Davis Heads U.S. Sweep In Hurdles

Rome - (UPI) - Ralph Boston, Laurel, Miss., broke the Olympic broad jump record today with a leap of 26 feet, 7 3/4 inches. The old mark of 25 feet 5 3/4 inches was set by Jesse Owens in 1936.

Rome - (UPI) - Defending champion Glenn Davis, 25, led a 1-2-3 United States sweep in the finals of the 400-meter hurdles and Bob Webster led a 1-2 U.S. sweep in the finals of high diving today to lead American athletes in their Olympic Games comeback battle.

Wilma Rueo of Tennessee State gained the third U.S. gold medal of the day when she won the women's 100-meter dash by coming from behind.

The three gold medals gave the United States a total of 10 in the games against 12 for Russia. The victory spurge also cut the U.S. deficit in the unofficial team race from 67 1/2 points down to 27 1/2 although Russia led with 23 1/2 points to 197 for the United States.

Sets New Record
Davis was timed in 49.3 seconds, an Olympic record and only one-tenth of a second slower than his own world record, as he defeated teammate Cliff Cushman of Kansas University by a stride.

Dick Howard, Albuquerque, N.M., finished third, Davis broke the Olympic mark of 50.1 seconds.

Miss Rueo won the 100-meter final in 11 seconds flat. America's Harold Connolly and Russia's Vasily Rudenkov were staging a record-breaking duel in the hammer throw.

Webster, 21, University of Michigan student, paced a 1-2 U.S. sweep in the high dive with a top score of 165.5 points. It was America's eighth gold medal of the Olympics and seventh in swimming.

Gary Tobian, the Olympic springboard diving champion from Glendale, Calif., who led the field in the high diving qualifying in a bid for a double, had to settle for a silver medal for second place with 165.25 points—just missing despite a brilliant effort on his last dive.

Connolly shattered his own mark in the hammer throw with a heave of 206 feet, 8 3/4 inches to lead the way in qualifying trials.

However, Connolly's record was immediately broken by Russia's Vasily Rudenkov with a heave of 219 feet, 10 1/2 inches. The big Russian, who defeated Connolly in the U.S.-Russian meet at Philadelphia last year, thus set the stage for a dramatic duel in this afternoon's finals.

Try To Bounce Back
It was an auspicious opening for Americans determined to bounce back from a "black Thursday" on which high jump star John Thomas was beaten by two Russians and the United States lost the 100-meter dash for the first time in 32 years.

Connolly, the school teacher from Santa Monica, Calif., who took up weight tossing as a youth to build up a

withered arm, easily qualified for the afternoon finals as he surpassed the Olympic mark of 201 feet, 3 3/4 inches which he set at Melbourne in 1956.

A little earlier, Earlene Brown, the 230-pound rock-and-roll housewife from Los Angeles, began the track and field day for the United States by qualifying for the finals in the women's shot put with a heave of 52 feet, 11 3/4 inches.

The beefy Mrs. Brown, perhaps the hottest dancing fan on the U.S. Olympic team, displayed astounding nonchalance in the shot put trials.

She didn't even bother to strip off her sweat suit as the greatest women shot putters in the world gathered in the sprawling Olympic stadium under a cloudy sky. A sparse crowd of less than 5,000 was scattered through the concrete oval to watch qualification rounds in the ladies shot put and the broad jump, plus first heats in the 200 meters.

With a mark of 47-0 3/4 necessary to qualify for the afternoon finals, the 25-year-old Mrs. Brown pitched the iron ball 52-11 3/4 to make her way into the finals convincingly.

Boston Qualifies
World broad jump champion Ralph Boston, who recently broke Jesse Owens' 25-year-old record, sent his leap body hurtling 24-11 1/4 to qualify in the broad jump on his first effort.

Stone Johnson of Dallas, Tex., won his heat in the first round of the 200 meters in an eased up 21.7 seconds. The 20-year-old Grambling College student led all the way and finished five yards on top as he loafed through the tape.

Ray Norton, the Oakland, Calif., flyer who was the favorite in the 100 meter dash and wound up a disappointing sixth in the finals, won his heat ahead of Great Britain's David Jones in 21.2 seconds. Les Carney of Akron, Ohio, won his heat in 21.1 seconds to advance to the second round also.

However, the first record of the day fell to a Japanese, 21-year-old Tiyoshi Yamana, who won his heat in the men's 1,900 meter freestyle swim in 17:46.5 to eclipse the Olympic mark of 17:52.9 set by George Breen of Cortland, N.Y., in 1956.

Also in swimming the U.S. women's 400-meter freestyle team won its trial heat in 4:18.9 to qualify for Saturday's finals. Members of the team were Donna De Varona of Lafayette, Calif., only 13 years old, Susan Doerr of Washington Valley, Pa., Sylvia Ruuska of Berkeley, Calif., and Molly Botkin of Sherman Oaks, Calif.

Americans Need Miracle
Defending champion Breen qualified for the 1,500 meter freestyle finals when he easily won his heat in 17:55.9, and Alan Somers of Indianapolis, Ind., qualified by winning his heat in 17:54.1.

But only a miracle—and the miracles in this XVII Olympiad are not being performed by Americans—seems capable of vaulting them back into serious contention with

Spiegelberg Discusses MH Outlook

A good number of fans who have watched the Medford high football squad in drills are highly optimistic about the Black Tornado's fortunes in 1960.

But, Head Coach Fred Spiegelberg made this plea in a talk to Medford Kiwanis club on Wednesday: "Don't expect us to have the team we had last year."

Spiegelberg discussed the squad and the teams the Tornado will meet. He reported that his club will scrimmage this Saturday.

The backs are the strong point of the Tornado, the mentor said, adding that the question is the line. Spiegelberg pointed out that his club won't have the size of the 1960 edition but that there is speed in the line. He reported Chuck Shaw, tackle at 195, the biggest man.

The Tornado tutor mentioned a competitive drill devised to decide whom game starters will be and reported spirited battles for positions on the club.

Medford will platoon as much as possible, Spiegelberg said. The coaching staff will try to play a lot of boys, he stated. This is a means of building for the future.

"Don't think Arcata is going to be a breather," Spiegelberg warned in discussing Medford's foe of the season (here Sept. 9). He said that the California school has an enrollment of 1,000 and that there are reports Arcata is building for the Black Tornado.

Marshfield (here Sept. 16), according to the word received, will have a bigger line than 1960 but lacks depth.

Three other foes, South Salem, Crater and Klamath Falls, will be better than last year, in Spiegelberg's estimation. He stated that Salem will have the same speed as last season and mentioned "young kids" at Crater. There is an apparent upsurge in football at Klamath Falls where last year a Medford-type athletic program was put in effect through the school system. "I hear they've been practicing all summer," said the coach with a twinkle in his eye. Concerning Ashland, which has a new coach, Stan Smith, Spiegelberg remarked, "I know they'll give us some trouble."

Medford finishes its regular season against Grants Pass, which in recent years has been its strongest challenger for conference honors. Ron, Nev., and Red Bluff, Calif., like Arcata this year to the Medford slate this year, were listed as unknowns.

Rome - (UPI) - Wine, women and song were blamed by one official today for the wave of dismal performances by the U.S. track and field team in the Olympic Games.

"You can't win golf medals when you're not in condition," the official said, "and you don't get into condition sitting up half the night drinking wine."

Bluntly, the official charged that "the boys have been living it up too high."

"It's an open secret that the coaches and managers have lost control of the team," asserted the official, who demanded anonymity.

"Just the other night I got back to the village at 2 o'clock in the morning. A taxi with about six members of the track team came in right behind me."

"I think it's time we stopped blaming the judges and the starting gun and looked facts in the face. Many of our men are out of training. They stay out too late. You don't catch any Russians out dancing after 10."

Denver Has Defensive Weakness

Denver - (UPI) - Late summer trades indicate the Denver Broncos have a serious weakness in the middle of the defensive line which they hope to plug before embarking on their first professional football season.

Head Coach Frank Filchook picked up Bill Korutz, a 250-pound center who has pro experience with the San Francisco 49ers; tackle John Hitley, a 280-pounder, and 290-pound Gordon Holz, a tackle from the Canadian league in recent deals. He hopes to correct a defensive weakness in the middle of the line, revealed in exhibition games of the new American Football league.

Filchook also feels other main weaknesses—which he intends to correct—include lack of experienced linebackers and depth at defensive half-back and safety.

But Filchook, who gained his coaching spurs in Canadian professional football, is convinced his offensive unit will be a potent force with veteran professional quarterbacks Frank Tripucka and Tom Dubinski to lead the attack. George Herring, formerly of Mississippi Southern, will back up this duo and handle punting.

"With three good quarterbacks like Herring, Tripucka and Dubinski you can figure on us going to the air a great deal of the time," Filchook said. "I've always believed in having a club with good all-around speed and that's what we've stressed in our recruiting. Our offensive line will be as quick as any in the league, and just as tough."

The Broncos will use a variation of the winged-T formation with a double fullback system. Either end will split, utilizing the halfbacks as flankers. The accent will be on short swing or flare passes.

Filchook is counting on an offensive backfield of J. W. (Red) Brodnax of Louisiana State and Dave Rolle of Oklahoma at fullbacks and Henry Bell, Gene Mingo, Al Carmichael and Bob McNamara at halfbacks.

Duilio Loi Nabs Title
Milan, Italy - (UPI) - A third and deciding "rubber match" was being considered today by Duilio Loi of Italy, who won the world junior welterweight championship from Puerto Rican Carlos Ortiz of New York on a split decision in their return fight here Thursday night.

A record Italian boxing crowd, estimated at nearly 70,000, saw Loi of Milan turn the tables on Ortiz, who had won a similar split decision over the European welterweight champion at San Francisco two months ago. Referee E. Esparraguera of Spain favored Loi on points, 72-69. Judge H. Avruschenko of Switzerland agreed, 74-73. But Judge R. de Baker of Belgium gave each boxer 72 points.

Net Meet Underway
Forest Hills, N.Y. - (UPI) - The national tennis championships begin today on the grass courts of the West Side Club, with fiery Maria Bueno of Brazil slated to start her defense of the United States Women's singles title in the opening match.

It's the first time our national singles tourney got underway with foreigners on both thrones. Southpaw Neale Fraser of Australia begins his defense of the men's title Saturday.

Burleson, Elliott In Same 1,500 Heat

Rome - (UPI) - University of Oregon's Dyrrol Burleson today drew the same qualifying heat as world mile champion Herb Elliott of Australia for Saturday's 1,500 meters Olympic competition.

The top three finishers in each of the three qualifying heats will gain a spot in Tuesday's 1,500 meters final.

Also running in the Burleson-Elliott heat will be Stefan Lewandowski, Poland; Olavi Salonen, Finland, and Istvan

Rosavolgyi, Hungary. Jim Grelle, a graduate of the University of Oregon, was put in the second heat with competition that included Sweden's Dan Waern, Roger Moens of Belgium and East Germany's Siegfried Valentini.

The other U.S. entry in the 1,500 meters, Peter Close, former St. John's of New York star, was placed in the third heat with favorites Merv Lincoln of Australia, Olavi Vuorisalo of Finland and Hungary's Lajos Kovas.

Everything New in Grid Sport This Year at Cal

Berkeley, Calif. - (UPI) - Everything's new at California this year - and if the traditional "new broom sweeps clean" technique holds true, the Golden Bears could have quite a season.

The new athletic director is Pete Newell; new head football coach is Marvin Levy; and there will be a brand-new quarterback on the field.

Also, the guards and centers will be mostly inexperienced. There isn't a single letter winner among the quarterbacks.

"I can't predict how we will do in any game," says coach Levy. "We do have experienced ball-packing backs and our ends look solid. But we are inexperienced the rest of the way."

Levy is a graduate of Coe college; his line coach is John Neumann of Springfield; the freshman coach is Lou Culen, New Mexico; Rocco Carzo, Delaware.

Gold to Call Signals
Off his showing in spring practice and as a freshman, Randy Gold, a towering 6-3, 195-pounder from Ontario, Calif., will be the quarterback. Gold is a good passer and signal caller. But he certainly lacks the experience to bring home a big winner.

The halfbacks are strong: Billy Arnold, 205; Jerry Scat-

lini, 195; Bob Wills, 185, and Jack Yerman, 185. Yerman is a 400-meter man now with the Olympic team in Rome.

The fullback will be Walt Arnold, 215-pounder who is both a fine runner and great blocker, as well as linebacker.

Ends Are Lettermen
There are four lettermen for the end posts, headed by stringers Tom Bates and Dave George. The others are Jerry Lundgren and Gael Barsoli.

And the tackles look fair with Norm McLean, 210; Roland Lasher, 205; Jeff Snow, 200, former guard; Andy Segale, 210, former center, and Ted Dinkler, 210 - all lettermen.

But Doug Graham, a 205-pound junior, is the only letterman at the guard post; and Dave Maggard, 220, another junior, is the only man with any experience at center.

However, Dick Carlson, a non-letter winner last year, is expected to play at least half the time at center; and Roger Stull, 200, up from the frosh squad, is expected to be the other guard opposite Graham.

SKATERS SIGN
Portland - (UPI) - General Manager Harry Glickman said that two more players have signed contracts with the Portland Hockey club they are Gordon Fashaway and Arlo Goodwin, both left wingers of experience in the Western Hockey league. The Portland Buckaroos now have five players under contract.

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
