Broadway Star Tom Ewell To Have Own Show on TV

Hollywood — (UPI) — Invasion of TV by movie stars has become commonplace, but when a Broadway star hooks onto a video series something new has been added.

Tom Ewell, star of such 'legit' plays as "Thurber Carnival," "John Loves Mary," and "Tunnel of Love," makes his debut this fall in . . . yep, "The Tom Ewell Show."

Is this a comedown in the backstage social standing for Tom?

"No," says mild-mannered Ewell.

"I took the series because it was the best thing offered me. If I thought I was demeaning myself by going from Broadway to television I wouldn't have accepted the part."

Ewell's CBS show is a situation comedy based on a man trying to live with five women — his wife, mother-in-law and three daughters.

"It's tough getting along with one woman," he observed.

"Like every other actor I was offered about a dozen other series. A good show is determined by the writers, and this one has two of the best."

"Madelyn Martin and Bob Carroll Jr., who wrote the 'I Love Lucy' programs, are put-

ting my show together. It's difficult to come up with a new approach in comedy, but Bob and Madelyn can do it."

"Now about my feelings toward TV. Show business is overloaded with actors. I'm lucky to be working in all three mediums. In addition to the theater I've made 14 movies."

Type Casting Fear

"You rarely meet a performer interested in working who expresses a patronizing attitude toward TV. Performers are mainly afraid of being type cast in TV because it's a mass medium."

"Actually, it is not a good idea to stay in any one medium too long — even the Broadway stage. It is too easy to acquire bad habits that way. A change in mediums requires new techniques."

Tom stroked his ski-nose thoughtfully. "Another thing, I'm in show business to make a living. That's why I perform on Broadway as well as in television."
