"For heaven's sake, why does everyone get married in late August?" someone asked the society editor last week. Well, we haven't made any surveys, or gathered statistics, but we have two answers. One is that since the wave of student marriages which started about the time of World War II, students tend to set their wedding dates for late summer just in time for a brief honeymoon before they enroll for the fall term. The second is money - it takes so much money to stage a wedding, the prospective bride and bridegroom - particularly if they are either high school or college students, take a job for a couple of months and tuck away some money to help with wedding expenses.

Whatever the reason, the society department of The Mail Tribune - and probably those of many other papers, wishes that it wasn't true that weddings occur in bunches in June, August and around the holidays. Whenever the subject is mentioned by those about to be married, we beg them to pick a "slack time" - say the last week in January or the last week in July, to be married. Then the society editor and her staff aren't so busy and have more time - and space in the section - to handle weddings. Of course, the day will never come when a couple about to be married takes such a reason as newspaper coverage into consideration, so our wishes won't change the wedding cycle to January and July.

When Joyce Gillinsky walked down the aisle at First Methodist church the night of her wedding to Robert Glover, she and her brother, who gave her in marriage, both were smiling with satisfaction. It took a lot of planning - and the business of keeping the wedding guests waiting almost half an hour, to manage this walk down the aisle together. For Wilson Gillinsky is at Ft. Ord for Army training, and because of Army routine and plane schedules, couldn't get into Medford until 7 p.m. the night of the wedding. He hurried off the plane and rushed to a waiting car and directly to the church. The wedding over, Wilson snatched a few hours sleep and before 6 a.m. the next day was back out at the airport, waiting to board a southbound plane to return to Ft. Ord. Truly a "flying trip."

Wedding receptions are always the time for serving special delicacies, as well as the traditional cake and punch. Mrs. Robert Lull, who made an elaborate cake to be served at the wedding of Carol Horsley to Robert Gilmore, also made little pink and white sugar bells to decorate the cake and for guests to put in their tea and coffee. Mrs. Lull, who used 14 packages of cake mix for the huge cake and heaven knows how much sugar and other ingredients for the frosting and decorations, described how she makes the fragile little sugar bells. She described it so well Potpourri will never try her hand at it. It's too much work. Mrs. Lull also had a word of caution - don't try to freeze such confections. She did, and they just melted away to nothing.

Making these delicate little sweets and decorations has become the rage in the Rogue valley and many women now offer to do this for friends as their "labor of love" for big parties and such events as weddings and anniversaries.

The home extension program is open to all women. It is an educational program under the direction of the United States Department of Agriculture, Oregon State college and Jackson county. Several units meet in the evening so that women who are employed may also take advantage of the lessons. Information concerning attendance at any unit may be had by calling the Jackson county home extension department at the courthouse.
