Democrats Urged To Emphasize Name of Party

Washington - UPI - Advice has gone out to Democratic leaders to keep emphasizing the name of their party in this year's campaign on grounds it projects a more popular image than the name "Republican."
"The Democratic party is much more popular than the GOP," a memorandum to party officials said. "Hence the word 'Democrat' enhances a candidate's popularity, while the word 'Republican' has the reverse effect."
The memo said "the effects of such words have been demonstrated in communications experiments."
George Belknap, polling director for the Democratic National committee, sent the memo to committee members and other party functionaries. Belknap's document said "an overlooked fact" about the Aug. 17 Gallup Poll which gave Vice President Richard M. Nixon a 50 to 44 per cent edge over Democratic presidential nominee John F. Kennedy "was the omission of the words 'Democratic' and 'Republican' from the questions."
The memo maintained that Nixon's percentage was inflated because the word "Republican" was not attached to his name and Kennedy was not identified as a Democrat.
Dismissing this titular neglect as "not very important," Belknap said "it may even help prevent overconfidence on our part."
"However, it does remind us of the positive effect of the use of the words 'Democrat' and 'Democratic' both in polls and in campaigning," he said.

Small Worlds Around Us

Attractiveness of This Sea Turtle Is Leading To Its Extinction
Unmarked, unknown and almost unnoticed, the next to the last, long wave crest is already built up and racing toward some fatal shore; on its crest ride the pitifully few survivors of the handsomest, as well as the very smallest of all sea turtles - the little Hawksbill.
This diminutive sea turtle pays a severe price for possessing the most beautiful shell of all the turtle clan. The Hawksbill is the one we so often see mounted, and hung on a wall. Because its gorgeous shell is adaptable to bending, shaping and fashioning, it is used in the manufacture of a wide assortment of hair combs and numerous ornaments.
Because of the beauty of this material, it lends itself well to jewel boxes, napkin holders and fancy hair ornaments as well as many other objects for which people will pay money.
13 Plates
The shell of the Hawksbill turtle is composed of 13 plates of various sizes; these plates overlap like the shingles on a roof, or like the scales of a fish. Each plate is highly colored, with various shades of brown and tan, with delicate black markings. It has a peculiar smoky appearance and the lustre and polish of fine old pottery.
Once removed from the turtle, the plates are subjected to heat which renders them almost as flexible as heavy rubber. While still warm from immersion in hot water, the plate can be molded, or shaped into any desired position; when cooled it will hold the assumed shape. It also can be

Oakland, Calif. - UPI - A barber who left \$15,487 in a New York hotel room said Tuesday he had found what Diogenes was unable to find in a lifetime of searching-"an honest man."
But the fact is Maxim Radin, 60, found two honest men, and two honest children.
Radin sold his home in Oakland some time ago and took a train to New York, where he arrived Aug. 21. He checked into the Hotel Ashley just off Times Square, carrying two battered suitcases and an old linen valise.
Radin told hotel employees he was returning to his native Yugoslavia "to die." He was to sail aboard the Italian liner Vulcania for Trieste, but the ship sailed without him Aug. 23 and he was no longer seen around the hotel.
Room Rented Again
Hotel employees put the two suitcases in storage, hoping nothing had happened to the kindly old man. Monday, Radin's room was rented to Mr. and Mrs. James H. Labadie, vacationing in New York from Winnetka, Ill.
The Labadie's two children were playing in the room later when they found the linen valise under the bed. They turned it over to their father, who called in another honest man, hotel manager Michael Funk.
Funk opened the valise for one of the surprises of his life. In it were Radin's unused ticket, his passport, and cashier's checks totalling \$11,067, thirty-three \$20 gold pieces, and \$3,800 in folding money.
