## About 800 Attend 4-H Style Revue, Fair Awards Ceremony

Approximately 800 people from all over Jackson county attended the 4-H Style Revue and fair awards ceremonies in the National Guard armory south of Medford Friday night.

To cut the program down to two hours no banquet was given during the annual event this year.

Attractive 4-H girls modeled the latest styles in 4-H clothing projects — both sports and formal wear they had made themselves — then returned to the stage to receive trophies, ribbons and cash awards for their showmanship with livestock.

First award presented was the Glitzen and Glitzen special presented for the first time last year by Drs. G. A. and G. N. Glitzen, local veterinarians — \$25 to a deserving 4-H club member exhibiting sheep and swine at the Jackson County 4-H and FFA fair.

This money is to be applied

toward the purchase price of purebred gilt for the pig club member and a purebred ewe lamb for the sheep club member. The breed is to be decided by the club member and the purchase to be approved by the County 4-H Agent Glenn Klein.

Tom Winniingham was this year's winner for sheep and Charles Logan for swine, both of Ruch.

Terry Gail, Gold Hill, received the George Nichols' trophy for the outstanding lamb exhibitor.

The Rogue River Jersey Cattle club award of a show halter went to Jerry Moore, Eagle Point, as the exhibitor of a champion registered Jersey.

## Wall Street Chatter

New York —(UPI)—The Value Line investment survey said today that stocks are more likely to go down than up during the next twelve months.

It admits that investors are in a dilemma because while stocks are overpriced relative to past standards, and yields are too low, especially compared with bonds, nevertheless less brokers' loans are quite low, trading volume is not speculative, and inflation looks as if it is here to stay.

Value Line feels, however, that while conditions have changed, it is also true that "new era" philosophy as stated by both party platforms has always preceded a sharp break in security prices at previous bull market tops.

Reynolds and Co. says that U.S. Rubber offers "good statistical value." Sales this year should exceed \$1 billion for the first time in history and earnings show a rise to around \$5.50 a share from \$5.30 in 1965. Future prospects are favorable for both tires and chemicals, Reynolds says.

Bache and Co. finds it interesting that Lorillard set a new 1966 high on a day of irregular market action last week. The performance reinforces the stock's sound technical position and suggests further upward progress, Bache said.

## Finch Defenders Swing Into Action

Los Angeles —(UPI)—Attorneys for Dr. R. Bernard Finch and Carole Tregoff begin today to try to disprove state charges that the couple murdered the wealthy surgeon's wife.

The murder retrial of Finch, 43, and his mistress, Carole, 23, moved into its 10th week with defense attorneys Grant Cooper and Don Bringgold making their opening statements to the jury of 11 women and 1 man.

Finch was expected to begin his testimony Tuesday, to be followed sometime later by Carole. The attorneys said they expected the jury to begin deliberations the first week of October.

Cooper's job remained much the same as in the first trial when he tried to convince a jury that Barbara Jean Finch, 33, was accidentally shot outside her \$65,000 suburban home July 18.

## Way Cleared for Vote on Tax Levy

Salem —(UPI)—The Marion county court cleared the way for a vote at the November general election on a \$375,000 tax levy for a new county juvenile detention home.

The state board of control previously agreed to sell the county land near the present county health department building for the proposed new structure.

Voters in 1954 defeated a similar measure.
