German Ends Yankee Domination In Sprint; Thomas Jump Leader

Rome—(UPI)—John Thomas of Boston University, the world record holder and favorite in the Olympic high jump, was eliminated at 7 feet 1 inch tonight, leaving victory to be fought over by two Russians, Valerie Brumel and Robert Shavlakadze, who had cleared the height.

Rome—(UPI)—Germany's Armin Hary ended America's 28-year domination of the Olympic 100-meter dash today by defeating three Yankee speedsters in the final of the event.

Dave Sime of Durham, N.C., was second, almost nipping Hary at the tape. The bull-shouldered, blond German took the lead from the blocks and led all the way. Sime came fast on the inside lane, however, and almost snatched victory from Hary in a desperate lunge at the ribbon.

Equals Own Record
Hary's time was 10.2 seconds, equalling his own Olympic record set Wednesday.

The German's stunning effort cost the United States the Olympic 100-meter title for the first time since Canada's Percy Williams won the dash in 1928.

Reception Corps Girls Expelled

erful Soviet squad broke the Olympic record in the women's javelin final with a toss of 183 feet, 8 inches, and Irena Press, a Russian girl, won the final of the 80-meter hurdles.

United States hopes also suffered a damaging blow in the semi-finals of the 800-meter event when Tom Murphy, Brooklyn, one of the favorites, was eliminated.

In the other 800-meter semi-final, Jerry Siebert, Willits, Calif., finished fourth and Ernie Cunniff, Claremont, Calif., was sixth. That shut the Yanks out of Friday's final.

The U.S. moved closer to another gold medal in women's track when a pair of Tennessee girls, Wilma Rudolph of Clarksville and Barbara Jones of Nashville, sped into Friday's semifinals of the 100-meter dash.

Dellinger Eliminated

Rome—(UPI)—Oregon's Bill Dellinger was eliminated Wednesday from the 5,000-meter event as he finished fourth place in his heat. Dellinger was timed in 14:08.8.

Four heats were run with the first three in each heat qualifying for the finals.

Harry Jerome, a University of Oregon sprinter, who is competing for the Canadian Olympic squad, ran the 100 meters in 10.5 seconds, to place first in his heat.

Jerome, who recently equalled the world record of 10 seconds flat in the event, had been fearful he had lost his competitive edge from lack of racing.

Fire Danger Closes Area To Archers

Klamath Falls—(UPI)—Archers opening their deer season here Saturday will not be permitted entry on approximately one-fourth of the Green springs management unit because of extreme fire danger, according to George Wardell, district warden for the Klamath Forest Protection Association.

Wardell said the closure will affect the section running from the Klamath River to Jenny Creek, and from the California line to the Buck Lake region.

Portland—(UPI)—Salmon fishing continues fair to good off the Oregon coast when weather permits boats to get out, the State Game Commission said today.

Dove shooting, which opened today, should be excellent in northeast Oregon and good in southwest Oregon. But many doves have moved out of southern Wasco and Jefferson counties.

Recent rains have improved hunting conditions for opening week end or archery season and controlled deer season in northeast Oregon. Conditions are fairly good for archery season in the Deschutes area.

The fishing report by regions includes:
Southwest: Fall salmon not yet in the upper Umpqua; summer steelhead improved; all fishing ends in the North Umpqua above Steamboat next Tuesday, Sept. 6; Winchester Bay salmon angling good; crabbing excellent from Umpqua jetty; lower Rogue fairly good for salmon but steelhead fishing still slow; trout fishing improving in headwater streams of Rogue system; due to anticipated complete draining of Hyatt reservoir emergency action has been taken to relax bag limits for all fish in the reservoir extending through Sept. 30.

The United States also made good progress in the men's platform diving competition and the men's 200-meter butterfly.

Despite scoring in five events on Wednesday, the U.S. lost ground to first-place Russia in the unofficial team race. Russia led with 165½ points and the United States was second with 110.

Australians grabbed two of the gold medals on Wednesday's program, Murray Rose winning the 400-meter freestyle championship and Dave Theille the 100-meter backstroke. Rose set an Olympic record of 4:18.3 and Theille was clocked in 1:01.9 in winning the backstroke race for the second straight time.

Frank McKinney of Indianapolis finished second to Theille and Bob Bennett of Encino, Calif., was third. In the 400-meter freestyle, the best American finish was fifth place by Alan Somers of Indiana.

Charlie Dumas of the University of Southern California, 1956 Olympic champion Joe Faust, 17, Occidental College student from Los Angeles, also qualified for the finals.
