Tuesday's low qualifiers in all three divisions of the Southern Oregon Golf championships at Rogue Valley Country club here saw their scores stand up for medal honors against Wednesday's day long challenge of qualifying rounds.

Medalists in the 32nd annual tourney over the Labor day holidays on the Medford links are Ron Mitchell, ex-Chico State collegian, Marvin Clark, Grants Pass, and Mrs. Helen Davies, of the host Rogue Valley club.

Mitchell, Chico, Calif., led the men's division plus the entire field of 409 qualifiers with an even par 72. Clark, also an RVCC member, paced senior men. The 1957 and 1958 Southern Oregon winner in his class stroked a 75 on Tuesday. Mrs. Davies, seven times champ here, shot a 79, three in excess of ladies' par.

Match play in the tournament began today for participants in most of the flights. Contestants in the women's fourth and sixth flights and men's second, third and fourth flights, however, rested today and have their tussles Friday.

The tourney continues through Monday, Sept. 5, when women's and regular men's championship finalists go 36 holes and finalists in all other flights go 18.

Scores generally ran high in qualifying play, belying one of the strongest fields in the history of the greens and fairways classic. Most entrants ran into trouble with the fast Rogue Valley greens. Excluding three players who utilized scores fired Monday at a Portland links, just 13 players stroked 76 or under. Four of 17 men's division players who shot 82s gained the championship flight by draw. The 64-spot men's titular field includes nine divoters who qualified with 80s and 11 who had 81 cards.

Steve Schroeder, RVCC, had a 73 on Tuesday.

Prothro Undaunted By Tough Schedule

Corvallis, Ore.—(UPI)—Coach Tommy Prothro of Oregon State, possessor of the finest coaching record on the West Coast for the past five years, faces one of the toughest schedules in the country this fall.

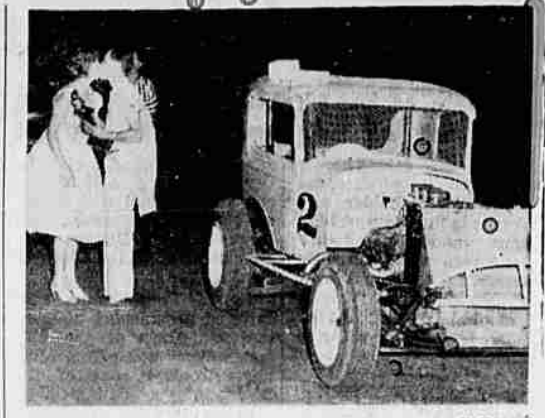
