Roseburg's Mayor Won't Run Again

Roseburg - (UPI) - Arlo Jacklin, who was mayor of Roseburg in its most troubled time, said Thursday he would not seek re-election to the post.

Jacklin was mayor Aug. 7 last year when a truck load of explosives blew up, killing 13 persons and causing millions of dollars in damage. Jacklin has been mayor of the southern Oregon lumber town since 1957. He was elected to the two-year term as an unopposed candidate in 1958 and defeated James Doyle for re-election in 1958. City Council President Pete Serafin became the first announced candidate for the position Wednesday.

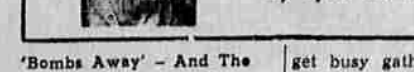

Small Worlds Around Us

'Bombs Away' - And The Gulls Have Flesh to Eat
Man is not alone in enjoying the foods of the sea. Oysters, scallops, clams and many other shell fish were eaten by sea gulls since the very first birds took to the air in free flight. However, the opening of the shells must have presented a problem, and it was solved by the gulls a very long time ago.
In comparison with the oyster or other easily procurable shellfish, the scallop has a comparatively fragile shell. The shell serves its owner well, as it is easy to move over the grass flats and gives a fair measure of protection to the soft-bodied creature that lives within it.
The greatest numbers of this mollusk and their zigzag swimming through the water would attract a gull's attention while it was overhead. It would swoop down and grab the creature. And it does. When the scallops are "running" or moving as they do over the grass beds, the gulls get busy gathering the harvest. Somewhere back in the early dawn of bird life, the sea gull learned how delicious the scallop really is, even when raw and fresh from the shell.
Frustrating Shells
Back in the very beginning, before the technique was learned, the gulls must have been pretty frustrated, as they cocked their heads from side to side trying to figure out how to get the meat out of the shell. They must have tossed the shells in the air many times, probably because they were angry or exasperated. Then one day a shell accidentally hit against a stone, the shell broke open and the hungry gull gobbled down the living flesh.
That ancient gull must have associated the securing of the flesh with the hard object that ruptured the hard shell. Either he or others that observed the miracle tried again with the same result. The shell could be broken; the meat secured. The gull family was on the threshold of a great discovery. It may have been many long periods of time before the habit was formed, but "necessity being the mother of invention" the birds, driven by an appetite for mollusk flesh, persisted.
It took entire flocks, working over a period of time, but they found the answer. They began carrying the mollusks aloft and dropping them on rocks, then swooping down to gobble the exposed flesh.
The following generations of gulls have acquired an uncanny accuracy dropping the shells on rocks or hard ground. The modern gull even developed a new slant; no longer does it have to hunt up a rock; now they use concrete highways. Even those gulls that developed a "bomb-sight" expertise need not aim so long or so fine for a highway pavement is miles long and wider than a rock.
It is a very enlightening instinct that associated the hard pavement with the hard rock of their ancestors. Somewhere along the evolution of bird behavior, the sea gulls acquired something strongly resembling intelligence. If "necessity is the mother of invention," appetite must be the "father."

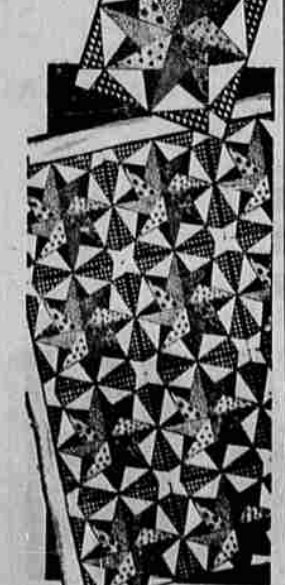
