Sorority Sale Will Aid Eugene Hospital - School

Children's Hospital school at Eugene will be discussed at a meeting today planned by Epsilon Sigma Alpha sorority, which supports the school as its main philanthropic project.

Here for a luncheon meeting at the Medford hotel at noon will be Miss Grace Isenminger, advisor to the executive board of the school and a member of the sorority; Miss Marian Wood, one of the teachers, and Miss Nancy Woodruff, an occupational

therapist for the school. The three women will also be in a KBES-TV program at 2:30 p.m.

To raise funds for the hospital - school, Epsilon Sigma Alpha members will conduct the annual sale of Brown and Haley chocolate mints Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday, September 13-15. It will be a door-to-door sale from 6:30 to 9 p.m. each evening.

Selling will be members of Alpha Iota chapter, Grants Pass, Alpha Lambda and Delta Omega chapters, Medford, and Alpha Kappa chapter, Ashland.

Last year the 64 Oregon chapters donated a total of \$11,549 to the Eugene institution for handicapped and crippled children. Average attendance at the school is between 30 to 35 children, ranging in ages from 5 to 15 years. They are taught handicrafts as well as the usual school work. The public school system supplies the classroom teachers, but all therapists, etc., are paid for by donations from organizations and individuals.

Children are accepted from all parts of Oregon, and several from Jackson county have attended the hospital-school. They are placed in foster homes while attending school, and arrangements are made to transport them to the school daily.

Local members of the sorority who have visited the school recently have expressed amazement and gratitude at the accomplishments of the children receiving treatment, and the enthusiasm of all those who work with them.

George Safford, managing director of the school, has given members of Epsilon Sigma Alpha much credit for offering campships for the children, and for locating children requiring the services of the hospital - school, in addition to the financial assistance.
