Evacuation of Connecticut Coast Ordered for Hurricane

New York—Killer hurricane Donna whipped up "mountainous seas" today in the nation's east coast into Long Island and New England. Gov. Abraham Ribicoff ordered the entire Connecticut shoreline evacuated.

The U.S. Weather Bureau warned there would be major

flooding all along the populous coast of the northeastern United States.

Police and Coast Guardsmen had aided the exodus of tens of thousands already from sections of New Jersey, Maryland, Delaware and Long Island, including some 10,000 evacuated from the flat sand of Fire Island, a New York vacation spot.

Set Up Emergency Quarters
Ribicoff, at an emergency "capital" established in Westport, Conn., issued the shoreline evacuation order to national guardsmen, state police, civil defense personnel and local governments.

"All persons, including owners of shoreline properties, will be denied access to the areas as long as any danger exists," Ribicoff said. "The protection of life must be a paramount concern, as long as hurricane Donna remains a danger."

At 7 a.m. (p.s.t.), the hurricane was about 80 miles east of Atlantic City, N.J., moving in a northeasterly direction of 40 miles per hour. That course would take it across eastern Long Island.

Authorities acted swiftly to prevent a repetition of hurricane Diane of August, 1955, which took 179 lives in the northeastern states. Donna already had killed 100 in its veering course up from the Caribbean, including 11 in Florida and North Carolina. Schools were closed and shelters throughout the coastline area. New York City had a torrential rain. The 102-story Empire State Building could not be seen from three miles.

Boring Youth Held In Fatal Shooting

Oregon City—Jeffrey Edward German, 17, Boring, was held today in connection with the fatal shooting Saturday night of his grandfather, Veotia Ralph Matters, 63, Parkdale.

Sheriff Joe Shobe said the boy had given officials a statement in which he said the shooting occurred after an argument.

The sheriff said the boy was to be taken before a judge today to determine if he would be remanded to adult authority to face homicide charges.

Deputy Coroner John McNeill said Matters was struck in the back with a 30-30 rifle bullet which passed through the head. The shooting occurred about 6 p.m. Saturday near the community of Kelso, Ore.

Drug Evaluation Panel Proposed

Washington—(UPI)—A Harvard medical professor told Senate investigators that a panel of "honest, impartial" experts should evaluate all new drugs before they are released to the public.

Dr. Maxwell Finland, who is also a chief physician at Boston City Hospital, said that if the drug industry does not support such a study voluntarily, then the government should organize and finance the study.

"Under such auspices," he said, "the endorsement of inferior products that are not in the best interests of the public is much less likely to occur."

Finland recalled that the council on drugs of the American Medical Association used to test new medicines but then became "sissy or scared" and gave it up.

Fire Destroys Home In Morning Blaze

Rival Congo Delegates Race To Security Council Meeting

Both Sides Name Representatives To Make Pleas

Decision To Be Made by Council

United Nations, N. Y. — (UPI)—The Security Council, upon the motion of the United States, today indefinitely adjourned its crisis session on the Congo pending clarification of the "confusion" in the country.

United Nations, N. Y. — (UPI)—Delegates of rival "governments" of the Congo raced to New York today each bent on persuading the Security Council that the other is a fraud.

The 11-nation council, its attempts to pacify and stabilize the new African nation frustrated by a power struggle between President Joseph Kasavubu and Premier Patrice Lumumba, was to be called into session this afternoon.

It was not certain whether the delegations sent by Lumumba and Kasavubu would get here in time but the council was expected to wait until it had a chance to hear them both before coming to any new decision.

Fires Lumumba
Kasavubu notified Secretary General Dag Hammarskjöld by cable in the middle of the last council session Saturday evening that he had fired Lumumba as premier and named moderate Joseph Ileo, speaker of the Senate, to replace him.

Lumumba, leaning heavily on Soviet support, refused to accept Kasavubu's decree. Thus he and Kasavubu sent rival delegations here.

Heading Kasavubu's delegation was Justin Bomboko who was fired by Lumumba as foreign minister. Kasavubu put him in the Ileo Cabinet.

Lumumba sent Thomas Kanza, one of the college trained men in the Congo, to represent him.

Hammarskjöld was expected to pass the credentials of both delegations over to the Security Council to decide, if it would, which represented the legal government of the Congo.

Thomas Dewey To Visit in Medford
Salem—(UPI)—Labor Secretary James P. Mitchell, Thomas E. Dewey and John Roosevelt will speak in Oregon next month, State Republican Chairman Peter Gunnar announced today.

Mitchell will appear in Portland, at John Day dam, The Dalles and St. Helens Oct. 3-4.

Roosevelt, GOP son of the late Democratic President Franklin D. Roosevelt, will be in Portland, Salem and Coos Bay Oct. 6-7 and Dewey will visit Salem, Albany, Eugene, Roseburg and Medford Oct. 22.

On Oct. 6 Gov. Mark Hatfield is to appear in Albany, Corvallis, Coos Bay, Gold Beach, Grants Pass and Medford.

Castro Urged To Join Khrushchev
Havana—(UPI)—Premier Fidel Castro's top advisers are urging him to join Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev at the U.N. General Assembly to dramatize Cuba's strong ties with the Communist bloc, diplomatic circles said today.

Khrushchev, now en route by ship to United Nations headquarters in New York, has called on the heads of government around the world to attend the session beginning Sept. 20.

Thus far there has been no definite indication whether Castro would respond. But the diplomatic sources said Castro's advisers want him to attend to strengthen the "Sino-Soviet bloc" and emphasize Cuba's defiance of the United States and Latin America.

Venezuela Revolt Has Short Life; Station Seized

Caracas, Venezuela—(UPI)—A small group of national guardsmen seized a radio station in Caracas early today and broadcast that "the armed forces are rising against government disorder."

But a few hours afterward, the government of President Romulo Betancourt announced that loyal troops recaptured the station and that there was no other trouble anywhere in the country.

The government communique explained that the report of an uprising was caused by one lieutenant and a small group of national guardsmen who seized the Continental radio station in the heart of downtown Caracas.

People Asked to Rally
The seized station began broadcasting anti-government slogans. Broadcasts were made over another station in the city in which the labor unions called on the people to rally in defense of Betancourt and his government.

The rebel broadcasts continued for about three hours. However, the communique issued from the presidential palace said that at 6 a.m. loyal army troops moved into the Continental station, seized the men who had temporarily occupied it, and returned the station to its owners.

Higher Education Names Architects

Salem—(UPI)—The State Board of Higher Education today appointed architects to draw up plans for the new science building at Portland State College and a dormitory plan at Oregon State College.

Skidmore, Owings & Merrill, Portland, will make a campus expansion study of Portland State, along with drawing up preliminary plans for the proposed \$2,340,000 Science Building.

The architects will be looking for a site west of the Southwest Park Blocks. The Science Buildings allocation must be approved by the 1961 legislature.

The firm of Burns, Bear, McNeil & Schneider, Bloodworth & Jones, associate architects, Portland, got the OSC dormitory job.

The same firm also was contracted to design a dormitory at Oregon College of Education. It will house 150 students at a cost of \$630,000.

KHRUSHCHEV SHIP UNSIGHTED

London—(UPI)—The ship bearing Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev to New York slipped out of sight in English Channel fog today and no one would admit knowing where it was.

The last work of the ship, the Baltika, came from Tass news agency which said Sunday night it was about to enter the English Channel.

It was assumed the ship, taking Khrushchev and other Communist leaders to a United General Assembly session, was in the channel today but no one would say for sure.

The British Broadcasting Corp. reported this morning there was fog on the channel and the Baltika had not been sighted.

The Admiralty said the British navy did not know the ship's position and furthermore was not interested.

A spokesman for the U.S. Navy in London said "we don't keep track of civilian ships." In Paris, the French Marine Ministry said, "Nobody in the French government knows where the Baltika is."

Letter Comments On Removal of Snags at Hyatt

"Blanket removal of snags at Hyatt lake may endanger chances of maintaining a suitable fishery," Cole M. Rivers, field agent for the state game commission, wrote the county court recently.

Rivers was referring to the tentative proposal of the Jackson county parks and recreation commission to remove the snags at Hyatt lake to enhance the scenic beauty of the lake and possibly its recreational use. The commission will hold a special meeting on Sept. 19, at 7:30 p.m. at the courthouse to discuss this and construction of new facilities at both Howard Prairie and Emigrant lakes.

Cole added that he would be happy to assist in the orderly removal of snags. (The commission has proposed leaving some snags and sinker logs for the fishery.)

Rivers explained in his letter that the game commission wishes to re-establish a spiny-ray fishery at Hyatt. A balanced development of large-mouth bass, blue gills and catfish must be maintained to have good productive fishing over a long period, he explained.

"Cover is very important to maintain a good emulsion between bass and blue gills," he wrote. "Many spiny-ray impoundments in the country have had to have rafts of logs, trees and brush established for fish cover at considerable expense to the government agencies involved."

7,832 Students Enroll in District

A total of 7,832 children registered in Medford school district's 17 schools this morning, with first day enrollment figures 4.4 per cent above last year's figure of 7,504.

The largest percentage of increase in the preliminary enrollment figures is in the

two junior high schools, it was reported. An increase of 9.5 per cent was noted with 2,023 registering compared to the 1959 figure of 1,844.

Registration at the district's elementary schools totaled 4,381 students, 2.9 per cent above last year. The senior high school preliminary enrollment figures stands at 1,428 students or 26 more than last year.

The boy, Frank Albert Morse, was reported in satisfactory condition at a hospital with cuts and bruises.

Deputy Sheriff Herbert Groat said the child had been taken from his bed and beaten. A baby sitter telephoned police.

The boy is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Colby Morse, Groat said. Thornley and his wife lived at the Morse home.

Petitions Expected On Annexation

Six petitions favoring annexation of the "southwest" district to Medford were to be turned into the city administration this afternoon, according to Wallace B. Brill, head of a committee that is proposing annexation as a solution to the area's sewage problems.

The petitions are understood to contain the signatures of several hundred persons living in the Ross and Lozier lane areas. Brill said the petition reads: "Do you want to solve your sewage problems by annexation to the city of Medford?"

Brill said almost all of the signatures were drawn from the area immediately adjacent to west Medford, and east of Clover lane.

Petitions bearing the signatures of 244 persons opposing annexation of this area were turned over to the city two weeks ago.

Registration Should Be Conducted Impartially According To County Clerk

Voter registration should be conducted as impartially as possible County Clerk Marvin Madden said today, and not in any location bearing partisan political signs.

Madden was replying to a question on whether it is proper for a registrar to register electors in a mobile facility or temporary location which bears partisan political signs, campaign materials or labels. The question was raised by a private citizen regarding the legality of using the Republican Volkswagen booth for registering voters.

"It is possible that signs of this nature would serve to encourage persons to register in some instances and discour-

age persons from registering in other instances," Madden stated. "It is also my position that voter registration and use of mobile registration booths should be encouraged as much as possible," Madden added.

He noted that Jackson county has more registrars than any other county except Multnomah county.

"We will definitely comply with the law and after checking with the county clerk have agreed to operate the booth until it is determined operation of such a booth is illegal," Joseph Walsh, chairman of the Jackson County Republican Central Committee, said this morning. "The vehicle has

United Nations Troops Guard Radio Station

Military Gets Arrest Warrant

Leopoldville, The Congo—(UPI)—President Joseph Kasavubu ordered the arrest of Premier Patrice Lumumba today.

Samuel Mandjili, deputy to Kasavubu's Information Minister Jean Bolikango, said he delivered a warrant for Lumumba's arrest to the military this morning.

Bolikango showed up at the Congolese radio station with two companies of troops "to take possession," but he was turned away by U.N. troops.

Lumumba also was turned back from the station Sunday night by the U.N. guard, which is under orders to prevent "political agitation." He and his bodyguards left only under U.N. guns.

The U.N. troops reopened the station for a limited program of music and news, but were determined to keep it from being used to spread inflammatory pronouncements from either side.

The incident with Lumumba almost provoked a battle between the U.N. troops and a unit of Congolese soldiers who raced up to the station under the apparent impression the premier was under arrest.

U.N. troops at the airport also maintained rigid control, amid signs they were getting more cooperation from Congolese troops who at one time had roamed the runways at will hunting for "Belgian spies."

The United Nations command kept a watchful eye for new incidents and started dealing directly with legislative leaders.

A 14-man truce observer team worked its way toward the borders separating Kasai and Kivu provinces from Katanga to police a cease fire to which U.N. officials said rival Congolese forces had agreed.

The goateed Lumumba left Leopoldville radio station Sunday night angrily shouting at U.N. troops from Ghana, led by a white officer, who had disarmed his bodyguard and ousted him from the station.

Lt. George Short, the British U.N. officer, had his Ghanaian troops at the station aim machineguns at the premier and his heavily armed guards.

"If your men try to resist I will have to shoot you," Short said.

Irrigation Water To Stop Sept. 15

Talent Irrigation district will turn off its water supply the evening of Sept. 15, district officials reported today.

The date is the end of the regular irrigation season. It was explained, and will allow workers to start construction throughout the system on the Talent Irrigation district's bureau of reclamation project.

It was reported that the district water users have used 21,000 acre feet this season, which is said to be about average.

Officials of the Medford Irrigation district reported today that they will continue to operate on stream flow until Oct. 1 or until the first winter rainfall. The date is about average for the last several years, it was explained, as the rainfall has been less in recent years.
