters Tough
Admittedly, even by the Russians who have come here full of optimism, the U. S. men's track meet will be tough to beat. However, it's the reverse when it comes to the ladies' events where the Russians are vastly superior. But the Yank women optimistically are shooting for four golds.

Klamath Falls scored its winning run in the bottom of the 11th when Roswell catcher Harry Wilson threw wild to third base in an attempt to catch Dave Stippich who was stealing third.

The winners opened the 11th frame when Stippich walked and moved to second on a single by Jim Bickers. Stippich then broke for third and came in to score the winning run when Wilson's throw went past the third baseman and into left field.

Klamath Falls trailed 1-0 until the ninth inning when John Bianchi laid down a perfect squeeze bunt to score Bickers, who had hit a pinch-hit double and moved to third on Dave Sacks' single.

Klamath missed an opportunity to win the game in the bottom of the ninth when a throw from outfielder Farrell Dunham nailed Bob Lapsley, a pinch runner for Sacks who was trying to score from second on a single by Don Gredel, at the plate.

Winning pitcher John Webb limited the losers to four hits and Roswell's only run came in the first inning on a walk to Jim Allen and a run-producing double by Bernard Crawford.

Roswell and Phoenix, Ariz., met tonight at 8 in a battle of once-defeated squads, and Klamath Falls will draw a bye. The winner of the Roswell-Phoenix game will meet the undefeated Oregon champions at 8 p.m. Tuesday in a contest that could determine the regional winner.

Phoenix ousted Fresno, Calif., from the tournament in the day's first game with an 11-10 victory in 11 innings as Tim Myers belted a grand-slam homer and batted in six runs.

Myers was also the winning pitcher as Phoenix avenged Thursday's opening round 11-1 loss to Fresno.

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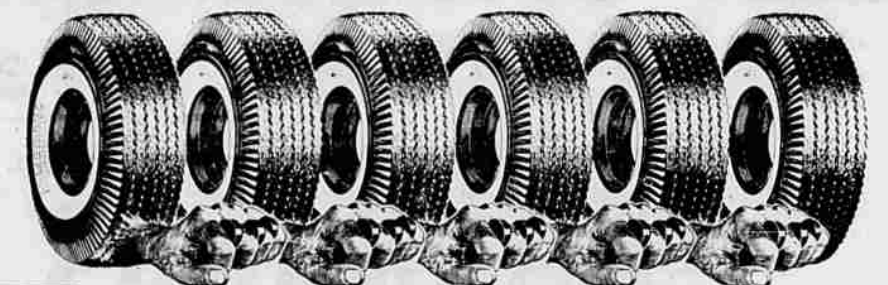
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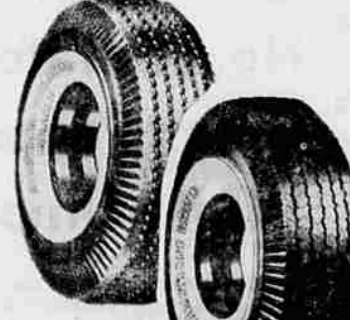
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
