 Those Orioles must have planted a booby trap in Baltimore because it sure isn't a pitcher's paradise anymore.

Rival pitchers used to love to work in Baltimore. For one thing the ball park was bigger than all outdoors and for another, they never had to worry about being rapped for homers.

Certainly not by the supposedly weak-hitting Orioles, whose customary rallies used to consist of a walk, a Texas league single and a sacrifice fly. But things have changed — and how! The Orioles suddenly are gunning for the seats.

Big Gus Triandos reached them Thursday night with the bases full during a six-run rally in the eighth inning that snapped a tie and powered Baltimore to a 9-3 victory over Detroit.

Triandos' grand-slam homer, his second in five days and fifth of his career, moved the Orioles into sole possession of second place in the American league — only one game behind the idle first-place Yankees.

**Strikes Out 12**  
 Rookie Chuck Estrada gained his 14th victory against eight losses by allowing only five hits and striking out 12.

Washington moved back into fourth place with a 9-0 victory over Kansas City and Boston beat Cleveland, 10-7, in the only other AL game scheduled.

In the National league, the Cubs downed the Pirates, 2-1, and the Braves shaved Pittsburgh's lead to 6½ games with a 4-2 win over the Dodgers. The Giants defeated the Reds, 8-5, while the Phillies and Cardinals were idle.

The Senators won their game from the A's with an eight-run rally in the seventh inning during which 13 batters went to the plate. Winner Chuck Stobbs (9-5) and loser Don Larsen (1-9) were locked in a pitching duel,

with Washington leading, 1-0, when the roof fell in.

**Wertz Grand Slams**  
 Vic Wertz' grand-slam homer in a pinch hitting appearance and Ted Williams' two-run homer carried the Red Sox to their triumph over the Indians. Wertz' grand slam was his third of the year and 16th homer of the season.

Williams' homer was his 24th of the campaign and 518th of his career. Mike Fornieles (8-4) was the winner and Don Newcombe (1-3) the loser.

Glen Hobbie of the Cubs hurled a six-hitter against the Pirates and won his own game with a two-out homer in the ninth off Wilmer Mizell. The homer was the first of Hobbie's major league career and brought his season record to 13-16. Ernie Banks hit his

36th homer in the second inning.

Joeey Jay registered his fifth victory for the Braves although he needed Don McMahon's help in the ninth when the Dodgers scored both their runs and had the tying runs on base.

Willie Mays smashed an inside-the-park homer with the bases full to cap a seven-run second inning rally that clinched the Giants' victory over the Reds. Sam Jones, who struck out 11 but gave up 12 hits, evened his record at 14-14 although he needed Johnny Antonelli's help in the ninth.

# Mays Stars as SF Tames Reds

 San Francisco —UPI—The Baron of Candlestick Park is Sam Jones, who has won 12 games in the windswept stadium this season and lost only two.

Jones brought his year's record to an even 14-14 Thursday by staggering to an 8-7 triumph over the Cincinnati Reds, who would have won the game if the second inning had been omitted.

The Giants got seven of their runs in that frame, with Willie Mays hitting an inside-the-park grand slammer off rookie pitcher Claude Osteen.

Billy O'Dell (7-9), who defeated the Milwaukee Braves when he last faced them on the road, seeks to make it two in a row tonight when he faces masterful Warren Spahn, 15-7, in a left-handed duel.

Although he struck out 11 batters, Jones was well bounced around and gave up 12 hits, eight of them for extra bases. After Vada Pinson led off the ninth with a homer, Johnny Antonelli came to Jones' rescue and insured the triumph.

"I was feelin' pretty stiff out there," Jones said, "I had good stuff except when I threw three high curves which they hit."

Billy Martin, the Reds' storm-tossed second baseman, had a rough afternoon. Mays completed his circuit of the

bags in the second frame when Martin took the throw-in then back toward third base. Mays apparently tried to bluff Mays when the other way and Billy threw home too late.

In the third inning, Martin muffed a foul fly down the right field line by Willie Kirkland, who showed his gratitude by smashing a homer on the next pitch.

The Giants picked on Osteen, now 0-1, for the fourth and three walks during the

seven-run blast in g. Bases and Jones accounted for two loaded singles by Ed Bressoud runs before Mays hit one to right center that looked like a routine triple until Martin tried to hypnotize Willie.

Martin whacked Jones for a triple in the first inning and scored on Frank Robinson's double. Ed Bailey, who also hit a triple and a double, homered in the third frame to highlight a big day against Jones' slants.

# Chargers Well-Coached; Should Finish Near Top

 Los Angeles —UPI—The new American Football league is an unknown quantity but the Los Angeles Chargers should be well up in the standings at the end of the inaugural season.

On the basis of pre-season exhibition games, they look like a well-coached outfit. And there's a reason. In Sid Gillman, they've got a man with a driving determination to wipe out the stigma of his firing by the Los Angeles Rams of the National Football league last year after a 2-10 season. And they've got a score of NFL and Canadian league pro veterans — not all of them top-notchers to be sure, but at least they've had a few hard knocks.

Gillman concedes the AFL caliber of play won't be up to that of the established NFL in the first year, anyway. But that doesn't worry him. He looks for tough competition and feels that the Houston Oilers have personnel closest to NFL standards, with the Chargers not far behind.

**Builds Around Quarterback**  
 Like any pro coach, Gillman has had to build around a quarterback.

He's got two — Jack Kemp, former Occidental college star, and Bobby Clatterback. Both of them have kicked around (or been kicked around) in the NFL for a few years. In four NFL years, Kemp understooded such stars as Y. A. Tittle, Bobby Layne, Charlie Connerly and Tobin Rote. Clatterback watched the old master, Connerly, perform for the New York Giants for four years. So they know how it should be done.

Gillman is fat at fullback. He's got Howie Ferguson, a cruncher for Green Bay for six years. And he's got the prize rookie from Mississippi, Charlie Flowers, so they've got one win over the NFL.

**Has Veteran Scatback**  
 Veterans include scatback Ron Waller, who was a rookie of the year with the Rams, at

28, he's trying a comeback and it looks like he'll make it.

Gillman also has a fine pass-catching end in Royce Womble, who was with the Baltimore Colts for four years. And in Glenn Holtzman, the former Ram who stayed out of football last year and tried to make a living wrestling and movie-acting.

"Getting to know you" is the Charger theme song. "In our case," Gillman explains, "we have played together before. So when you're depending on a new passer and receivers he never met until he started practice, you have quite a problem."

Time should solve that problem, Gillman believes, and he believes, and adds, "we'll be a contender, and we may win our division."

San Francisco —UPI—The "bean ball" has no place in major league baseball and the current rash of "incidents" could easily be stopped, says Ty Cobb, who played some mighty rough baseball himself in his day.

"We didn't have the so-called bean-ball in my day," Cobb recalled while watching the San Francisco Giants play the Cincinnati Reds. "But the current problem easily could be stopped by having the commissioner or the league presidents just put a sign on the wall of each club-house.

"All the sign has to say is that players will be heavily fined if they throw at a batter. And the umpire is to make the report. That would stop them in a hurry."
