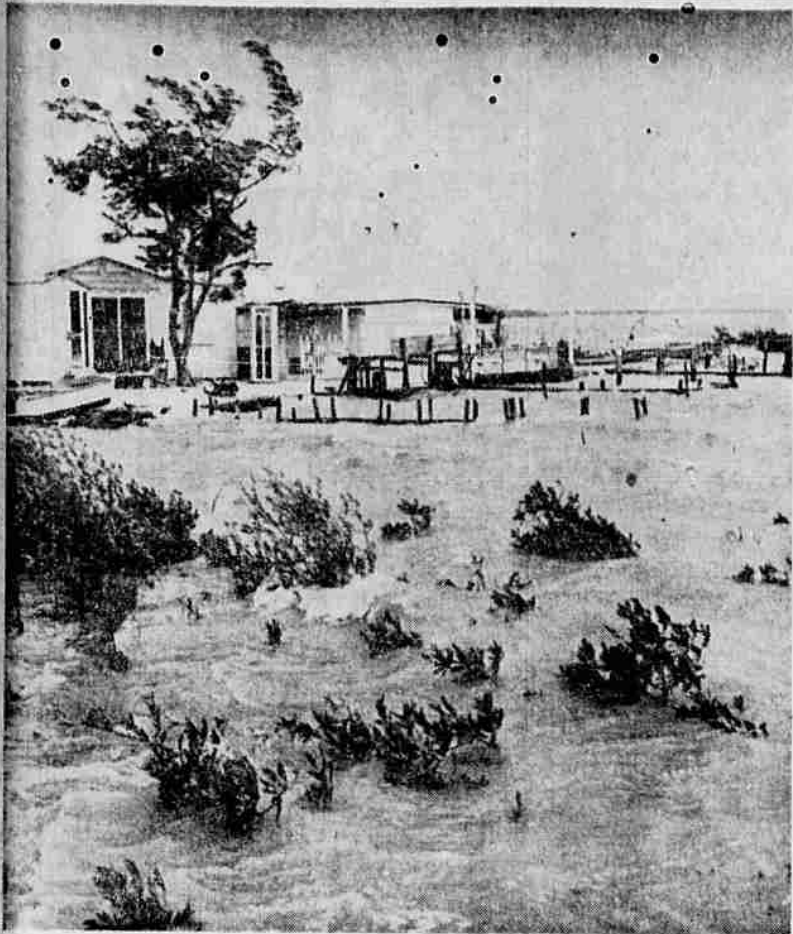

Soviet Premier Starts on First Leg of Trip To UN Parley

Khrushchev To Board Liner for Junket To West

Soviet Delegation Granted 138 Visas

Moscow—Premier Nikita Khrushchev left today for Kaliningrad on the first leg of his air and sea trip to New York for the United Nations General Assembly session starting Sept. 20.

Khrushchev was seen off at the Vnuovo Airport by First Deputy Premier Anastas Mikoyan and other top members of the Presidium and the Council of Ministers.

He was scheduled to arrive at the Baltic seaport of Kaliningrad tonight and sail shortly afterward for New York aboard the liner Balika.

Kaliningrad is the former Königsberg in former East Prussia.

Visas Granted

The U.S. Embassy Thursday granted visas to 138 members of the Soviet delegation to the U.N. session—probably the largest ever sent to the Assembly. Also aboard the vessel will be 19 delegates from the Ukraine, and 13 from Byelorussia.

Khrushchev will confer with the other Communist leaders aboard ship in the first mid-Atlantic "summit" conference of international Communism.

At the U.N. session the western chiefs of state generally are expected to remain away, although President Eisenhower may make an appearance.

Khrushchev has said that he intends to raise, among other things, the cases of the U2 and RB47 planes shot down by the Russians.

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NEW BOAT RAMP—Construction is expected to be completed by Sept. 30 on the concrete boat ramp at Emigrant lake. The boat ramp, under contract by the bureau of reclamation, is part of the work being done in the Talent irrigation district. Following the laying of steel matting on the gravel a concrete strip 20 by 625 feet will be poured. BR officials reported that the length was needed to accommodate boats as the water level of the lake will fluctuate.

The public boat ramp is located west of the Emigrant dam spillway and may be reached, when completed, by a one mile gravel road from the old highway. It is about 1/2 mile from the dam, it was reported. The boat ramp and access road will cost approximately \$25,000. The timberline visible in the picture will be slightly above the high water mark of the lake.

Southern Florida Alerted as Hurricane Moves Toward North

Marathon, Fla. —(UPI)—Hurricane Donna and its 150-mile-an-hour winds shifted slightly northward today, bringing the whole southern tip of Florida, including the populous Miami area, in range of its deadly winds and high tides.

In an emergency warning at 11 a.m. the Miami Weather Bureau extended its hurricane warnings north of the Florida keys to Fort Lauderdale on the Atlantic Coast and Punta Gorda on the Gulf.

Gale warnings were extended on the Gulf northward from Punta Gorda to St. Marks, including Lake Okechobee in the interior. They already flew over the East Coast northward to Vero Beach.

Precautions Urged
A dangerous hurricane now threatens most of extreme South Florida," the bureau said.

"Safety precautions should be rushed with all possible urgency in the area of hurricane display and completed at the earliest possible moment from Fort Lauderdale to Key West and by evening on the Gulf Coast."

The Weather Bureau then warned against storm tides up to seven feet over most of the keys, ranging to as high as 11 feet.

At 11 a.m. Donna was centered about 154 miles south-

southeast of Miami and the same distance east-southeast of Key West.

The hurricane was moving toward the west-northwest at about 12 m.p.h. The Weather Bureau said it would maintain this direction and speed for 12 hours.

The Florida keys, which received their warning Thursday, already were securely boarded up and most of the women and children bedded down in the strongest buildings each island had to offer.

Hundreds of residents in the upper keys poured into Miami after shutting up their homes. Other hundreds flocked to Key West.

The 100-mile overseas highway was nearly deserted in heavy rain. The Weather Bureau said its lowest points would be flooded by early afternoon.

"It is extremely urgent that all places within reach of the forecast tide levels be evacuated immediately," the advisory said.

Dog Control Said To Be Successful

The three men most closely associated with the Jackson county dog control ordinance agree that the ordinance so far "is a success."

County Dog Control Officer Chris Hagler, Medford Police Chief Charles P. Champagnon, and Lt. Ken Barker of the Ashland Police department, said today that people seem to be obeying the law.

Hagler said that 58 dogs have been apprehended to date since the ordinance went into effect Aug. 30. He said that no one spot in the county is giving his department any particular trouble, but he did note that his agency has received more reports of dogs running at large from Medford.

This figure would be even higher, he noted, if his agency had more men and equipment. He pointed out that with only three men it is difficult to try and be in all parts of the county at once.

However, Hagler said that even with the limited manpower, he feels the law is "working pretty well." He added that the agency has been receiving good cooperation from both the Medford

and Ashland police departments.

None of the owners of the 58 dogs that have been cited into court. However, Hagler said he understands that some of them will be soon.

Of the 58 dogs that have been picked up by his agency, Hagler said owners have decided to abandon 20 of them. The owners have paid the \$1 fee the agency charges for apprehending dogs, and have then requested the dogs be disposed of.

Held Five Days

He said that "more than half" of these 20 dogs will be destroyed. Dogs are normally held for five days, he said, and then if nobody wants them they are destroyed.

The Ashland police department, according to Lieutenant Barker, has been receiving an average of two and three complaints of dogs running at large a day. Medford, by contrast, has received only eight complaints since the ordinance went into effect.

The Medford police department has yet to catch its first dog.

Hagler said his agency is concentrating enforcement in the cities but he is of the opinion that residents of the county also seem to be obeying the law.

Chief Champagnon said the law "is obviously working because there are fewer dogs on the street."

Durno Says He Will Make One Promise; 'Pay Attention to Wishes of People'

"I am not going to make any promises during this campaign except one. I am going to pay attention to the wishes, desires, demands and recommendations of the people in the fourth congressional district."

So stated Dr. Edwin R. Durno, Republican candidate for the fourth congressional district, at a meeting Thursday evening at the Central Point American Legion hall.

The candidate divided the campaign issues into three categories, local, domestic or the national scene, and the field of international affairs and foreign relations.

Lists Five Needs

He listed five needs on the local scene. They included: improving and maintaining the ports, harbors, jetties of southwest Oregon; access

roads from the inland areas to ports along with timber access roads; development and realization of the tremendous recreation potential of the district; timber and wood processing, and the Rogue River project.

Dr. Durno expressed concern with the "massive spending schemes all coming from a central government, all being paid for by your money, all tending toward deficit financing, and all tending to increase the cost of living and lower the purchasing power of the dollar."

He stressed the need for a balanced national budget, and expressed concern about the many persons trying to live on fixed incomes (pensions) as the purchasing power of the dollar goes down.

He added that he would

like to reduce taxes, but explained that if congress votes for a wild spending program, taxes should be raised to balance the budget.

International Level

Speaking on the international level, the candidate said that the age of appeasement is over. "This country, he continued, has to be so fantastically strong no nation will challenge us."

"We can't buy friends, but we should buy security until the cold war is resolved."

The executive branch of the government should handle our foreign affairs, Dr. Durno stressed. Individual congressmen without authority or knowledge should not embarrass our government by traveling to the far corners of the world representing the American people, he declared.

Western Oregon Temperatures Sent Soaring

Hot, dry weather sent temperatures soaring in Western Oregon today and the threat of thunderstorms added to the already potentially explosive forest fire danger.

Three fires totaling 50 acres were burning in the Mt. Hood area near Parkdale after a slash blaze got out of control Thursday. Planes dropped borate on it and crews hoped to bring it under control today.

The humidity dropped below 30 per cent in many areas, shutting down logging operations.

The Weather Bureau said thunderstorms were expected over the Sierras in California today with a chance that some would spread northward into Southern Oregon.

92 at Depoe Bay

The Northern Oregon coast got its hottest weather of the year with a 92 recorded on Thursday at Depoe Bay. Fog and low clouds are expected to continue northward and cover most of the coastal area by Saturday morning.

Some small blazes were reported in Clackamas county, Ore., and Clark county, Wash., but all were under control Thursday night.

Temperatures in the 90s and possibly passing the 100-degree mark, were forecast today for Willamette Valley areas. It's expected to cool off somewhat Saturday.

Medford was the state's hot spot Thursday with 96. It got down to 34 at Redmond early today.

Regulations Set For Airport Use

New regulations restricting the use of Medford's municipal airport by taxicabs and limousines will go into effect tomorrow, according to Acting Airport Manager Gil Gutjahr.

The most important of these regulations is the establishment of specific taxi-cab and limousine stands at the airport.

The limousine stand will be located in front of the main terminal and is marked by lines on the blacktop surfacing.

Taxicabs will be required to use a stand 200 feet south of the terminal. This stand will be blocked off by barricades.

Drivers of both types of public conveyance will be prohibited from soliciting passengers away from these stands. Drivers will also be required to either sit in their vehicles or remain within a distance of three feet of the vehicles.

The exceptions are: one, they can enter the terminal to make telephone calls; two, they can enter the terminal to pick up passengers' baggage; and three, they can enter the terminal to conduct business with other lessees at the airport, such as the airlines or restaurant.

In addition, Gutjahr said, limousine drivers can enter the lobby for the purpose of making an announcement of the departure of their vehicles.

Regarding the new regulations, Gutjahr said that they should provide for the more orderly use of the airport by taxicabs and limousines.

Gambling Equipment Seized at Elks Lodge

Independence, Ore. — (UPI)—State police and Polk county sheriff's deputies Thursday night raided the Independence Elks Lodge and confiscated 56 punchboards, some dice and currency.

Norman R. Kelly, club manager, was cited by state police for being in possession of illegal gambling equipment.

Plans for Large Subdivision East of Medford Presented

Tentative plans for a 471-acre subdivision east of Medford, having a potential of more than 1,700 lots, were presented to the city planning commission last night.

Don Lutes, of Lutes and Amundson, architects and community planners, Springfield, made the presentation. He said there are two main problems — sewers and water supply — that must be worked out with the city before the subdivision can become a reality.

Lutes said the comprehensive development plan was drawn up at the request of the Rogue Valley Country club and 12 property owners who want to provide for orderly subdivision of this area.

The project is divided into three general areas, he said. The first of these is bounded by Murphy, Barnett, Hillcrest-Phoenix and Hillcrest rds. The second area is south of Cherry lane and east of Hillcrest-Phoenix rd. The third area is north of Cherry lane and east of Hillcrest-Phoenix rd.

Much of this area is now outside the city, Lutes noted, and said priorities have been established for development and annexation to the city of certain areas first.

The project would take from 5 to 10 years to complete, he said, but pointed out that several property owners in this area are anxious to get started as soon as possible.

Much of the area to be developed would be adjacent to the extension of the Rogue valley golf course. As many

lots as possible would have frontage on the expanded golf course, he said.

Nearly all of the property would be developed for single-family residential except for a school site and one multiple-family housing area. Average lot size would be 10,000 square feet and it is recommended that each lot be required to provide a minimum of two off-street parking spaces in addition to carport or garage facilities.

Main Problem Is Water

Water supply is the main problem, Lutes pointed out. The existing water service to the area can supply only up to a 1,500-foot elevation which would serve only a small portion of the project.

Lutes proposed that two or three reservoirs be built above the Bel-Aire Heights subdivision in this area. These reservoirs would be supplied by a 24-inch line along Hillcrest rd. from the pumping station approximately 3,900 feet west of the junction of Hillcrest and Foothill rds.

Cost of this water system would be in the vicinity of \$160,000, he said, much more than the developers are willing to pay. Lutes said, however, that the 24-inch main is capable of serving a large area outside of the development plan, and for this reason the cost should be spread over a larger area.

He listed three alternatives for spreading this cost:

—Assess everybody in this area above the 1,500-foot level, which would call for additional annexations from this area or else creation of a water district.

—Have a city-wide bond issue to finance provision of services to new areas, including this one.

Corporation of People
—Form a corporation of people within the development plan area, who would be reimbursed for their investment in the water main from connection fees from those outside the initial assessment area.

The other problem, sewers, has not been studied, Lutes said, because the city has no plans for extension of sewer services to this area.

He suggested that the city undertake a study of both problems, not necessarily confined to this area, but to all fringe areas and come up with some kind of a policy in regards to possible city participation in the cost of utilities of a size that will serve a wider area than just the proposed development.

Without much comment, the planning commission took the matter under advisement and indicated they would meet with the water commission to explore that aspect of the problem.

There was no indication on how soon the developers might have their answer.

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McDonald Speaks At Labor Meeting

J. D. McDonald, Portland, president of the Oregon AFL-CIO, spoke at the Wednesday evening meeting of the Jackson County Labor Council.

The local Council voted to concur with the action taken by the AFL-CIO and the San Francisco Labor Council on the consumer boycott of Sears, Roebuck stores. Members of organized labor and their friends have been asked by the Council "not to patronize the Sears stores until management ceases to interfere with the self-organization of employees and until it demonstrates good faith acceptance of union security clauses in its contracts."

(Literature asking that persons in the Medford area concur with the boycott here has been mailed by the local Retail Clerks union.)

McDonald related the problems that will face labor in the November election and reminded delegates to get the union members registered and go to the polls on election day.

PUC Hearing on Crossing Held

Oregon public utility commissioner's hearings ended yesterday with no objection being voiced to a proposed alteration of a railroad crossing at Fielder lane, west of Rogue River, according to Robert J. Carstensen, county engineer.

It was proposed that the crossing be widened from 12 to 40 feet. Angle of crossing would also be changed from 40 degrees to 90 degrees.

Katanga Province Police Demand Planes Take Off

Guinea Threatens Troop Withdrawal

Leopoldville, The Congo — (UPI) — Police of secessionist Katanga province forced United Nations guards at gunpoint today to permit two small planes to take off from the Elisabethville airport in defiance of U.N. orders.

It was the first instance of open resistance to U.N. troops since they entered The Congo in July.

It came as Guinea threatened to withdraw its troops from the U.N. command in support of Congolese Premier Patrice Lumumba and his angry charges that the U.N. is interfering in the country's internal affairs.

Three Ministers Fired

A short time before Lumumba fired three ministers who sided against him and published an order of the day to the army declaring that he has assumed the functions of chief of state and army commander. The order was two days old.

The incident at Elisabethville, capital of Moise Tshombe's Katanga province which has declared itself free of the rest of The Congo, was carried out with directness.

Takeoff Permit Demanded

Two trucks filled with police arrived at dawn at Elisabethville airport, which is among those ordered closed by the U.N. command, and demanded that the two planes be permitted to leave. The police emphasized their demand with weapons.

U. N. spokesmen reported that, under strong protest, the U.N. airport controller ordered his men to help remove barriers from the runways so the Katanga government planes could take off.

Kongolo Destination Possible
The two small planes carrying unidentified supplies and two men each, then took off for the northern part of the province. It was believed they might be heading for the Kongolo area, where Lumumba's troops were reported to have crossed into Katanga from Kivu.

With the threat of a full-scale civil war hanging over the steaming African nation, Lumumba, strengthened by parliamentary support, demanded the United Nations give up control of airports and Leopoldville radio station or pull its 16,000 troops out of the country.

A jury Thursday afternoon unanimously found Mrs. Clifford (Frances) Goodlet, Tallent, guilty of fraudulently obtaining narcotic drugs (percode).

The circuit court trial started yesterday morning before Judge Edward C. Kelly. Five witnesses were called by the state. Goodlet testified on the behalf of his wife, and was the only witness called by the defense.

The complaint charged that Mrs. Goodlet "obtained a supply of narcotics by presenting a prescription." Judge Kelly ruled during the trial that the word "presenting" was proper whether the prescription was oral or written. The defense had argued that the prescription was telephoned to the pharmacist and thus could not be termed as having been presented.

In his ruling, Judge Kelly stated that the word was sufficient as long as the defendant caused the prescription to be telephoned to the pharmacist. He allowed the prescription to be entered into evidence.

Under federal law, prescriptions for Class B narcotic drugs, which includes percode, may be filled by telephone.

Mrs. Goodlet was lodged in the county jail in lieu of \$2,500 bail. Sentencing is scheduled Monday, Sept. 12.

Police Investigate 'Rental' of Vehicle

Medford police, while investigating a family argument at some local apartments Wednesday night, found a man sleeping in a wrecked car. The man told them the car was rented to him as a home.

Police said the man was sleeping in the car, which was without windows, under a cover of paper and blankets. The man told police he rented the car from the landlord of the apartments for \$2 a week as a place to sleep. Police are investigating.
