

Other Arrangements May Be Made to Avoid Long Auction

Other arrangements may be made next year to avoid another long livestock auction sale near the end of the Jackson County 4-H and FFA fair, fair officials said today.

"We may either have a lamb sale in the spring or hold the auction over two nights," Bill Bigham, Eagle Point, veteran 4-H leader and fair board member, said.

The 2½ hours spent on auctioning off the sheep Friday night took its toll on beef prices as usual. However, the grand champion 4-H and FFA steers did bring slightly higher prices this year. Todd Caster, Crater FFA grand champion Angus brought 61 cents a pound or \$567.30 from Deaver Tractor and Implement company. Jack Peek, Central Point club, and son of the Table Top ranch manager, received 90 cents a pound or \$796.50 from North's Chuck Wagon for his grand champion 4-H Hereford.

Other beef champions and the prices they brought were John Anhorn, Central Point club, reserve grand champion Hereford, 67 cents a pound, or \$676.70; Nikki Hammond, Central Point club, champion Angus, 39 cents a pound or \$403.65 from Monarch Feed and Seed store.

Fair officials estimated average prices ran 34.2 cents a pound for sheep compared

to 42 7/10 cents last year; 30.92 cents a pound for swine compared to 36 cents last year and 33.26 cents a pound for beef compared to 40½ cents a pound last year.

Bill Bray, Midway auction yard, was auctioneer again this year assisted by Ross Every, Grants Pass. Alan Bray, Bill's son, temporarily took over and expertly handled the sale of fellow Crater FFA chapter member David Foot's grand champion Yorkshire pig. There was little lively bidding Friday night. The crowded bleacher seats soon began to empty after the sheep sales.
