Property Tax Rates Will Be Lower for Many Residents

The property tax rates for more than two-thirds of the people in Jackson county will be lower during fiscal year 1960-61, according to the Jackson county assessor's office.

Individual property tax statements will be mailed by Oct. 15. Tax bills are due Nov. 15.

A decrease in property tax millage is listed in 49 code districts in the county, while increased levies are listed in 19 code districts. In three code districts there is no property tax change.

A code district is an area in the county in which property taxes are levied for various services. One code district, for example will include taxes for a city and school district only, while another code district will include taxes for a school district, water district, rural fire protection, sanitary sewage service or other special assessments.

Largest Decrease
The largest decrease is in code district 22-4, part of the former Talent school district. The property tax bill in that particular code district is down 18 mills, or 19.90 per cent, from 1959-60. The millage decreased from 90.2 mills in fiscal year 1959-60 to 70.3 this year.

The largest increase in property tax levies is in the Evans Valley school code district, where the millage increased 13.2 mills from 1959-60's 38.6 mills to 1960-61's 51.8 mills. The increase is largely due to Evans Valley school district paying tuition for high school students to attend another district.

Levies in three cities, Jacksonville, Gold Hill and Rogue River, increased this fiscal year. The other Jackson county cities have reduced levies.

Radioactive Debris Noted by Doctors

Washington (Science Service)—The radioactive debris from the test explosion of an atomic bomb by the French government in the Sahara desert is being noted by doctors in the U.S. Armed Forces research laboratories and scientists at several points.

The atomic debris from the French nuclear test explosion in an easterly direction throughout the world before it was blown through analysis of air samples taken at several stations along the 20th meridian.

The atomic debris first on Feb. 13 made France the fourth nation to join the nuclear weapons club, the exclusive group to which only the U.S., Russia and Great Britain formerly belonged.

The Sahara explosion brought to reality one long-dreaded nightmare of scientific and diplomatic experts—the predicted possession of nuclear weapons by other than the three great powers. Since shortly after World War II, this has been considered the "N" number one unknown.

Dr. R. L. Patterson, Jr. and L. B. Locking, Jr. of the U.S. Naval Research Laboratory were found from their air filter analysis that the radioactive debris from the French nuclear test spread from a few degrees south of the equator to 18 1/2 above 25 degrees north latitude by the time it reached the 80th meridian.

The second atomic test, which was much smaller, was not detected at the 80th meridian stations, they reported in the current Science, Journal of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. The stations are located at Miraflores in the Panama Canal zone, San Juan, Puerto Rico, Miami, Fla., and Guayaquil, Ecuador.

Ike's Stand On Price Supports Rapped In House

Washington—House investigators have attacked an unworkable Eisenhower administration stand that the way to reduce farm surpluses is to cut price supports and raise production controls.

They called on the Agriculture Department Wednesday to re-examine its price support and production adjustment policies.

The investigators declared the department's preference for storing surplus grain in government warehouses has cost "millions of dollars."

The charges were contained in two reports from the House Government Operations committee.

The committee said "reducing support prices has not reduced production." Price supports without production controls, it said, "are an invitation to unlimited production for government storage."

The committee said CCC's other report the Commodity Credit Corporation "arbitrarily uses commercial facilities in preference to government owned facilities even if such use is obviously wasteful and inefficient."

In a statement issued immediately after the report was made public, acting Agriculture Secretary True D. Morse said the report contained little that had not already been considered by CCC officials and had been the subject of congressional debate.

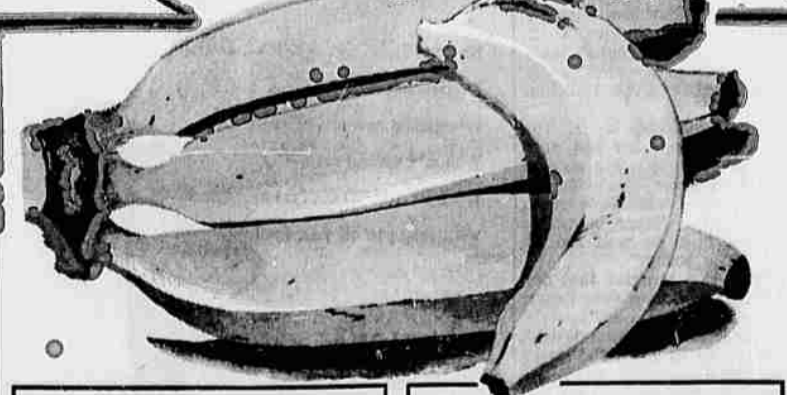
