Biological Puzzler Called Plankton

The biggest problem is already solved, the ocean is right at the front door. Now all we need is a muslin net and a microscope.

A swoop with the net in the sea water and we have several million, give or take a few hundred, tiny animals classified under the all-embracing name of "dinoflagellata," and others of like ilk, such as noctiluca, radiolaria and assorted micro-organisms that hobnob together and make up the much publicized plankton that floats on the surface of the ocean.
