Diameter—2 to 6 feet. Sometimes more.
Height—100 to 200 feet.
Bark—Dark Gray-Brown. Deeply furrowed. O.
Needles—1/2 inch long. borne all around twig. Soft to touch.
Cones—Pendant, 3 inches long with three-pointed bract protruding from top.
Seed—1/4 inch long. Seed crops every year.
Range—Entire Western Pine Region.
