

Appling Ordered To Answer on Smith's Pamphlet Material

Salem—The Oregon Supreme Court this week issued a writ of mandamus ordering Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr. to show cause why general election voter pamphlet material for U.S. Senate candidate Elmo Smith is not acceptable.

Petition for the writ was filed just before 5 p.m. Tuesday by attorney Lamar Toozee Sr. of Portland. Arguments were set for 1 p.m. Thursday. Deadline involved.

The dispute involves the deadline for filing the pamphlet material. The law reads that the deadline is 70 days before the general election and Appling said therefore the deadline was Aug. 29 at 5 p.m. Smith contends he should have been permitted to file the material the next day, the 30th.

Attorneys will represent both Appling and Smith before the Supreme Court.

E. C. "Ted" Foxley, deputy attorney general, accepted service of the writ Tuesday after conferring with Appling by telephone.

Appling said: "Since I consider Elmo a friend, I regret as much as anybody that he did not meet

the legal requirement for getting his material in the Voter's Pamphlet. Certainly the voters would benefit by being able to hear from both candidates for this important office.

"However, the law is quite clear in requiring such material to be submitted 'not less than' 70 days prior to election day. This law has been interpreted by the Oregon Supreme Court as recently as December of 1959."

Hollywood No Longer Entitled To Name of World's Movie Capital

Hollywood—Hollywood is called a lot of things, good and bad, but it no longer can be called the movie capital of the world.

This week there were exactly five pictures being shot in tinsel town, and none of them are big-budget, grade A films.

Ten years ago there were seven or more feature films in production at each studio, with only occasional forays out of town for location shooting.

Here are the five: "Raisin in the Sun" (Columbia); "Petticoats and Blue Jeans" (Disney); "Black Star" (20th Century-Fox); "The 6th Man" (Universal-International); and "Burma Patrol" (United Artists).

Big Ones in Europe

Studio executives will point out that 17 films actually are being made by Hollywood companies, but the additional 12 are rolling thousands of miles from the corner of Hollywood and Vine.

The big ones are shooting in Europe.

Columbia's "The Guns of Navarone" is on location in

Spain. Paramount's "The Counterfeit Trail" is shooting in Germany and Scandinavia; Fox's "The Big Gamble" in France; Universal's "The Secret Ways" in Vienna; Warner's "Fanny" in Paris; "King of Kings" in Madrid.

Others are holding forth in other American cities.

"The Hoodlum Priest" is filming in St. Louis. "West Side Story" is being made in New York, and "The Misfits" in Reno.

Reasons for the emigration from Hollywood are numerous, but not particularly accurate.

Some producers say they are making pictures abroad to unfreeze profits from previous pictures. Others explain that labor is cheaper in Europe. Another group says on-the-spot locations are more believable than studio backdrops.
