

Mitchell, Prall Crash in SO Golf Finale

Butler Plays Swan; Davies, Siegmund Contend for Title

Medalist Ron Mitchell and defending champ Bob Prall were adversaries today in the finals for the men's division of the Southern Oregon Golf championships at Rogue Valley Country club.

Miss Shirley Siegmund opposed Mrs. Helen Davies for the women's division prize and Larry Butler went out against Ralph Swan this afternoon for the senior men's title trophy.

All six repulsed rivals in Sunday semifinals, Prall and Mitchell advanced after morning quarterfinal play.

Prall, real estate man from Salem, drubbed Richard Hiller, McMinville school teacher, 6 and 5, after tripping young Tom Shaw, Rose City, Portland, 2 and 1 in the morning round. Mitchell, assistant Chico, Calif., city engineer, turned back Stew Schroeder, Rogue Valley and Oregon State college player 2 and 1 in the afternoon encounter after nicking Bob Atkinson, Portland Golf club, thrice Southern Oregon winner, 1 up in a quarterfinal tilt.

Ladies Semifinals

Mrs. Davies, Medford, in the finals for the ninth time and shooting for an eighth diadem, beat Mrs. Tom Harrison, Waverley, Portland, 2 and 1 in a Sunday ladies' semifinal. Miss Siegmund, Eugene, won from Miss Linda Anderson, Olympia, Wash., on the 19th hole.

Butler, Medford, the RVCC senior champion, won 6 and 5 yesterday over Cy Harbeck, San Francisco. Swan, Royal Oaks, Vancouver, Wash., was 5 and 3 victor over M. L. Hallmark, Roseburg.

Men's and women's finalists in the championship flights have scheduled 36-hole engagements on this holiday. They opened play this morning. Butler and Swan were to tee off at 1:30 p.m. in their 18-hole titular tangle. Other afternoon 18 starting times today are 2 p.m. for Davies and

Two Over Par

Shirley and her foe each were two over par for 18 with Miss Siegmund two over on the front nine and even on the back and Linda four over on the out run and two under par coming in. The Eugene player won No. 2 and No. 5 for 2 up edge, lost No. 8 but took No. 9. They traded 10 and 11.

Mrs. Davies was two up on her Waverley adversary after nine holes. She won 10, and lost 11 but was 3 up again after grabbing No. 13. Mrs. Harrison took 14 with a bird and 15 with a par. Helen made it dormie with a par which took No. 16 and the match was over on a halve on 17.

Butler, against Harbeck, was one over course regulation. He had a four-hole spread after nine greens. The Southern Oregon college professor then won 12 and 13, taking the latter hole with a birdie sidehill putt. Swan was three over par on the front lap held 1 up margin at that stage. He played even par on the back side.

Mitchell yesterday morning came into No. 18 even with Atkinson and finished with a 10-foot bird putt. His Portland opponent had gone into the trap on No. 2 shot blasted out across the green on the third hit and gone back into the trap on his fourth swat. Atkinson was out nicely on his fifth stroke but it was too late.

Better Putting

Ron was three over par and Atkinson four above. The Californian had a 1 up lead at the turn but Atkinson birdied 11 and 12 to go 1 up, himself. Mitchell regained the lead with pars on 13 and 14. The Portland player evened the tilt with a par on 17. Mitchell did the better putting in the scrap. While Atkinson hit 13 greens, he three-putted on five.

Schroeder played well on the out stretch against Allen. He was subpar by one stroke to get a 3 up margin. However, he was five over coming in with three bogies and a double bogey. Allen won on 11 and 12 and Schroeder 14. After Allen claimed 15, Schroeder captured 17 to halt the match.

Prall concluded against Shaw, University of Oregon player, with a 30-putt for a birdie on 17. He was one under par over the distance and even par and 3 up at the turn.

Putting made the difference for Hiller against Odell, the RVCC men's club champion. Hiller, runner-up this summer for the Portland city banner, played about even par and Odell was two or three over. The McMinville man had a great pitch out of the trees on No. 15.

On 15 Ron won with a birdie two on a 12-foot curling putt. Both parred on No. 16. Stew hit trees off the tee shot and went into the rough. But, he recovered neatly and, like Mitchell, hit the green on his second shot.

Prall had little trouble in his afternoon brush. He was one under par and 5 up after nine holes. Hiller, a tourney dorkhorse, faltered and was six over course standard. The defender took four straight holes on the front lap, Nos. 4, 5 and 6 with pars and No. 7 with his first of two birdies on the out nine. Both had birds on par 4 No. 8. Hiller three-putted on Nos. 5, 6 and 7.

6 Up After 10

The Salemite had a 6 up after taking the 10th hole with a par. Hiller nabbed No. 11 when he made a short putt and Prall missed a shortie after a bad break on a 17-footer. Prall went 6 up again with a two-foot putt for a par on No. 12.

The McMinville player won only one hole other than 11. He copped No. 3 with a par to even the tieff after losing No. 2 with a bogey.

Mrs. Davies, the RVCC ladies champ, after her first SO togs since 1953, was two over par and had a couple of three up gaps over Mrs. Harrison, 1959 Northwest amateur runner-up.

Miss Siegmund, Oregon coast finalist this year, won the extra hole on an infraction by her rival. Miss Anderson, Northwest amateur semifinalist, illegally picked up her ball on the apron. She called the penalty on herself after she was short by seven feet on a putt on her fourth stroke and Miss Siegmund had rimmed the cup putting on her fifth shot. A ball may be picked

up for cleaning only on the green.

Lee Calhoun Leader Of Sweep in Hurdles

Rome — UPI — U.S. Olympic President Kenneth L. (Tug) Wilson held "court" today to determine the facts behind charges some U.S. athletes have been more interested in "wine, women and song" than in winning gold medals.

Rome — UPI — Slender Lee Calhoun led a 1-2-3 United States sweep in the finals of the men's 110-meter high hurdles and long-legged William Rudolph completed a rare "double" by winning the 200-meter dash today as U.S. track and field stars sparkled in the Olympic Games.

In other brilliant performances under gloomy skies, Otis Davis, Los Angeles, smashed the Olympic record in the semi-finals of the men's 400-meter dash with a clocking of 45.6 seconds and world champion Rafer Johnson, Kingsburg, Calif., took over the decathlon lead after three events.

A crowd of 44,000, turning out despite intermittent showers, watched Calhoun, Gary, Ind., retain the high hurdle title he won in 1956 at Melbourne in a photo finish. He and runner-up Willie May, Chicago, both were timed in 13.8 seconds while Hayes Jones, Pontiac, Mich., completed the sweep by nosing out Germany's Martin Lauer for third place.

Miss Rudolph won the women's 200-meter final just as she won the 100-meter final last week — by a late surge of power.

Miss Rudolph, a 20-year-old Tennessee State star, was off her blocks with the rest of the field and was held even around the turn and into the head of the stretch. But there, her long legs churning desperately she left them all behind and tore down the brick-red straightaway to what actually was an easy victory.

Miss Rudolph was clocked in 24 seconds flat — eight-tenths of a second over the Olympic record she set in the trial heats.

Bragg Qualities

Another U.S. favorite, Don (Tarzan) Bragg, Pennsville, N.J., easily qualified for the finals in the pole vault, but Ron Morris, Burbank, Calif., made it only on a technicality and Dave Clark, Dallas, Tex., was eliminated.

In another U.S. disappointment, defending champion Olga Fikotova Connolly, Santa Monica, Calif., failed to qualify for the finals in the women's discus, just as her husband, favored Hank Connolly, had failed to qualify in the men's hammer throw. Mrs. Connolly won the 1956 women's discus as a member of the Czech team.

Johnson, who had been trailing through the first two events of the decathlon, went to the front on the third when he put the shot 51 feet, 10 1/4 inches for 976 points and a point total of 2,830. However, Johnson was running well behind his own pace for the first three events when he set the world record of 8,683 points.

C. K. Yang, Taiwan, (Formosa) who had been leading, dropped to second when he put the shot 46-3 for 780 points and a 2,764 total. Former world record holder Vasily Kuznetsov of Russia had a toss of 47-5 1/4 for 817 points and 2,460.

Breaks Record

Davis, a University of Oregon graduate, had tied the existing Olympic mark of 45.9 seconds in an earlier heat but this time wiped it out completely as he stormed home

four yards ahead of M. Singh of India in his semi-final heat.

Earl Young of San Fernando, Calif., also qualified for the finals by finishing third in the second semi-final in 46.1.

However, Jack Yerman, Woodland, Calif., was eliminated when he finished sixth and last in that semi-final in 48.9. Carl Kaufman of Germany, the heat winner, also was under the old record with 45.7.

Johnson was running second to C. K. Yang of Formosa after the first two events of the decathlon, in which he holds the world record.

Yang, 27-year-old UCLA student, got the lead in the opening 100-meter dash with a 1:07.7 clocking good for 1,034 points and then added 950 points in the broad jump with a leap of 24 feet, 5 1/4 inches to run his total to 1,984 points.

Johnson, the former UCLA star, scored 948 points with a 10.9 sprint jump for 906 points and a broad jump of 24 feet, 1 1/4 inches that gave him a total of 1,854 points.

Vasily Kuznetsov leaped 22-10 for 773 points and a 1,643 total. The other Yanks fell far off the pace as Phil Mulkey, Memphis, Tenn., broad jumped 22-6 1/4 for 746 points and a 1,483 total while Dave Edstrom, Sherwood, Ore., leaped only 20-1 1/4 for 610 points and a 1,378 total.

The first five events of the decathlon and 14 gold medal events highlighted the 12th day of the Olympiad. Ten of the day's championships to be decided were in boxing.

Kuznetsov's time for the 100-meter race was 11.1 for a total of 870 points.

Dave Edstrom of Sherwood, Ore., and Philip Mulkey of Memphis, Tenn., each ran the 100 meters in 11.4. Edstrom

received 768 points and Mulkey 737 in the complicated decathlon scoring system.

As the 12th day of the Olympiad began, Russia had a total of 331 1/2 points in the unofficial team standings compared to the United States' second-place total of 292.

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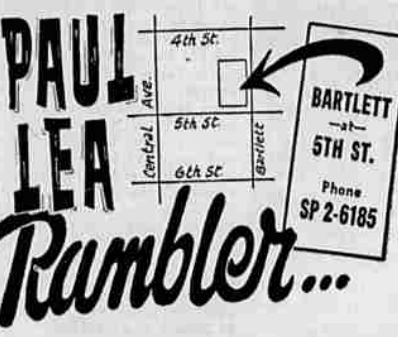
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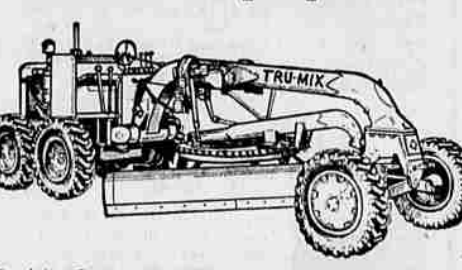
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
