### Mobile Home Clinic Conducted in City

Medford was host to a one-day mobile home maintenance service clinic at the Medford armory Thursday.

So phenomenal has been the growth of the trailer coach manufacturing industry in the United States that production has jumped from 1,350 units valued at \$1,300,000 in 1930 to an estimated 165,000 coaches with a total value of \$909,000,000 in 1960.

These figures were revealed by Warren Jones, president of the Trailer Coach association, who was in Medford for the clinic.

"The trailer business is big business today — much bigger than commonly realized by the average citizen or business man," Jones said. The value of the nation's more than 15,000 trailer parks represents a total investment exceeding \$700,000,000, he said. "Some parks," he continued, "cost more than \$1 million to construct."

**West Is Leader**  
The west is a leader in all facets of the trailer business, according to Jones. One-third of all mobile homes built, he said, are produced in the 11 western states.

The mobile home population of Oregon is among the fastest growing in the western states, according to Jones. At present, Oregon has more than 450 trailer parks housing a mobile home population exceeding 50,000 persons.

In addition, he pointed out, many thousands of Oregonians are finding that the travel trailer provides an economical means for enjoying family vacations and outings.

Almost four million persons in the United States now live in mobile homes, Jones stated, with one million of these located in the western 11 states. "A statistic currently receiving much attention in building circles is that one out of every 10 housing starts in the United States is a mobile home," Jones said.

### Oregonians Generally Support More Federal Aid to Schools

Portland-Oregonians "feel strongly" about schools and how they are financed and generally support increased federal spending to aid education.

This is the conclusion reached in a recent public opinion survey conducted in Oregon by an independent polling agency for the legislative commission of the National Education association, in cooperation with the Oregon Education association.

Six out of 10 Oregon citizens participating in the survey felt the federal contribution to public education should be increased from the present amount. At present the relationship of spending to support education on a nationwide basis is: 54 cents locally, 42 cents from the state, and 4 cents from the federal government.

Fifty-four per cent of those polled felt this federal contribution was "too little," while only 3 per cent felt it was "too much."

The survey was conducted by John F. Kraft, Inc., between May 2 and May 14 this year. A total of 421 citizens, all of them of voting age, were interviewed by the firm in compiling the survey. These individuals were selected at random in counties in the state in proportion to the voting populations based on the 1958 presidential election. Results are statistically accurate within about 5 percentage points plus or minus.

Questions covered a wide range of topics in relation to federal aid and those interviewed were first asked to identify the major problems they felt faced Oregon education today. A clear plurality saw the top problem as overcrowding in the schools. Second was what the report termed "the teacher plight." This was defined to mean low teacher salaries and acute teacher shortage. Many listed overcrowding as the second major problem. Thus a majority of all those polled considered this Oregon's most vexing immediate concern.

### 41 Businesses Sign Up For B-E Program

A total of 41 business firms have so far signed up to participate in the third annual Business-Education Day, H. D. Christensen, chairman of the Medford Chamber of Commerce's educational committee, said today.

The 41 business firms requested a total of 269 teachers, he said, and added that business firms which have not yet indicated they will participate are asked to submit application blanks.

Christensen said there is a total of 361 teachers who will take part in the program in which educators tour business firms and discuss problems facing business operations with the firm representatives. The program this year involves a half a day with the schedule terminating at noon with a luncheon arranged by the business firm. The luncheon will offer management an opportunity to discuss with teachers the economics of free enterprise.

Business firms participating are expected to make the return visit Oct. 27, at which time business leaders will be guests of teachers to discuss Medford public school system and tour facilities.
