Meyer Schedules Meet Of District 6 Bus Drivers

Gold Hill - Charles A. Meyer, superintendent of District 6 schools, has scheduled a meeting for all bus drivers at 9 a.m. Monday, first day of school, at the bus barn in Central Point.

Nearly 2,000 youngsters in the district, which includes Sams Valley, Gold Hill and Central Point, will be transported to and from school by bus.

Meyer will inform the drivers of all state rules, regulations and policies, as well as give instructions in regard to all District 6 rules, regulations and policies.

D. R. Hendrickson is in charge of bus maintenance and is assisted by Joseph Morgan, also driver of bus No. 10. Other drivers in the district and numbers of their respective buses are Victor Brown, No. 20; William Caldwell, No. 2; Tyley Evans, No. 7; Walter Foote, No. 16; Leonard Freeman, No. 3; Venson Hunt, No. 14; Elron Griffiths, No. 1; Scott Hamilton, No. 11; Carl Hoover, No. 15; S. J. Kiger, No. 8; Richard Morris, No. 12; H. M. Paulson, No. 6; George Botsford, No. 18; Iver Sands, No. 13; Carroll Stevenson, No. 19, and Claude Ullom, No. 5.

Important Reminders

District officials said drivers shall load and unload only at designated places. Some important reminders to motorists are that the bus driver will use flashing red lights in compliance with state law, 300 feet prior to stopping the school bus to load or may not cross the highway. A school bus should be an indication to the motorist that he should always be prepared to stop, regardless of what the situation is.

If possible the bus driver will pull off the pavement to load or unload pupils.

The safety of pupils who ride school buses will depend a great deal upon the alertness and good driving habits of the motorists.

According to regulations, the driver is instructed to report to school officials the license number of any vehicle that violates a law that would endanger the lives of school children.

Drivers are cautioned against putting off a youngster for breach of discipline along the route. Such pupils are unloaded at home stations and notified that they will not be conveyed again until the matter is cleared with the superintendent or principal.

The first day of school, drivers will instruct pupils riding their buses about the use of safety doors. They should also take time to show the pupils how to get safely on and off the bus, and cross the highway.

His lookout is located on top of the Cascade range overlooking the Seven Lakes basin area and upper Klamath lake. The Pacific Crest Trail (Sky Line) goes near the tower. Cody reports that many people travel the Sky Line trail during the summer months on foot, and on saddle horses with pack horses.

Bob Greer, stationed at the Blue Rock lookout, recently gave food and warmth to three boys who were in Blue Canyon on a fishing trip. Bob reports that the young boys were nearly frozen and plenty hungry when they came by.

Manning the Rustler Peak lookout are Mr. and Mrs. Howard Greer, who report that they have had lots of cold, wet weather with some snow. The Greers have manned the Rustler Peak station for three years.

Rustler Peak, being the key lookout for Butte Falls district, receives and sends out coded weather reports, receives check calls from hand-talkie radios and mobile units throughout the forest. Their main job, of course, is looking for fires.

Garbage Disposal Run Set Up in EP

Eagle Point - Mel Robinson of Shady Cove has been appointed for the new garbage disposal run in Eagle Point.

Garbage disposal will be picked up as usual this Saturday but will not be picked up again until Monday, Sept. 19 and will then be picked up each Monday thereafter.

Robinson told city councilmen he would like to charge \$1.50 per month for a 30-gallon garbage can and any additional will be rated accordingly. A fee will be set for those having pickup once or twice a month also and Robinson stated that they would collect in advance and in person, leaving a bill when people were not at home so that they could mail the amount due.

Sanitation Chairman Donald McGovern was instructed to work with the city attorney and prepare a set of rules and regulations for the residents. Robinson and the council to all abide by and have them approved by the council before definite negotiations are completed. These instructions will be attached to each garbage can when completed.

Due to the Labor day holiday, and conflicting engagements of council members on Tuesday, it was necessary to hold the regular council session on the seventh of the month, instead of the fifth.

The "Winnemucca-to-the-Sea" caravan is tentatively scheduled to stop at Cave Junction, Grants Pass, and Rogue River before arriving here about 2:45 p.m. Sept. 22. Following a special program, entertainment and presentation of officials and gifts, the caravan will continue on to Central Point and Medford, where it will remain the first night, leaving Medford the morning of Sept. 23.

Stops Along Way

On that date stops are scheduled along the way at Phoenix, Ashland, Klamath Falls and Lakeview, where arrangements are to be made to spend the second night. Leaving Lakeview Saturday, Sept. 24, the caravan is slated to stop at Denio, then continue its journey arriving at Winnemucca about 4:45 p.m. on Saturday. The return trip to Crescent City will be made on Sunday, Sept. 25, by the same route.

Complete details in regard to special ceremonies honoring the caravan will be announced by Gold Hill citizens as soon as plans are available.

City Recorder Ferd Jones was authorized by the council to make final arrangement for moving the city recorder's office to a new location in the former post office building, which is owned by Mr. and Mrs. Delos Walker.

The downstairs of the building has been remodeled and decorated to accommodate the new city hall. A large room in the rear of the building will be used for council meetings and the recorder's office will occupy a space in the front of the building.

The rent will be \$35 per month. This, and the expense of equipment for the new city hall, were appropriated and approved in the 1960-61 budget.

The council authorized the city recorder and mayor to purchase needed items, which will include a large desk, typewriter, storage files and eight chairs for the council room, and to have constructed a large table for use by the council.

The next meeting of the council will be held at the new location Monday, Oct. 10, at 7 p.m. The meeting date was changed from the first Monday, because of the opening of deer season.

City officials said the county has jurisdiction of the dog control law in Gold Hill. They said dogs must be confined, leashed or under the owner's control on their own premises.

Petitions for city recorder, mayor, and three four-year council terms may be filed between Sept. 8 and Oct. 8, the council reported.

Expiring terms are those now held by Harry Foley, Virgil Gribble and Cecil Van Horn. The offices held by Mayor Milton Steinmetz and City Recorder Jones are each two year terms.
