

Area 4-H Members Win Ribbons in Fair Competition

Jackson and Josephine county 4-H club members seem to be winning their share of the prizes at the Oregon State Fair, according to the latest reports.

Karen Jossy, 15, Eagle Point, edged out two teen-age boys for the 4-H grand champion swine showmanship.

Karen won the senior 4-H title before competing for the grand championship. Her Hampshire pig was also a blue ribbon winner in the swine competition.

Also a winner in intermediate showmanship was Carole Foote, Central Point.

Roberta Martin, 17, Cave Junction, showed the 4-H grand champion Holstein for the second straight year.

Miss Martin won this year's purple rosette with a 9-year-old senior cow named Taffy competing against blue ribbon

Holsteins in six divisions for females of the breed.

She also picked another purple ribbon for her senior heifer calf.

Blue ribbons in the 4-H Jersey competition went to Tom Case, Grants Pass (Jersey junior heifer) and to Lanny Parsons, Gold Hill (Jersey junior heifer calf).

In other dairy competition, John Anhorn, 18, Central Point, showed the grand champion Milking Shorthorn and Marilyn Deckelman, 17, Rogue River, exhibited the 4-H grand champion Brown Swiss, a senior cow.

Miss Deckelman showed champion of the breed at the San Francisco Cow Palace last spring.

Her junior heifer, junior heifer calf, dam and daughter and members herd were also awarded blue ribbons.

Jackson county placed fourth for its herd of five beef animals exhibited by three or more club members in the steer division. Blue ribbon winner from Jackson county was an Angus owned by Larry Toner, Central Point.

A 13-year-old boy from The Dalles edged out senior 4-H showman Ron Anderson, 17, Eagle Point and Chip Bufington, 14, Medford, intermediate champion, to win the grand champion 4-H beef showmanship trophy.

Larry Toner, Central Point, was the other local 4-H member to place. He was exhibiting in the senior other breed class.

A blue ribbon for her Southdown market lamb went to Mary Cantrall, Jacksonville.

Team Places Third
A three-member Josephine county team placed third in the poultry judging. Included on the team were Gary Ackerman, 13, Grants Pass; Leander Converse, 15, Wolf Creek; and Jerry Fairfield, 12, Grants Pass.

A special award of \$5 worth of feed from the Triangle Milling company went to Kathy Zapell, Talent, for the best poultry records kept this year.

Although quick thinking 4-H youngsters from Walla, Linn and Yamhill counties took the "firsts" in the home economics judging contests, Jackson county youngsters also rated a blue ribbon.
