

Klamath Trips Roswell

So. Oregon Team Wins Region Title

Bend - (UPI) - Klamath Falls scored six runs in the third inning here Wednesday night and went on to defeat Roswell, N. M., 9-6, to win the Western Regional American Legion baseball title.

The win gave Klamath Falls a berth in the national tournament at Hastings, Neb., beginning Aug. 28, with eight regional winners from 49 states vying for the national title.

John Bianchi slammed a 310-foot bases-loaded homer over the right field fence in the third inning and drove in another run on a force out to pace the winners' 11-hit attack on three Roswell pitchers.

Bianchi belted his timely hit on the first pitch after Roswell rightfielder Farrell Dunham had dropped a foul fly.

Don Willey had three hits in four trips to the plate for the winners.

The third inning uprising broke a 1-1 tie and gave Klamath Falls a lead it never relinquished. Roswell battled back to score three runs in the bottom of the third and narrow the score to 7-4 on four hits and two Klamath Falls errors.

Winning pitcher was John Webb, who was relieved by Wally Palmberg in the eighth inning when the losers rallied for two runs on two hits, an error and a walk. Palmberg retired the side in the eighth and put the Roswell squad down in order in the ninth frame.

Dick Skinner had five hits in five times at bat and drove in one run to pace the 12-hit Roswell attack.

A crowd of 1,154 watched the championship contest, bringing the total paid attendance for the tourney's seven games to 7,284.

Salmon Angling Is Reported Good at Coast

Portland - (UPI) - The weekly report on fishing conditions showed today that salmon angling remains good in coastal waters where bad weather does not hamper operations.

The State Game commission also reminded hunters that the season on mourning doves and band-tailed pigeons opens Sept. 1 and extends through Sept. 30.

The fishing report:
Southwest: North Umpqua trout angling poor in Winchester to Glide area; summer steelheading also slow; Winchester bay good for salmon when weather permits; Coos bay should be good for salmon but fair to poor for striped bass; trout angling, trout angling slow on the Rogue; Fish lake in Jackson county producing many limits; steel head angling slow with a few scattered fish taken above Marial.

Central: East fork Hood river very good on worms and single eggs; Deschutes in Maupin area excellent with limits taken on bait; steelheading on lower Deschutes good; East and Paulina good for bait 50 to 60 feet deep; Big Lava good on slow, deep troll; Wickiup slow; Odell and Crescent lakes poor; Diamond lake good to excellent trolling flies in evening at south end; Lake of the Woods slow.

Northeast: Upper John Day river above Prairie City fair; Murders and Deer creeks good for small, wild trout; Magone lake producing a few rainbow on slow troll; south fork Walla Walla fair to good for rainbow; Grande Ronde river low; Morgan lake continues good; Willowa river above Minam good on dry flies or spin lures; Innaha is good; Brownlee reservoir excellent for small channel and bullhead catfish, black bass and crappies; high lakes of Willowa and Elkhor mountains excellent for eastern brook.

Southeast: Malheur reservoir good for small rainbow; Beulah reservoir slow; Snake river fair for crappie and bass; High and Fish lakes good for small rainbow; Delinnet lake still poor; Chewaucan river, Dairy creek and upper Deep creek fair.

Northwest: Salmon angling good near mouth of Columbia; river fishing for Chinook has improved; north coast streams should improve for sea-run cutthroat and jack salmon; crabbing has been good at Netarts; silver salmon fishing fair off Yaquina bay; Alsea sidewater good for blueback and Devils lake improving for steelhead in evening troll; Siuslaw river mouth salmon angling slow because of rough water.

Racing Dog Scandal Involves Oregonian

Miami - (UPI) - Three greyhound kennels, suspended in the aftermath of dog-drugging at Miami Beach Kennel club, face possible additional action from the State Racing commission.

A commission investigating committee Tuesday levied 30-day suspensions on Orange Grove and Looney's Kennels of Beaverton, Ore., and pun-

ished trainers with fines and suspensions. Monday, it had suspended the Red Fork Kennel and fined its two trainers.

The committee turned the matters over to the full commission for possible further action, and State Atty. Richard Gerstein said those guilty of drugging dogs would be severely punished if found and convicted.

Drugging racing animals in Florida is a felony. Suspensions of 30 days and \$100 fines each were given Orange Grove Trainer Al Oberman; Vernon Spradling, operator of the Looney Kennel in its owner's absence; and Looney's trainer Fred W. Hayston.

Commission officials heard testimony that dogs from both kennels had been drugged prior to being raced earlier this month.

Portland - (UPI) - The inquiry into alleged tampering with racing greyhounds at Florida race tracks had the approval of Oregon racing officials Wednesday. At the same time, they said dog racing in Oregon was clean and above board.

Scandal has been missing at the Multnomah Kennel club, they said, largely because of the precautions insisted upon by General Manager Murray Kemp. The dogs are isolated and policed for a specified time before they race, and during that time cannot be visited or otherwise contacted by their owners or trainers.

Vasco Parke, supervisor of racing for the State Racing commission, and H. S. Chapman, secretary of the racing board, issued this joint statement:

"From the first year of greyhound racing in Oregon to this, the 28th year, and from many, many thousands of tests taken, not one has ever come back from the laboratory positive. Tests are taken on some dogs in every race, every night. These are taken on losers and winners and also at random at the discretion of the judges. We think this is a remarkable record."

Orville S. Looney, Oregon greyhound owner, whose kennel was listed as being involved in the Florida investigation, said he "was completely absolved in this Florida matter." He said he had a booking in Miami this summer but was unable to fill it so turned his booking over to Vernon Spradling along with four of his greyhounds. He said "I believe Mr. Spradling to be a man of high principles and also believe this incident was an outside job."

Looney added, "I would like to emphasize that no Oregon people . . . are involved in any of these incidents."

WARRIORS SIGN GOLA
Philadelphia - (UPI) - Tom Gola, third-leading scorer for the Philadelphia Warriors last season, has signed a contract to play with the National Basketball Association club in the 1960-61 season.

Stockholm, Sweden - (UPI) - Floyd Patterson, world's heavyweight boxing champion, is standing firm today as he readies for round two of his scrimmage with boxing officials in connection with his next title defense.

The 25-year-old champ, referring to National Boxing association officials as "the undertakers of boxing," vehemently repeated his vow that Ingemar Johansson would get first crack at the title he regained from the Swede last June.

Patterson was replying to a remark made by NBA President Tony Macaroni, who said that unless the champ defended his crown against Johansson before January, he (Macaroni) would recommend that Patterson be forced to defend against a different challenger next year.
