### Small Worlds Around Us

**A Machine With Feathers**  
Commercialization, mechanization and automation has almost hit the "hen-house" a death blow. Even the "hen-house" itself has become a parlor.

The poultry raiser now looks at his flock with wishful desire, hoping science can show him how he can develop chickens without bones, as well as a sickening shortage of vital organs. It sort of gripes the industry that they have apparently reached a stalemate.

There is little pride today in possessing a "good looking flock"; all the emphasis is on production of eggs, or flesh, at great speed and low cost. How much weight and how quick, or how many eggs per hen, before replacement. But little credit is given the hen; the plaudits all go to the owner of the diet, or the guy that patented the cage lock.

Even by knocking herself out, the hen can just about expect a year or so of life. Her owner expects her to lay about 350 eggs; if she does she is considered good. In payment for her efforts, even though she has set a record, she will be replaced; and replaced means only one thing, she gets it in the neck, and becomes a cut-up-fowl in some meatcase.

Her's is a short-lived and futile accomplishment. During her productive life she is fed the very best of food. She doesn't realize it, but the "laying food" she eats stimulates and encourages her egg-producing potential.

She enjoys a properly balanced diet, with just the right amounts of carbohydrates, proteins, hormones, vitamins and fats. She's fueled up for high speed, big production, and at the lowest possible cost per egg.

With everything against her it's a wonder she lasts as long as she does; even the best machine man can make doesn't last long when operated constantly at full speed, and flesh tires sooner than metal.

If her destiny happens to be other than an egg-producing machine, she may be cooped up so closely she can hardly move; may even be so confined she cannot stand.

Drinking water may be piped to her cage by an automatic device; even the feed will be doled to her in exactly the right amount and right at a precise time.

**Artificial Lights**  
Her hours of daylight may be extended by artificial lights until she can't know whether it is day or night; whether it's time to wake up, or go back to sleep. Her owner hopes she will be a machine; a machine with feathers. She grows fat and tender in spite of herself; it's an easy life, but a short one.

The poor old hen should enjoy some little satisfaction. Science has gone about as far as it can with her. Peculiar too, that all the automation, and mechanical gadgets employed to make her lay more eggs can't come up with any sort of a machine that could do away with her entirely and produce eggs without her.

It still takes the hen; you'll never have eggs for breakfast without her. She doesn't receive much credit, but she is a pretty important and indispensable cog in the wheel; from here on in automation will fall flat on its stupid, mechanical face.

### The Medical Roundup

#### Head Noises

I get so many hundreds of letters asking about ear noises and dizziness that I plan to write a booklet on the subject, which should soon be available.

As I have to tell my correspondents, I cannot give them much, if any, information. First they must go to a good ear man to find out if they have the type of disease in one or both ears which can produce dizziness and noises. If the ears are perfect, and if the person is past 40 or 50, and especially if, just before the dizziness came, he had a frightening woody spell that made him fear he was having a "little stroke"; and particularly if, at that time or later, he had some symptoms of brain injury such as seeing double, or getting numbness in the right hand, or trouble swallowing, or a loss of memory, or a loss of ability, or a tendency to irritability, or irascibility, the cause is probably in the brain.

Until recently some of my medical brethren were very reluctant to diagnose the extremely common little strokes which I have been describing for the last 30 years. Thank goodness, at last, most doctors with a large practice are saying, "Why, yes; why didn't I recognize those things long ago; right now I must have 50 odd people around town suffering from those 'little strokes.'" I now have available a 25-cent booklet - on the very common little strokes.

One fact can help many people. With Meniere's disease of the ears the "dizziness" of a little stroke is usually a loss of the normal sense of good balance. A few people say they get very dizzy when they suddenly stand up after lying in bed. This usually is harmless, and is due to a slowness in the mechanism which pushes our blood pressure up when we stand.
