

ITALIAN PRESIDENT OPENS OLYMPIC GAMES IN ROME

Teams From 85 Countries March in Stadium Parade

Rome—The XVII Olympic Games opened today with pomp and ceremony which would have pleased the caesars.

Giovanni Gronchi, president of Italy, declared the games open. It was a sweltering day but 90,000 spectators were jammed into the white concrete Olympic stadium.

A glittering parade of 85 competing nations featured the traditional opening ceremony. The statues of ancient Rome were visible at almost every point of the compass and, striking an incongruous note, helicopters whirled overhead and occasionally dipped into the stadium until they almost touched the emerald field.

It appeared, said the experts, that the Rome engineers had produced the traffic engineering "miracle" that almost no one expected. Working at a white-hot pitch for the past two months, Rome's traffic experts virtually turned the 2000-year-old city upside down. They made practically every street in the city, and the bridges across the Tiber, one way. They all abolished the left-hand turn, and they developed underpasses and traffic islands so that traffic flows in circles, and intersections are kept at a minimum.

Bevos Split With Seattle

In the other game, league-leading Spokane stayed seven games ahead of the pack by downing Vancouver, 10-3.

Seattle's second game win came only after the Beavers capitalized on three Rainier errors in the ninth and threatened with three runs. Lefty Don Rudolph came on in relief of starter Ray Rippelmeyer and put out the Portland fire by getting Jerry Mason to pop up and Bill Wilson to strike out with the bases full.

Joe Taylor had a two-run homer for the Suds.

In the opener, it was all spinning a two-hit shutout and Pete Gongola driving in three runs with two hits.

Broncos Reach Into Canada for Players

Editor's note: The following is the second of 21 dispatches sizing up the prospects of teams in the American Football league and the National Football league.

Denver, Colo. —UPI—The Denver Broncos have added something new to professional football in this country — now the players are coming from Canada.

Bob Howsam, president of Denver's entry in the new American Football league, went right to Canada for his head coach, Frank Filchock, and his general manager, Dean Griffing. Since then, Filchock and Griffing have been bringing in talent from the professional league in Canada.

The Canadian league had plagued the old National Football league for years by grabbing off a few American football players.

Lands Canadian Quarterbacks
Perhaps Filchock's best coup was the landing of a pair of veteran Canadian league quarterbacks, Frank Tripucka and Don Dublinski, both of whom once played in the NFL. Both are 29 and accomplished passers.

Tripucka, who will be the No. 1 man in the Bronco offense, holds three Canadian league records for passing in a single season — the most thrown, the most completed and the most yardage. He played at Notre Dame and Dublinski starred at Utah university.

Among the experienced NFL performers who should help Denver are Al Carmichael, an offensive halfback who played with Green Bay; Don King, former tackle with Cleveland, Philadelphia and Green Bay; Darryl Rogers, defensive halfback who played

with the Los Angeles Rams, and local favorite Frank Bernardi, who was brilliant at Colorado university and later played defensive halfback for the Chicago Cardinals. In addition, the roster is spotted with veterans of Canadian football.

Rely on Youth
Otherwise, Filchock and his two assistants, Dale Dordrill, one-time great middle guard for the Pittsburgh Steelers, and Jim Cason, former defensive back with San Francisco and Los Angeles, will rely on youth.

"The keys to a successful pro club are experience and leadership," according to Filchock. "We feel that Frank Tripucka and Tom Dublinski will give us the leadership and experience we need at quarterback. Blend these two with our potential young talent — such men as J. W. Brodnax, Louisiana State, Larry Cundiff, Michigan State, Austin Gonsoulin, Baylor, and Carl Larpenner, Texas — and you have the ingredients for a hustling, entertaining club that figures to be a contender."

OSC FOLLOWERS IRKED
Corvallis — Oregon State track and field followers are somewhat miffed about Darrell Horn being left home when the U.S. Olympic team departed for Rome. Horn, an alternate on the squad, who just missed making the "big three" by 2 1/4 inches at the final trial meet at Stanford, twice finished second and third once in Olympic team training meets thereafter. The third man on the squad, out with an injury, hasn't jumped for nearly two months, and yet they took him to Rome. What's more, Horn has beaten the second man twice.

U.S. Netters Beaten In Doubles Test

Chesnut Hill, Mass.—UPI—The big team of Barry Mac Kay and Ron Holmberg was among the missing today as the top teams settled down to business in the 80th National Doubles tournament.

Most of the seeded pairs survived Wednesday's third-round play at Longwood Cricket club despite a few scares. But Air Force veteran Mac Kay, the big Ohioan with the big serve, and the 22-year-old Holmberg, a Tulane graduate by way of Brooklyn, N.Y., were sidetracked in straight sets by the British tandem of Bobby Wilson and young Mike Sangster.

Wilson, concentrating on his game and shunning any burst of temperament, and Sangster, only 19, posted a winning match score of 13-11, 8-6, 7-5, gaining strength all the way.

Wilson and Sangster, the fifth-seeded foreign team, were to meet the No. 2 Aussie combine of Rod Laver and Bob Mark in one of today's quarter-finals. The beaten duo of Mac Kay and Holmberg were third-seeded domestically.

Aussies Neale Fraser and Roy Emerson, the defending champions and No. 1 foreign team, had little trouble Wednesday in overcoming veteran Americans Gardner Mulloy and Billy Talbert, 612, 7-5, 6-4.

The top-ranking women's team of Maria Bueno of Brazil and Darlene Hard of Montebello, Calif., ousted Carole Wright of Brooklyn, N.Y., 6-2, 6-4, to gain the semi-finals.

1960 Tornado Grid Hopefuls Turn Out in Record Numbers At Season's First Practice

Oregon's defending champion A-1 high school football team, Medford's Black Tornado, might possibly be lacking in some of last year's quality this season, but it certainly won't be lacking in quantity.

A total of 103 grid hopefuls greeted head coach Fred Spiegelberg at the first practice session of the 1960 season Wednesday.

Coach Spiegelberg, obviously amazed, said the turnout surpassed by far last season's record turnout of 80 prospective players.

Among those turning out yesterday were 31 returning lettermen from the high school's 1959 championship team. Included in these are six starters — three offensive and three defensive.

The returning veteran starters are, on offense, Dick Ragsdale, quarterback; Dan Sieg, fullback; and Mike Hood, right halfback. On defense, they are Terry Earl, linebacker; Jerry Winetrot, defensive end; and John James, tackle.

The main problem facing Coach Spiegelberg at the outset of the season will be to replace last year's graduation victims. This will be a hard task indeed, as Spiegelberg himself pointed out. "We lost a lot of quality in those seniors," he said.

"We lost three terrific ends in Jerry Anderson, Lowell Dean, and Booth Deakins," he said, "two good left halfbacks, Skip Bennett and Ken Durkee—also the best safety in the

state on defense." And, he added, "we lost the two best guards I've ever coached in Keith Berg and John Frohmayer."

Other graduated players which Spiegelberg said the team will sorely miss are Pat McLoughlin, center; Gordon Pathman and Dennis Jensen, tackles; Lynn Knight, punter; Leonard Grigg, halfback; Cal Dean, defensive linebacker; and Reggie Breeze, middle guard on defense.

Although these losses will be felt throughout the entire team, Spiegelberg said "the line is where we're really going to miss them."

Coach Spiegelberg had praise for this year's prospective gridgers saying they seem "very enthusiastic" and "willing to learn." But even so, "it is hard to replace ballplayers with experience," he added.

ENTERS \$75,000 RACE
Saratoga Springs, N. Y. —UPI—Patrice Jacobs' Hall to Reason, a leading contender for this year's juvenile racing honors, is expected to head the field in Saturday's renewal of the \$75,000 Hopeful Stakes at Saratoga.

Spiegelberg said the squad will probably have its first scrimmage next Wednesday. For the next few practices the team will be concentrating on conditioning and fundamentals, he said, and will run through some offensive plays to acquaint the newcomers with the Tornado's system of football.

Assisting Spiegelberg in coaching duties this week are Paul Evensen, line coach; Tom Marler, backfield coach; Dean Benson, end and defensive coach; Frank Roelandt, John Kovenz and Art Keith, junior varsity coaches; Barney Riggs, Hedrick Junior high school coach; Bob Radcliff, McLoughlin Junior High school coach; and Cy Perkins.

Pittsburgh, Yankees Win; Increase League Leads

Keep an eye on Brooks Robinson of Baltimore because you're looking at a soon-to-be batting champ and quite possibly the finest third baseman since Pie Traynor.

That's the word from Paul Richards and Casey Stengel, a pair of experts who aren't easily impressed.

The 23-year-old Robinson backed up both their opinions Wednesday night when he tripled with the bases full and played his usual rawness over Detroit in a 9-2 victory over Detroit that snapped the Tigers' seven-game winning streak and boosted Baltimore back into a tie for second place.

Robinson's three-run triple off loser Bob Bruce highlighted a five-run second-inning rally, eased the third-inning Jack Fisher's ninth victory and helped the Orioles stay within 1 1/2 games of first place. In addition to his triple, Robinson also collected a pair of singles that increased his batting average to .304.

Those three hits gave Robinson a season total of 143, second in the league only to the 147 collected so far by Al Smith of the White Sox.

"Barring a mishap, Robinson will win the batting title within a year or so," Richards says flatly. "He might have even done it this year had he not hit in such bad luck earlier this season."

Lauds Defensive Play
Stengel's rhapsodies over Robinson concern his defensive brilliance at third base.

"I've been around a long time, but I've never seen anyone make the kinds' plays this kid does," Casey declares. "I saw Traynor — and he was the best. Robinson is almost up there with him though."

Stengel guided his Yankees to a 3-2 victory over the White Sox Wednesday that enabled them to retain their American league lead. The Athletics beat the Senators, 6-4, and the Indians topped the Red Sox, 3-1, in other AL games.

The Pirates upped their National league lead to 7 1/2 games with a 10-6 win over the Cubs while the Dodgers defeated the second-place Braves, 5-3. The Phillies beat the Cardinals, 5-3, and the Reds downed the Giants, 3-2, in 11 innings.

Art Ditmar won his 13th of the season and sixth straight for the Yankees although Luis Arroyo had to

nailed down the final out when the White Sox rallied in the ninth. Roy Sievers hit his 24th and 25th homers but Tony Kubek's 10th homer in the seventh inning off loser Herb Score turned out to be the winning run.

Third baseman Reno Bertoia's fifth inning error opened the door for four earned runs that helped the Senators pinch hitter Hank Bauer singled home KC's final two runs. Johnny Kuchs was the winner and Camillo Pascual the loser.

Romano Homer Wins
Barry Latman pitched his first complete game of the season for Cleveland and battery-mate John Roman hit a two-run homer in the seventh to beat Boston. Latman scattered nine hits and fanned seven in winning his second game. Tom Brewer suffered his 11th loss against seven victories.

Successive homers by Dick Stuart and Roberto Clemente in the ninth broke a 6-6 tie between the Pirates and Cubs. Both homers came off loser Don Elston. Don Hoak also homered for Pittsburgh. Elroy Face picked up his ninth victory in relief of Vern Law.
