Wichita, Kan. (UPI)—Drain's Black Sox continued unbeaten in the National Baseball Congress tournament here Friday night with a 7-1 victory over Greenville, Tenn.

The defeat was the first of the double-elimination tourney by Greenville.

Drain, who defeated the Tennessee club in the five-hit pitching of University of Southern California right-hander Jim Withers, faced Ponchacoula, La., the only other undefeated team in the 32-team tournament, Saturday evening.

Withers, who won his second game of the meet, limited Greenville to five hits and was backed by a 13-hit attack. He struck out 11 and walked two.

Pappas Blanks Yankees 5-0 On Three Hits

Milt Pappas is what you call a real "stopper"—he not only stopped the New York Yankees but also his own boss, Paul Richards.

Pappas, a strapping, uninhibited 21-year-old, accomplished both feats Friday night when he pitched the Baltimore Orioles into a virtual tie for the American league lead with a magnificent three-hit 5-0 victory over the Yankees.

The right-hander struck out nine and didn't walk a man en route to his 13th victory. Tony Kubek opened the game with a single off him and Pappas then retired the next 18 men in order before Curtis Boyer connected for a harmless single with one out in the seventh.

A pennant-hungry crowd of 44,518 in Baltimore watched the Orioles climb within three percentage points of the Yanks by reeling off their fifth straight victory and ninth in the last 10 games. Loser Whitey Ford, who worked five innings, was nicked for six of Baltimore's eight hits, including a homer by Walt Dropp.

When it was all over, the jubilant Pappas made a bee-line for Richards.

"Do you want me to do some running tonight?" Pappas inquired.

The question stopped Richards. "Yeah," he grinned. "We'll keep the lights on especially for you."

It was a bit of a private joke between the two.

The bouncy Baltimore Orioles, led by Jack Fisher's seven-hit pitching and the slugging of Brooks Robinson, took over first place in the American league Saturday by handing the New York Yankees their third straight shut-out defeat, 2-0.

The victory was the sixth in a row and the 10th in the last 11 games for the Orioles, who took a full-game advantage over the stumbling Yankees. New York has not scored a run now in 29 consecutive innings.

Fisher, another 21-year-old member of Manager Paul Richards' "Kiddie Korps," was complete master of the Yankees. All the New York hits were singles and Fisher did not permit more than one in any inning until the ninth when Mickey Mantle and Bill Skowron singled in succession with one out.

However, Fisher calmly retired Yogi Berra on an infield grounder and got Elston Howard on a routine fly.

Robinson, who had three of the Orioles' 11 hits off starter and loser Art Dittmar and reliever Luis Arroyo, dove in the first run in the fifth with a single following one-basers by Jackie Brandt and Gene Woodling.

In the eighth, Robinson cracked his 12th homer of the year into the left field seats for an insurance tally.

Fisher, although not as sharp as Milt Pappas, who three-hit the Yankees Friday night, nevertheless retired 12 straight men over the middle three innings. He walked but one and fanned two.

The Chicago White Sox kept pace with Baltimore by whipping the Detroit Tigers 4-1, behind the seven-hit pitching of Early Wynn. The White Sox, who are three games behind the Orioles, scored all their runs in the first inning with the big blow being a two-run triple by Minnie Miñoso. Wynn is now 11-9 while Frank Lary, who went all the way for Detroit, took his 14th loss against 11 victories.

Brewer Beats Senators

Vic Wertz hit a three-run homer and Frank Malzone a solo blast as Tom Brewer and the Boston Red Sox defeated Washington, 5-3. Brewer gave up 10 hits, including a home run to Dan Dobbek, but went all the way for his ninth victory against 11 defeats. Truman Cleveland took the loss for the Senators and is now 5-10.

Cepeda Leads Giants to Win

San Francisco (UPI)—Big bat Orlando Cepeda's thanks to Orlando Cepeda's big bat and Bill O'Dell's stout heart, the San Francisco Giants gained a 4-3 victory over Los Angeles Friday in their drive to capture fourth place from the Dodgers.

Johnny Podres, the ace of the Dodger wrong-armers, incurred his 11th defeat Friday night while Jack Stanford posted his 12th win of the year before a wind-whipped crowd of 20,738.

San Francisco hopped on Podres for three runs in the first inning with Cepeda crashing his 23rd homer with Felipe Alou aboard just after the Caribbean star had doubled home Willie Mays.

Sanford began to fade in the eighth and gave up three straight hits and a run without retiring a man. Then lefty O'Dell stalked in with men on first and third. Norm Larker hit into a fielder's choice which tallied Willis and Alou made a diving catch of a fly to left by Tom Davis for the second out. Frank Howard was retired on a high pop fly to second baseman Joe Amalfitano to end the threat.

Northwest Gas Drags Scheduled

Final plans are being formulated for next week end's fourth annual Northwest Gas Championship drag races sponsored by Southern Oregon Timing Association.

In addition to the Saturday and Sunday races being held at the White City drag strip other features include a Friday evening parade through Medford and Ashland and a car show Saturday evening. Site of the car show will be Skimmers used car lot on South Riverside ave.

More than 200 of the top drag racing contestants in the Northwest will be present for the races according to SOTA officials. For man ydrag enthusiasts this marks the last big meet of the season.

One of the featured entries will be the Fox-McComb acceleration machine from Pomona, Calif. At last report owners were undecided whether they would bring their "A" Modified rear-engine roadster or a sleek 170 mile-per-hour dragster. In July at Reno, Nev., they entered the low-slung Chrysler engine roadster in both one-half and one-fourth mile events at the combination meet co-sponsored by Southern Oregon Timing association.

Fox Won at Reno
Driver Jim Fox gunned the powerful entry past all competition to win top honors at the meet and emerge top eliminator. During time trials he drove the roadster to a top speed of 184 miles per hour through the one-half mile clocks, a scant three miles per hour off the world record for one-half mile acceleration in this class.

In Medford Jim Fox and crew will attempt to better the present strip fuel record of 160.87 mph, held by the Glass Slipper from Sacramento, Calif. The Slipper set the mark at last year's Northwest Championship meet.

In addition to the Pomona entry a host of other top-notch competition drag machines from Oregon, California, Nevada, Idaho and Utah will be present, gunning for top honors. Some \$1,500 in cash and trophies will go to the winners.

Special awards will be made for best club participation, most beautiful car entered, and hard luck.

Time trials will be held all day Saturday and early Sunday morning. Stock car eliminations will be staged at 10 a.m. Sunday morning with other eliminations at 1 p.m. Deadline for stock entries is 9 a.m. Sunday and deadline for all other entries is noon on Sunday.

Milwaukee Edges Reds 10-9; McCormick Gives SF 1-0 Win

Lew Burdette's four-inning scoreless relief stint, after Milwaukee had squandered a seven-run lead, enabled the Braves to defeat the Cincinnati Reds, 10-9, in 12 innings Saturday and move within 5½ games of league-leading Pittsburgh.

Burdette, who won his 16th game of the season, came on in the ninth inning after Milwaukee had scored a run to tie the game at 9-9 and blanked the Reds the rest of the way on only one hit.

Joe Adcock's pop fly single to center field, his fourth hit of the game, scored Del Crandall.

Whittle Margin

But in the bottom of the seventh the Reds whittled the margin to 8-6, scoring five runs on a base-loaded homer by Vada Pinson and a solo belt by Gus Bell.

The Reds continued their assault upon Brave relief hurler Jack McMahon in the eighth inning, scoring three runs on four hits, including doubles by Eddie Kasko and Roy McMillan, to take a 9-8 lead.

Milwaukee, winning its fourth straight, collected 16 hits off five Cincinnati pitchers. Hank Aaron worked Red hurlers for five of the 10 walks issued.

Rookie right hander Art Mahaffey sustained his perfect major league pitching record with his fifth triumph when the Philadelphia Phillies defeated the Pittsburgh Pirates, 3-2. Tony Taylor led the Phils' attack with four singles, driving in one run and scoring another. Vernon Law, bidding to become the first 20-game winner in the majors this season, was tagged with his sixth defeat and hand an eight-game winning streak shattered.

Alou Homers

Felipe Alou's seventh home run and Mike McCormick's six-hit pitching performance gave the San Francisco Giants a 1-0 victory over the Los Angeles Dodgers. Alou saved McCormick's 12th decision when he grabbed Tom Davis' sinking line drive with two on and one out in the eighth inning. Sandy Koufax lost his 12th game.

Carl Sawatski and Ken Boyer hit homers to back Ernie Broglio's three hits as the St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Chicago Cubs, 4-0, in a night game. Broglio, who struck out seven, won his 17th game and did not allow a Cub runner to reach second base. Glenn Hobbie took the setback, his 17th of the year.

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
