Oregon Farms Total 21,583,784 Acres

Portland —(UPI)—The Department of Commerce announced Tuesday that the 1959 census of agriculture showed Oregon had 42,573 farms for a total of 21,583,784 acres.

The census revealed the average size of the farms as 507 acres and average value of the farms \$41,684.

Of Oregon's farm operators, 31,360 owned their farms, 7,900 owned part of the land and rented additional acreage and 3,056 were tenant farmers.

President to Speak On Closed Circuit Show for Volunteers

President Eisenhower will speak today directly to thousands of United Community Campaign volunteers, including campaign leaders of Ashland, Grants Pass, and Medford in a nation-wide closed circuit television program arranged by United Community Campaigns of America and presented through the facilities of the CBS television network.

Area leaders will be the guests of KBES-TV to view President Eisenhower and other personalities on the special program carried on the closed-circuit. Time for the show, which was tape recorded in Washington, New York and Hollywood, is 4 o'clock this afternoon.

Campaign volunteers will hear prominent leaders in government, labor, business and entertainment support and help promote this fall's 2,200 local campaigns.

Among the program participants will be Oliver G. Wilts, national chairman, United Community Campaigns of America, and chairman of the board, Campbell Soup company; and Irving A. Duffy, president, United Community Funds and Councils of America, and vice president-body group, Ford Motor company.

Host for Telecast

Host for the telecast will be John S. Hayes, chairman of the public relations advisory council of the national association, and president of the Washington Post Broadcast division.

Others appearing, all of whom are volunteer vice chairmen of the national promotion effort in behalf of United Fund and Community Chest campaigns, are:

Secretary of Defense Thomas S. Gates, Jr., President George Meany of the AFL-CIO; William E. Robinson, chairman of the board, the Coca-Cola company; and Howard Gray, advertising manager, R. J. Reynolds Tobacco company.

Another person supporting the United Way campaigns will be that of Chairman Frederick W. Ford of the Federal Communications Commission.

From Hollywood, special dramatic and musical presentations will be offered by actor George Murphy and actresses Jane Russell and Jan Clayton. Murphy is a member of UCFC west coast committee, and Jane Russell and Jan Clayton are vice chairmen of UCC.

From now until Thanksgiving the nation's United Community Campaigns will be seeking funds in support of 28,000 local, state and national voluntary health and welfare agencies. Last fall more than \$455 million was contributed to these campaigns, the largest voluntary fund raising effort in the world, to provide vital health and welfare services for 81,300,000 Americans.

Campaigns in Ashland, Grants Pass and Medford will all officially begin on Sept. 19.

Officers were combing through the telephone book, looking up variations of Mark's pronunciation of Wiederhold, when his parents arrived to report him lost.

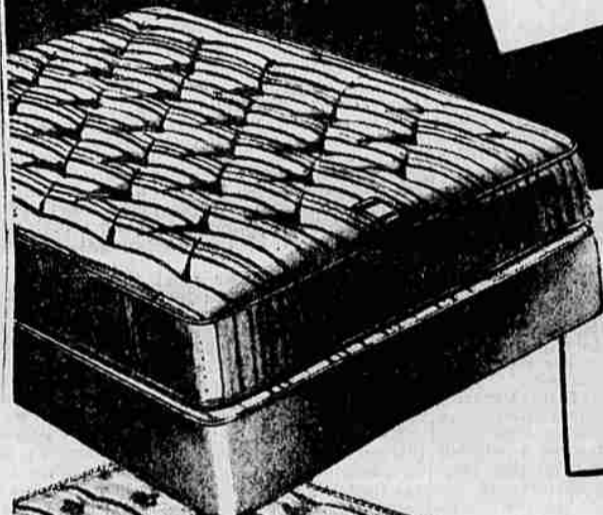

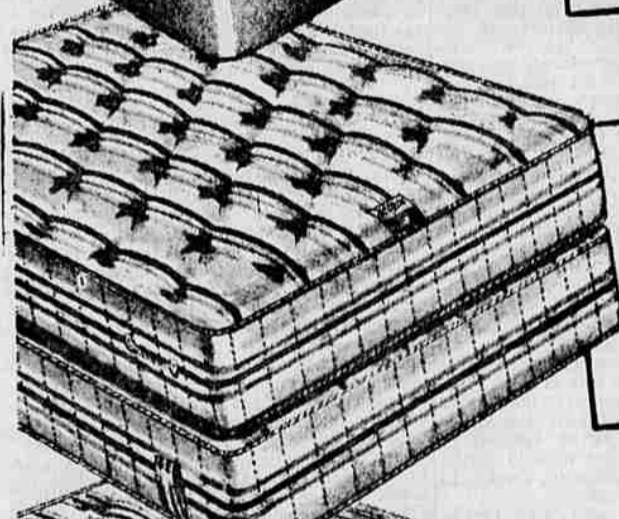
