

Three Teams Permitted To Print Series Ducats; Playing Dates Scheduled

New York — (UPI) — The New York Yankees, Pittsburgh Pirates and Baltimore Orioles have given the go-ahead to print tickets for the World Series which will begin in the National League city on Wednesday, Oct. 5.

Commissioner Ford Frick said Tuesday there will be a day off each time the Series site shifts and pointed out that even the starting date would have to be changed in the event a playoff becomes necessary in either league.

Both American and National leagues provide for a best-of-three-games playoff in case of a tie. If a tie does develop, a day off will be scheduled between the end of a playoff and the start of the series.

Six Clubs Present
National league president Warren Giles and officials of

six clubs attended Tuesday's meeting with Frick. In addition to the Yankees, Pirates and Orioles, representatives from the Chicago White Sox, Milwaukee Braves and St. Louis Cardinals also attended.

But the Yankees, Pirates and Orioles were the only ones given permission to print tickets immediately.

Frick's decision to schedule days off for travel and rest was unusual in view of the fact the Series most likely will be played in cities relatively close to each other.

Pittsburgh, which has a comfortable cushion in the NL isn't too far from New York, Baltimore or Chicago.

Starts Oct. 5
The first two games were scheduled for the National League city, Oct. 5 and 6; the next three at the American league site, Oct. 8, 9, and 10; and the final two, if necessary, back in the NL city, Oct. 12 and 13.

All games will start at 1 p.m. local time, except Sunday games in New York or Baltimore, which will start at 2 p.m. All games will be televised by NBC.

There was no change in ticket prices, which will be the same as they have been the past few years. Box seats were priced at \$10 each; reserved grandstand at \$7, standing room at \$4, and bleachers at \$2. Each club will make its own arrangements for the sale of tickets.

Phils Extend Mauch Contract

The Dodgers were fired up for a strong battle to keep up their winning pace after sweeping a doubleheader Tuesday night with Philadelphia.

Stan Williams (13-8) will be on the mound for Los Angeles against Vernon Law (19-7) of the Pirates in the opener.

A's, Tigers Win Over NY, Orioles

If no one else wants the American league pennant, the Chicago White Sox will gladly take it.

That's how the situation shapes up today what with the New York Yankees and the Baltimore Orioles both floundering around like Little Leaguers while the White Sox are thundering down the stretch with one of the hottest finishes since the 1951 Giants.

Only a week ago, the White Sox trailed by 4½ games and everyone had counted them out except their manager, Al Lopez, who insisted they still would come on to win. Lopez was promptly written off as an eternal optimist.

But maybe he knew something, and it certainly looks that way in the face of a six-game winning streak that has carried his spurring Sox to within two games of first place.

Win On Homer
Nellie Fox brought the White Sox their sixth straight triumph Tuesday night when he hammered his second homer of the season with two out in the 11th inning for a 6-5 decision over the Washington Senators.

Fox, on a hitting tear since returning to the lineup following a virus infection, hit his game-winning homer off Tom Morgan. Reliever Frank Baumann scored his 11th victory. Bob Allison of Washington hit his 14th homer and teammate Harmon Killebrew his 30th.

The victory boosted the White Sox within seven percentage points of the second place Orioles, who were defeated by the Detroit Tigers, 3-1. Baltimore remained a game behind the first-place Yankees, who were crushed 12-3, by the last place Kansas City Athletics. Cleveland moved within a half-game of fourth place with a 5-3 win over Boston.

In the National league, the San Francisco Giants beat the league-leading Pittsburgh Pirates, 6-3; the St. Louis Cardinals cut the distance between themselves and the Pirates by defeating the Milwaukee Braves, 6-5, in 11 innings; the Cincinnati Reds beat the Chicago Cubs, 8-8, and the Los Angeles Dodgers swept a two-night doubleheader from the Philadelphia Phils, 2-1 in 10 innings and 4-1.

Jim Bunning held the Orioles to three hits in gaining his 10th triumph for the Tigers. The only run off him came on Ron Hansen's 21st homer in the seventh. Norm Cash hit his 18th homer off loser Milt Pappas (13-10) in the first inning and Rocky Colavito belted his 29th with one on in the fourth.

Dick Williams drove in six runs for the Athletics with a homer, double and a single against the Yankees. Williams hit his homer with two on in the first inning off loser Whitey Ford to give the A's a lead they never relinquished. Bud Daley held the Yanks to eight hits for his 15th victory against 14 losses.

Don Newcombe's scoreless relief stint over the last 5 1/3 innings helped the Indians to their victory over the Red Sox. Newcombe took over for starter Nick Stigman, who was knocked out with a three-run burst in the fourth. The Tribe clinched the outcome with a four-run rally off Tom Brewer in the second.

Lefty Mike McCormick was nicked for 10 hits, but he had it in the clutch as he fanned 13 men and only really slipped when Roberto Clemente whacked a two-run homer off him in the seventh.
