Rudolph Anchors Yank Relay Team To Olympic Triumph; Johnson Victor in Decathlon

By LEO H. PETERSEN UPI Sports Editor Rome - (UPI) - Anchored by double gold medal winner Wilma Rudolph, the United States women's 400-meter relay team sprinted to a world record of 44.4 seconds today in winning its opening Olympic heat before a crowd of 30,000.

Martha Hudson of McRae, Ga., ran the opening leg and was head and head for the lead. Then Barbara Jones of Nashville, took the second leg and Lucinda Williams, also of Nashville, turned the baton over to Miss Rudolph in a dead heat for the lead.

Portland - The Erv Lind Florists of Portland captured both ends of the split Northwest Women's Major Softball league season but for the first time in four years the Portlanders failed to nab the league batting crown in the process.

A strong finish by Bremerton's outstanding pitcher-outfielder Myrtle Pierce edged the season-long leader, Vancouver's Shirley Topley, by four percentage points. Pierce hit safely 23 times in 61 times at bat for an average of .377. Topley's mark was 31 hits in 83 trips to the plate for a .373 percentage.

Darlene Currie of Vancouver posted the best average - 14 hits in 34 times at bat for a .412 average - but she did not have enough official times at bat to claim the crown. Topley was tied with Malesh for the most RBIs - 14 apiece - and the Vancouver manager-first baseman rapped out four doubles to lead that department. Pat Harrison, also of Vancouver, had the most triples - four.

Ellen Homer Champ Ellen Callaghan's three home runs gave the Rogue Valley outfielder-pitcher the league home run title. Florists, went through the league season undefeated. She racked up 18 victories and dominated every pitching statistic. She pitched 132 innings, gave up only 18 hits, 2 runs, no earned runs, and issued only 16 walks. She struck out 287 batters.

Other statistical leaders were the Florists' Elsa Werrenton and Sherry Larson of Eugene who tied for the most walks with 18; Jan Bateman

of Rogue Valley lead the strikeout department; with 20 and Ella Credale of Port Angeles came up with 20 bobbles to capture the error title.
