### Teachers Who Break Contracts Said 'Immoral'

Portland — UPI — Portland teachers who break contracts with the school district are not likely to get their jobs back, according to Superintendent J. W. Edwards. Edwards told the board Monday night that hiring officials are noting the names of teachers who resign in the summer without good reason. He said they will never be hired again. He said that some teachers quit Monday — 15 days before classes are scheduled to begin. Board member William Wyse called it "immoral" to resign. One member said some school districts are "hard pressed" because of late resignations. Edwards said school authorities can ask the state superintendent to cancel the teaching certificate of teachers who break contracts.

### Unemployed 'DA' Divorced By Wife

Los Angeles — UPI — Unemployed actor William Talman, 45, was divorced by his wife of eight years Tuesday and ordered to pay her \$700 monthly alimony and child support. The attorney for Mrs. Barbara Talman, 42, said she would request higher alimony and support payments for the couple's two children when Talman can find a job. The actor was fired from his regular role as the district attorney on the weekly "Perry Mason" television show earlier this year when he was arrested with three other men and four women in a Hollywood apartment. Morals charges against Talman and the others later were dropped but the veteran performer failed to get back his TV job — or any other work. Talman and his wife separated last year. They have two children, Barbara, 8, and William, 6.

### Labor Committee To Meet Thursday

Astoria — UPI — The Legislative Interim Committee on labor-management relations meets here Thursday and Friday as the windup of a series of public meetings held throughout the state. State Sen. Harry D. Boivin, (D-Klamath Falls) committee chairman, said Thursday's session would be devoted to presentations on possible workmen's compensation legislation. Senate President Walter Pearson (D-Portland) chairman of the subcommittee on workmen's compensation, will preside. Boivin said testimony and discussion on tentative proposals in the field of unfair labor practices would be held Friday. After the local meetings, the committee plans to expedite completion of its report to the 1961 legislature.

### Sophia, Hubby Said Not Wed

Rome — UPI — Lawyers for film star Sophia Loren and her producer husband, Carlo Ponti, Tuesday answered bigamy charges by contending their clients are not married at all. Ponti is charged with bigamy because he married Miss Loren in a proxy ceremony in Mexico in 1957 while according to Italian law he was still married to his first wife. Miss Loren was charged as a party to bigamy. Court sources said the couples' lawyers contended the proxy marriage was not valid because of a recent Mexican law which voided it. Investigating Magistrate D. Franco did not rule immediately on the defense contention.

### Over 700 Indian Children To Attend School

Salem — UPI — Over 700 Indian children from various parts of the nation will begin to arrive at Chemawa school near here next week. The students will arrive by plane Sunday, Monday and Tuesday including Alaska's first representation at the school in more than 10 years. Alaskan children attended the school when it was a boarding school serving primarily Indian children from the Northwest. For the past 10 years, however, it has been attended exclusively by Navajo children from Arizona and New Mexico. Don Foster, director of the Portland region of the Bureau of Indian Affairs, said cultures of Navajo and Alaskan Indians will be interchanged at the school for the first time. About 125 Alaskan children will be integrated with some 600 Navajo children.

### Nixon Wants No Commercials on Radio-TV Debates

Washington — UPI — Vice President Richard M. Nixon wants no commercial sponsorship for his radio-TV debates with Sen. John F. Kennedy. He thinks Kennedy prefers them unsponsored too. Herbert G. Klein, Nixon's press secretary, told newsmen today spokesmen for the two presidential candidates agreed in discussing the format that the debates would be unsponsored. Networks spokesmen seemed to agree too, Klein said. Klein made the statement when asked about a telegram sent to Nixon by Robert W. Sarnoff, chairman of the board of the National Broadcasting corporation, reporting an expression of sponsor interest. NBC will carry them in any case, Sarnoff said, but he added that he did not believe a sponsor would damage the debates. For the planned series of Nixon-Kennedy debates, Klein said, Nixon would rather have no commercial sponsor.

### Boston Transit Service Normal

Boston — UPI — Transit service in Greater Boston returned to normal today ending a one-day strike that choked the city's streets with traffic and cost merchants well over \$6 million in lost trade. The walkout, which began Monday evening when a bus driver was suspended for refusing to work overtime, ended with an agreement Tuesday night between officials of the Boston Carmen's Union and the Metropolitan Transit Authority. The settlement included an agreement on an impartial arbitrator who will aid in settling a contract dispute. The Union has worked without a contract since Jan. 1. It also was agreed that the driver who began it all by refusing overtime, Edward L. Burns, would be reinstated and given a hearing on the merits of his case.

### Grants Pass Youth Involved In Mishap

### Cubans Arrested At Yankee Stadium

New York — UPI — About 20 anti-Castro Cubans jumped from the crowded stands onto the ball-field at Yankee stadium Tuesday night carrying banners attacking the Fidel Castro regime. They tangled with stadium guards and nine were arrested. All nine were charged with disorderly conduct and held overnight for arraignment in Bronx Magistrates Court today. Three of the arrested demonstrators said they had fought in Castro's forces in the Sierra Maestra. The Cubans took the field between the third and fourth innings of the New York Yankees-Chicago White Sox game before about 42,000 fans. Almost immediately they were fighting with the guards and it was at least five minutes before the players could get on with the game.

### Mrs. Neuberger Plans Appearances

Portland — UPI — Democratic Senate candidate Mrs. Maurine Neuberger today announced she had scheduled seven joint appearances in the state with her opponent, former Gov. Elmo Smith. The two candidates will debate current issues. Mrs. Neuberger said she agreed to meet with her opponent under the auspices of various organizations. The debates were scheduled for Portland Oct. 5, 10, 12; Grants Pass, Oct. 19; Medford, Oct. 20; Corvallis, Oct. 26, and the Portland YMCA, Oct. 30.

### Widow Sues Dance Studio For \$25,000

Los Angeles — UPI — A 74-year-old widow filed suit Tuesday to recover \$25,000 she claimed she paid for 2,480 hours of dance instruction at an Arthur Murray studio. Mrs. Sue Ann Lilly complained in her superior court suit that she signed eight contracts for the dancing lessons on promises that she would be "guaranteed" attractive male dancing partners. She also charged she was told the lessons would make her a gifted dancer so that she could perform on television. Mrs. Lilly's complaint accused the defendants of taking advantage of her loneliness. Named in the suit were Arthur and Katherine Murray, their corporation and P. R. Shuman, an employee in the firm's studio in nearby Huntington Parks.

### OLYMPIC ENTRIES RISE

Rome — UPI — The number of nations participating in the Olympic Games rose to 85 today when a lone athlete from Haiti completed registration formalities. He is Philome Laguerre, a weight lifter.

### Prisoner Asks Transfer From Solitary Cell

Portland — UPI — A prisoner involved in last Thursday's riot at Rocky Butte County jail repeated his request in court Tuesday for a restraining order against the jail superintendent. James H. Bello, 33, also asked the court for an order transferring him from solitary confinement at the jail. Bello appeared in court with his own attorney, L. B. Sandblast. Bello said he had retained Sandblast since his Friday court appearance, when the court had appointed another attorney as defense counsel for Bello. Bello first requested a restraining order Friday, charging that guards had used brutality toward prisoners following the riot. The court denied the request, however, after jail superintendent Jack Matthews denied Bello's charges under oath, and said force was used only when it was needed to subdue prisoners who were attacking guards.

### REDS JAIL SCORNERS

Berlin — UPI — Two East Germans picked up in a bar have been jailed for calling a program on the official Communist TV network "manure!" and demanding that the bartender shut it off, an anti-Red "Information Bureau West" reported today. One of the men, a plumber, was sentenced to serve eight months and the other, a baker, was sent to jail for six months, the information bureau said. The charge: "scorn of state institutions."

Former silent film figures James Kirkwood and Belle Martell spoke at the memorial service at Valentino's crypt at Hollywood Memorial park.

### MOB APPLAUDS HANGING

Tunis — UPI — Mohammed Zellel, the rape-murderer of a 9-year-old girl and a 6-year-old boy, was hanged in public at the scene of the crime Tuesday before a crowd of about 5,000 persons howling their approval. The hanging was the first public execution in Tunisia in more than three years. It took place in the open by public demand.
