

Goldwater Describes Demo Platform as 'Manifesto'

Senator Speaks at Portland GOP Rally

Portland — (UPI) — Sen. Barry Goldwater, (R-Ariz.), compared Democratic and Republican national platforms in a stumping speech at a GOP rally here Sunday and called the Democratic platform the "manifesto from Los Angeles."

The flying senator, spokesman for the Republican conservative wing, accused Democrats of not having faith in American institutions. Going from the preamble to the defense plank Goldwater termed the abandonment of nuclear arms "stupid nonsense."

He said the Democrats suggest building up the military and "then talk abandonment of nuclear weapons."

In an address before some 22,000 persons who gathered on picnic benches and blankets spread on the ground, Goldwater advocated what he termed "the big stick" idea of keeping nuclear weapons to forestall Communist threats.

Goldwater said senators John Kennedy and Lyndon Johnson, Democratic presidential and vice presidential nominees did not have sufficient experience in confronting Communism.

But, Goldwater said, vice-president Nixon and his running mate on the GOP ticket, former UN Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge have had this experience.

He said the only issue in the coming election would be the one of freedom.

Goldwater said he would disagree with Nixon "only 5 per cent of the time." He also spoke out against a third party which might have him as its candidate.

He urged conservatives of both political parties to vote

Gains Shown in Special Issues

New York — (UPI) — Stocks moved narrowly today with the wider gains showing in special issues and some aircrafts and drugs.

Steels were depressed as the industry no longer looks for an order pickup in September as anticipated. U.S. Steel fell around a half, Youngstown a point, and Bethlehem a small fraction.

Peter Gunnar, state GOP chairman who introduced Goldwater, said the Republican party "has always been conservative. We should be more conservative." He said Democrats had distorted the word "conservative" to give it a meaning of "Neanderthal reaction."

Cardinals Will Attend Funeral

Philadelphia — (UPI) — Funeral services for John Cardinal O'Hara, archbishop of Philadelphia and a spiritual leader of more than a million Roman Catholics who died Sunday, will be attended by four American cardinals.

Cardinal O'Hara was elevated to his post by Pope John XXIII Nov. 26, 1958. The cardinal died in Misericordia hospital at the age of 72 after a long illness. He underwent an abdominal operation a year ago and had been ill since then.

A spokesman for the archdiocese said the funeral probably will be Sept. 5, Labor day. Cardinal O'Hara's body will lie in state in the cathedral beginning Thursday.

The four cardinals expected to attend the funeral are Francis Cardinal Spellman of New York, Richard Cardinal Cushing of Boston, James Francis Cardinal McIntyre of Los Angeles, and Albert Cardinal Meyer of Chicago.

Nixon, Kennedy To Sign 'Fair Practices Code'

Washington — (UPI) — Rival presidential candidates Richard M. Nixon and John F. Kennedy will meet here Wednesday to sign a "fair campaign practices code."

The code has been endorsed by leaders of both parties. Drawn up by the Fair Campaign Practices committee, the code embodies seven points and pledges the candidates to:

- Present their records and policies "with sincerity and frankness, and criticizing without fear of favor" the record and policies of their opponents "which merit such criticism."
- Swear to "defend and uphold the right of every qualified American voter to full

and equal participation in the electoral process."

"—Condemn the use of campaign material of any sort which misrepresents, distorts, or otherwise falsifies the facts regarding any candidate..."

— Denounce "the use of malicious or unfounded accusations against any candidate which aim at creating or exploiting doubts, without justification, as to his loyalty or patriotism."

— Condemn "any appeal to prejudice based on race, creed or national origin."

— Decry any practice "which tends to corrupt or undermine our American system of free elections..." and to "immediately and publicly repudiate support" from any individual or group in behalf of their candidacy that subscribes to any of the practices condemned in the pledge.

Forestry Officials Convene in Seattle

Seattle — (UPI) — Foresters from 70 countries gathered here today for the formal opening of the fifth World Forestry Congress, and the largest international get-together of forestry talent ever assembled anywhere.

About 2,000 delegates to the 13-day congress poured onto the campus of the University of Washington to take part in the meeting sponsored by the Food and Agricultural Organization of the United Nations.

Most of the 700 foreign delegates arrived aboard buses in the forest lands of the West Coast and northeastern United States.

Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson was scheduled to make the opening address shortly after the congress convenes this afternoon.

More than 100 members of the club also voted to change the name of the organization to the Booker T. Washington Political club.

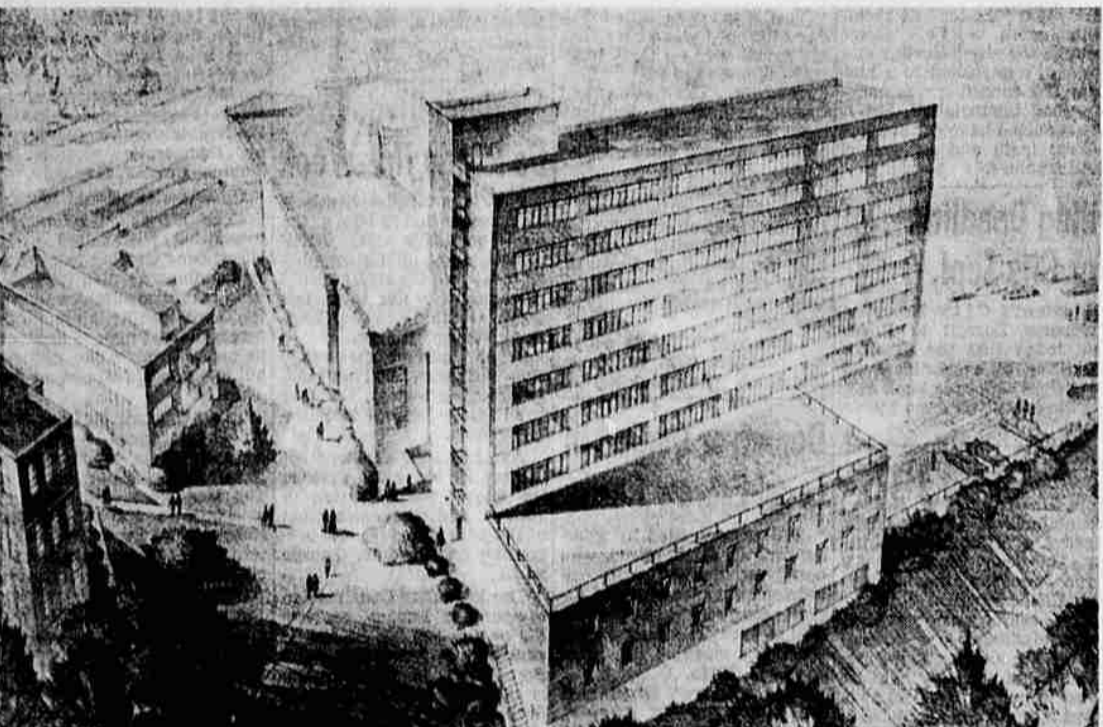
Arthur Palmer, president of the Negro organization, said the change of names was authorized "because the club does not feel that all good men can be of one party."

'Ole Earl' Hospitalized After Victory

Alexandria, La. — (UPI) — Congressman-elect Earl K. Long, restored to political life after defeating incumbent Rep. Harold B. McSween, remained hospitalized today with bronchial trouble and a "touch of ptomaine."

Long, unsurpassed in Louisiana politics for getting across to "country-folk," surprised political observers with a 6,000-vote victory over McSween. The two had engaged in a bitter name-calling campaign in a fight for Louisiana's eighth Congressional seat.

The ailing ex-governor, weary from his campaign and recurring coughing fits, was brought here Saturday. He

was expected to remain in bed several days.

Long, by far the most controversial governor in Louisiana history, tallied more than 40,000 votes to some 34,000 for McSween. It was a bitter battle all the way.

Long hurled charges of criminality and malfeasance at McSween and gave away thousands of dollars worth of groceries and foodstuffs at his rallies.

McSween, not to be outdone, countered with threats of arrest of the cantankerous Long and he made gibes about Long's wild tour of mental hospitals last summer and his occasional escapades with strippers since then.

Long's victory assures him of the Congressional seat because he had no Republican opposition.
