

OSC Dean Calls for Federal Inspection of Drug Companies

Corvallis—Regulations are more rigid today for the production of dog food than for the manufacture of drugs used by humans, the dean of pharmacy at Oregon State college insists in a call for strengthening of federal and state laws governing drug manufacture and advertising.

The public is not adequately protected by present drug laws, according to Dean Charles O. Wilson, even though today's drugs are "considerably more potent and of more specific physiological action" than ever before.

There is no official inspection of drug manufacturers and no licensing requirements, Dean Wilson noted in an editorial for the OSC summer session publication.

Shrimp canneries have a federal inspector watch each operation and yet there are drug manufacturing plants which have never had a federal inspector on the premises, he stated.

Drug advertising is prob-

ably more unreliable than that used in regard to any other commodity, Dean Wilson lamented.

"Pharmacists, nurses, physicians and others trained in drug usage are constantly amazed by drug advertising claims," he said. "The public

needs protection, particularly in the area of remedies concerned with obesity, pain, allergy, constipation, and skin conditions."

"There are, without doubt, as many medical situations created because of the misuse of drugs by self-medication as there are cures for self-medication," he continued. "Add to this the fact that in most cases of self-medication no drug was needed at all, and we can realize how persuasive drug advertising has become."

Self-Medication
Self-medication may be thought of as basic human right, but its successful practice depends upon a knowledge of the true value of the drugs employed, the OSC leader pointed out.

Under our present system of drug control, the consumer cannot accurately evaluate the

drug which he uses, Dean Wilson said.

"Because no blessing is more precious than health," Dean Wilson suggests some course work for all in drug use and selection. "Most of us practice self-medication on no

basis other than advertising claims which we have seen, heard, or read," he noted. "Dosage of drugs is much more critical today" and deviation from exact instructions can be exceedingly dangerous, Dean Wilson cautioned.

"A person should realize too that there are duplications in drug products, so that when he takes a single dose of two different preparations, he may, in reality, be taking a toxic dose of just one chemical compound," Dean Wilson emphasized.

"If self-medication is to continue to be our right, then our government should protect us from questionable products and questionable advertising. In addition, the public needs a knowledge of today's drug products," he concluded.

- 3/4 C. flour
- 1 tsp. ea. cinnamon and nutmeg
- 1 C. canned Hood River apple or pear slices, drained and sweetened
- 6 slices (sandwich) bread, both sides dipped in melted butter

Mix cheese, sugar, flour, spices. Shape bread to fit large muffin pans. Sprinkle with 1/2 the cheese-sugar mixture. Add fruit slices. Top with remaining cheese-sugar. Bake at 375° about 30 min.
