10 Rescued After 22 Hours in Gulf of Mexico

Carrabelle, Fla.—(UPI)—Eight chivalrous men and two young boys spent 22 hours in the Gulf of Mexico when their fishing boat sank but they were rescued unharmed late Sunday.

The skipper of the fishing craft turned the boat's one raft over to the seven men and two youngsters who had set out with him for some gulf fishing. He took his chances in the water with a hatch cover.

The other men established the boys on the raft and got into the water, hanging to the sides of the rubber craft. The fishing party rented a boat at Shell Point, Fla., and put out into the Gulf Saturday for a Labor Day weekend of fishing. But 20 miles out the boat sprang a leak and abruptly sank.

Thomas Vickers of Shell Point, captain of the commercial fishing craft, turned over the boat's only raft to his clients—seven men and two boys—and he cast off alone, clinging to the top of a hatch.

The fishermen turned the raft over to the boys, Douglas Boggs, 10, of East Point, Ga., near Atlanta, and Ken Elliott, 11, of Jonesboro, Ga. The men stayed in the water, hanging to the raft most of the time, from 6:15 p.m. Saturday until 4:30 p.m. Sunday when they were rescued, none the worse for their ordeal.

The party included Thomas Boggs and K. L. Elliott, fathers of the two boys; J. B. Beck, Jonesboro; B. P. Roberts, C. P. Barber, L. W. Hawkins, and T. L. House, all of Atlanta.

Vickers was the first to be rescued. He was picked up by the "B.B.," a private yacht owned by Leon Langston of St. Marks, Fla. The "Sandy," a fishing vessel out of Carrabelle, found the others.
