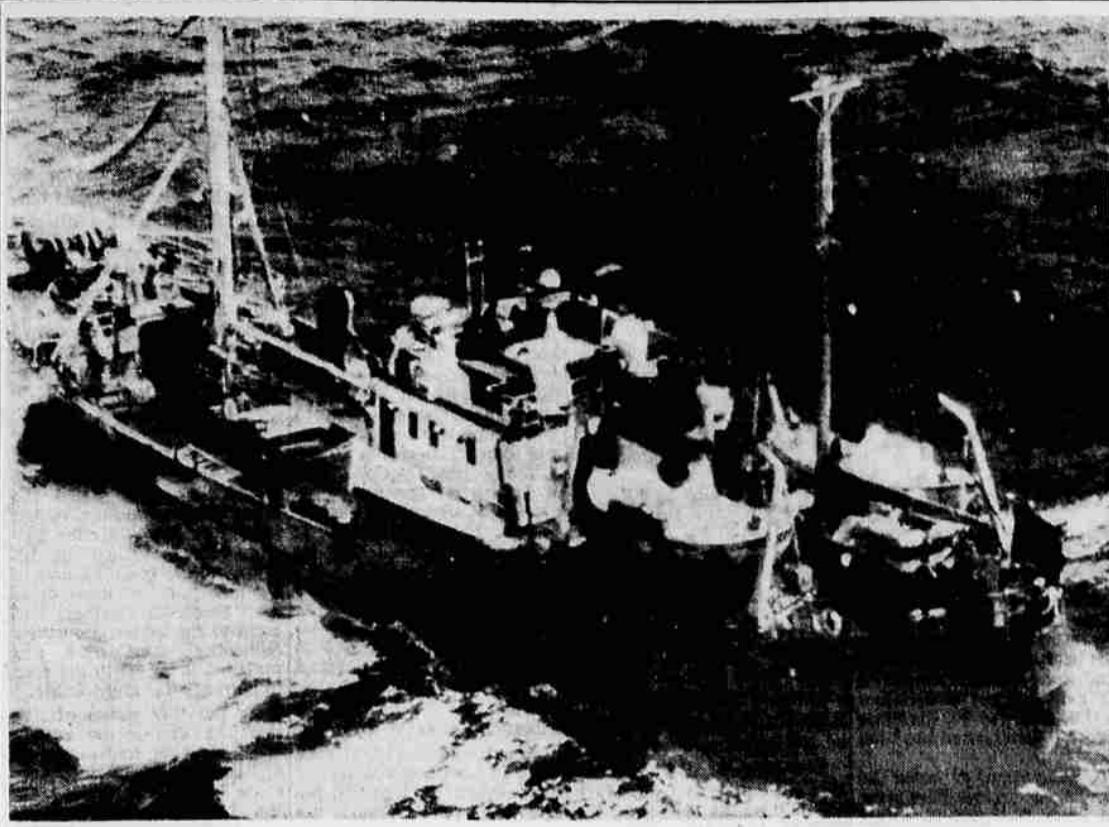

London - (UPI) - Newspapers here marked Princess Margaret's 30th birthday with reports that she is expecting a baby and that her husband, Antony Armstrong-Jones, has found a job.

No confirmation for either report could be obtained immediately.

The Sunday Dispatch cited "American circles in London" as the authority for its exclusive story that the princess is pregnant, saying that an unidentified American magazine editor got the story from a "unimpeachable source."

Today's Daily Express reported that Jones, who had to give up his fashionable photography studio when he married the princess, will go to work for the Civic Trust, a non-profit organization devoted to keeping Britain beautiful.

Congress Tightens Reins on Funds for Traveling Expense

Washington - (CQ) - Spurred by newspaper reports of unsupervised spending of government funds by some of its junketing members, Congress has tightened regulations on the use of these funds for both domestic and overseas travel.

While in the mood for reform, Congress also prohibited members from accepting free or cut-rate trips on U.S. steamship lines.

Major Changes

These were the changes voted by Congress: Annual reports covering spending for overseas travel must itemize the use of both dollars and foreign currencies. The consolidated reports previously required (and published in the Congressional Record) now must show how much each traveling member and employee spent abroad.

All members and employees traveling on government funds, not just those on committee business, would be required to report.

Reports covering expenditures for domestic travel hereafter must be published. The Senate in recent years has chosen to publish this report on its own accord, but the House has not. Now both houses are required by law to publish it.

The House Administration committee has limited representatives and employees of the House to \$12 per day plus transportation costs when traveling domestically on official business. With special permission they may spend a maximum of \$25 per day, but the "watchdog" over Congress, the General Accounting Office, will audit their expense vouchers. Before July 1, when the new regulations went into effect, House members could accept the \$12 per diem or be reimbursed for actual expenses after showing itemized receipts.

The Senate, which uses the same per diem schedule as the executive branch, recently proposed that the limit be raised from \$12 to \$15 per day. When using dollars for overseas travel, senators and Senate employees would be paid the prevailing country-by-country per diem rate set by the State Department. Under unusual circumstances they and other federal employees could be paid a maximum of \$10 per day in addition to the per diem. Congress is expected to complete action on this in August.

Members of Congress or their families in the future will be prohibited from accepting free or cut-rate passage on U. S. steamship lines. Proponents of this "anti-junk-et" law argued that accepting this type of passage put members in a vulnerable position when voting on federal subsidies for the steamship lines. A similar prohibition covering rail and air transportation already was law.
