NY Sweeps Doubleheader; Orioles Blank Athletics; White Sox Still Threat

The New York Yankees have brought up those Big MM guns again—Mantle and Maris—and they may sound the death knell for the Baltimore Orioles in the American League pennant race.

Casey Stengel's crew, preparing for next week end's crucial four-game series with Baltimore, went a full game up on the Orioles Sunday with a 5-0, 3-2 sweep of the Cleveland Indians. Roger Maris hit his 38th homer in the opener, while Mickey Mantle won the 11-inning nightcap with his 34th.

The Yankees tied Baltimore in the victory column at 82 as the Orioles shutout Kansas City, 4-0, in a single game. In the important lost column, New York has dropped two less than Baltimore, 55 to 57.

Chicago Wins Two
Chicago, still a potent threat in third place, took two from Boston, 5-3 and 1-0. The White Sox are three games off the pace and 80-59 in the standings.

In the other AL games, Detroit won a pair from Washington, 8-3 and 6-5. With first place Pittsburgh tied by rain in the National league, St. Louis moved to within 6 1/2 games of the Pirates by defeating Philadelphia, 7-3. Los Angeles shutout Milwaukee, 2-0, while Cincinnati and San Francisco split a pair, the Reds winning the first, 2-1, and the Giants gaining the nightcap, 3-2.

Hector Lopez got into the Yankee bombardment act in the first game against Cleveland with his eighth homer and fourth in four days. Lopez added a triple to drive in another run while Maris smacked three hits.

Takes Series
Mantle's winning blast in the nightcap was his second in two days and gave the Yankees the season's series with Cleveland, 16-6.

Dave Philley, Baltimore's 40-year-old outfielder, hit a homer and double to drive in three runs. Steve Barber became the sixth member of the Orioles pitching staff to win at least 10 games.

Nellie Fox had a 6 for 7 day in Chicago's twin-sweep of Boston. The White Sox hopped on loser Bill Monbouquette for two runs in the first two innings of the opener with Al Smith driving in a pair.

In the nightcap, Chicago made it 11 straight home triumphs over the Red Sox this season as Fox scored the only run of the game in the fifth inning on Smith's double. Early Wynn pitched a six-hit shutout for his 12th win and 283rd of his career.

Oregon Staters Returned To SL

New York—UPI—President Maurice Podoloff of the National Basketball Association voided a deal whereby the St. Louis Hawks had traded two players to the Los Angeles Lakers in exchange for the rights to Ben Warley of Tennessee State.

As a result of the action, Dave Gambee and Lee Harmon, both former Oregon State stars, will be returned to the Hawks. Podoloff suggested that the two teams renegotiate a deal.

Warley had mistakenly been placed on the NBA draft list last spring and was claimed by the Lakers. It was later discovered that his class at Tennessee State was not due to be graduated until 1961 and he thus was not eligible for the NBA draft.

Grosz Called Key To Duck Success

(Editor's note: This is another of a series of dispatches dealing with the 1960 prospects of West Coast college football teams.)

Eugene, Ore.—UPI—Coach Len Casanova of Oregon has two fundamental rules—his football players must be in shape and they must be mentally alert on the field.

To test his demands about physical condition, Casanova sent his boys on a one-mile run after the first day of fall practice.

And to see that the lads know what they are doing on the field, Casanova and his staff prepared an 85-page booklet on Oregon's formations, style of play, etc. Each man was given one of these, and about 10 pages will be added to it each week during the season. The players are expected to know the book forward and backward.

If Oregon is to duplicate or better its 8-2 record of last year, they key must come from quarter back Dave Grosz, who broke his arm during the summer. However, the young signal-caller and passer seems to be as good as ever in fall practice. This may be the tip-off that the Webfoots will be rugged again.

Three Daves Star
Casanova has 15 returning lettermen. But only three of these were regulars. They are Grosz at quarter; Dave Grayson at left half and still another Dave—Urell—at guard.

The line shapes up as one of the biggest, if not the fastest, that Casanova has had. Riley Mattson and Steve Barnett, each 230, will be the tackles. Urell is 211 and his running mate probably will be Mike Rose, 200. Two men counted upon as regular ends, Kent Peterson and Paul Bauge, weighed 208 and 206 when they checked in. Center Joe Clesceri is 205.

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Drysdale Hurls Fifth Shutout

Spot with NY SWEEPS—2 Col Philadelphia—UPI—The Los Angeles Dodgers, watching the closing days of the season fly by from their fourth place position, were awaiting the opening battle of a two-game series against the Philadelphia Phillies tonight and probably doing some wishing.

The Dodgers, 11 games behind a Pittsburgh team that was supposed to have fallen by the wayside a month ago, most likely are wishing the season was a lot longer or they could turn back the clock to May or even June.

Because Don Drysdale, Los Angeles' rocket-armed pitcher, has finally started to roll. Drysdale, who was disappointing as anyone on the club in the early part of the year when he consistently got belted from the mound, beat Milwaukee, 2-0, Sunday at County stadium.

The two-hit shutout was big D's fourth consecutive win and second straight shutout. He now has five shutouts this year.

In stopping the Braves Don ran his string of scoreless innings to 21 in a row. In fact, the tail, sidarmer has given up but one run in the last 38 frames. Drysdale, hurling his 15th complete game of the season, ran his record to 14-13.

Blanket Lien Filed Against Salem Senators

Salem—UPI—Dwight Jordan, president of the Salem Senators baseball club, said Saturday he has filed a blanket lien against the Northwest league team's franchise.

Jordan said the action, taken with league President Jim Fleishman, was on behalf of the club's creditors.

It means that the Salem team cannot operate until it pays all its debts. Jordan operates the club under lease agreement with the Salem Senators, Inc., which owns the franchise and Waters field.

The vice president Salem Senators, Inc., Walter Zosel, charged Jordan with killing baseball in Salem.

Jordan said he had some \$7,000 in advertising coming in and bills of about \$5,500 to pay.
