Prosecution To Rest Case In Murder Trial

San Diego, Calif. —UPI— The prosecution in the trial of three California youths accused in the rat-pack slaying of a Portland marine last month said here Tuesday that it would probably rest its case today.

Two Oceanside, Calif., police officers testified in the trial of Aristide G. Torres, Jr., 18, and Jimmy M. Cruz, 20, both of Oceanside, and Fred Zavala, 19, a Camp Pendleton, Calif., Marine, Tuesday.

The three are accused of slaying Marine Pvt. Dennis Virgil Parker on July 3 at Oceanside.

In their testimony, the police officers said that they questioned the three youths after the slaying and that the youths at first denied participating in the attack but later admitted being in the fight.

An Oceanside woman testified that she found the hunting knife which was used to stab Parker on her lawn.

Oceanside police have said that Torres admitted stabbing Parker seven times while Cruz and Zavala held the Portlander on the ground.

HISTORY MADE — Communications history was made Aug. 12 when a message taped by President Eisenhower was sent coast-to-coast via an artificial earth satellite. As shown in this artist's sketch, the message was sent from Jet Propulsion Laboratory (at left) in California. The high frequency microwaves bounced off the 100-foot diameter satellite 1,000 miles above the earth, and were received at the Bell Telephone Laboratories at Holmdel, N.J. The space communications experiment, known as Project Echo, is a joint venture of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, Bell Telephone Laboratories and Jet Propulsion Laboratory. Since the first message was sent, two way telephone conversations have been successfully relayed via the Echo satellite between New Jersey and California.

Corvallis Couple Killed In Wreck

Sweet Home —UPI— David Lewis Powell, 30, and his wife, Betty Jean, 38, of Corvallis, were killed in a two-vehicle accident 19 miles east of here Tuesday on U.S. Highway 20.

State police said the Powell car struck an unloaded truck

head-on while it was attempting to pass another vehicle on a curve. Driver of the truck, Charles Howard Knight, Crawfordville, suffered only minor injuries.

The Powells, apparently killed instantly, were trapped in the demolished car for about an hour.

Three Vehicles Are Involved In Mishap

Three vehicles were involved in an accident on Highway 99 at the Bear Creek Orchard intersection yesterday afternoon, state police said.

Cars involved were operated by Leslie Earl Manners, 65, of 1308 East Main st., Medford, who was waiting to enter the northbound lane;

George Keith Butts, 39, of 309 South Columbus ave., Medford, who was behind Manners' vehicle and attempting to pull into the northbound lane; and Roland Alan Olsen, 17, of 198 Cloverlane, Medford, who was going north on Highway 99.

Police said Butts pulled into the northbound lane in the path of the Olsen car, and the impact knocked the Butts vehicle into Manners' car.

Butts was advised that a complaint would be filed against him for failure to yield the right of way.

Electric Energy Consumption High

Salem —UPI— A continued rise in the average consumption of electric energy by customers of Oregon's five privately owned utilities was indicated by public utility commissioner statistics revealed Tuesday.

Customers used an average of 8,819 kilowatt hours last year compared to 8,279 in 1958 and 8,139 in 1957. The average for the United States was 3,585 in 1959.

Oral Vaccine To Give 99 Per Cent Immunization

San Francisco —UPI— The recently approved Sabin oral vaccine for polio will provide 99 per cent immunization against the disease, according to the director of medical care of the National Foundation.

Dr. William S. Clark arrived here Tuesday for conferences to determine "a sensible approach" to distributing the newest weapon in the battle against the paralyzing disease.

Clark said the vaccine, an oral live virus preparation which can be taken in pill or liquid form, would probably be ready for national use by mid-1961.

The vaccine was developed by Dr. Albert Sabin under a \$1 million grant from the National Foundation. Field tests, such as those employed during the introduction of Salk vaccine several years ago, will not be necessary since 60 million Russians already have used the Sabin vaccine.

Sabin vaccine produces an infection in the patient, although he is unaware of it and feels nothing. Once the infection occurs and antibodies are set up, the patient has immunization for life.
