

Nicklaus, Lewis Hot in National

St. Louis, Mo. — UPI — Defending champion Jack Nicklaus and unknown Charles Lewis, both among the hot test scorers so far in the National Amateur golf tournament, take over an even larger portion of the spotlight today.

Each clipped five strokes off par Tuesday, the best scoring so far, to lead a field reduced to 84 into today's third and fourth rounds, the first day of double tours of the

6,618-yard St. Louis Country club.
But the luck of the draw pits each of them against tough opponents in the morning round, and if both win, they tangle with each other in the afternoon.

Nicklaus faces a former national collegiate champion, P.C. Phil Rodgers, who was a quarterfinalist in the 1957 Amateur, and Lewis, the 19-year-old son of a Little Rock, Ark., golf professional, faces 23-year-old Richard L. Sidrow, also a potent shotmaker, in the first two rounds.

Nicklaus goes into the scrap with a record of two under par for 33 holes, and Rodgers is two over for 17. Lewis, despite Tuesday's hot round, is even for 32 holes and Sidrow, two under for 11 holes Tuesday, was even par for 15 holes in his first match.

Dick Yost Advances

St. Louis—UPI—Three Oregon golfers advanced into the third round while three others were eliminated in the National Amateur Golf Tournament Tuesday.

Keeping the state's hopes alive were Dick Yost, Tom Liljeholm and Jerry Cundari, all of Portland. Liljeholm posted a 5 and 4 win over Larry Beck of Kingston, N.C.; Yost defeated Mike Andonian, Rochester, Minn., 2 and 1, and Cundari got by Frank Delvito of Livingston, N.J., 4 and 3.

Bob Smith and Chuck Weston of Portland and Alan Jensen of Corvallis were beaten. Smith dropped a 1-up decision to Alex Welsh of Rockford, Ill.; Jensen was defeated, 3 and 1, by Jorge Ledesma, Buenos Aires, and Weston lost to Arnold Blum of Macon, Ga., 4 and 3.

Siegmund Golf Victor

Eugene—UPI—Defending champion Mrs. Frank Fisk of Portland and medalist Shirley Siegmund of Eugene posted victories in the opening round of the match play Oregon Women's Golf Association Tuesday.

Mrs. Fisk won by the largest score of the day in eliminating Mrs. J. Fred Yahn of Eugene, 7 and 6, and Mrs. Siegmund, winner of the recent Southern Oregon golf championships, defeated Mrs. Robert Martin of Portland, 5 and 4.

Quarterfinal matches were scheduled today. Finals are due Friday.

Two Defenders Win Openers In Oregon Senior Tourney

Defending champions in two divisions of the Oregon Senior Golfers Association annual tournament sailed through the opening round matches Tuesday but a third 1959 winner was ousted from championship flight contention.

W. H. Blakely, Waverley, Portland, last year's champ in Class AA, drubbed Art Nikand, Columbia-Edgewater, Portland, 7 and 6. The two played out the full 18, although the match ended on the 12th hole and Fleskes was three over the course par of 72.

E. E. Erickson, Columbia-Edgewater, defending in Class AAA, was relegated to the first flight of his division. Roy Hixson, Eugene, eliminated him 5 and 4.

Two tourney medalists also won and another lost, in the pattern of the defending players. Al Remlinger, Hood River, who qualified with a 76 in Class A, turned back Ralph Lomax, Riverside, Portland, 3 and 2. In Triple A Ward Cummings, Roseburg, moved ahead by 2 and 1 over W. E. Naylor, Bend, Harry Gustafson, Salem, eliminated Larry Bassett, Grants Pass, Double A low qualifier. The score was 2 up.

Second round matches were being conducted today. Finals will be on Friday.

Matches of local interest in the Class A rivalry saw Marvin Clark, Grants Pass, defeat Dr. M. S. Roseblatt, Tualatin, 1 up with a seven-foot putt for a birdie four on the 18th hole, and Dom Provost Sr., Ashland, subdued Moon Mullis, Klamath Falls, 3 and 2. Provost, president of the OSCA, and Clark were foes today.

Blakely versus Milne
Blakely went out today against Del Milne, Salem, and Remlinger opposed Charles Wells, Forest Hills. Milne nosed out Gene Bowman, Waverley, 1 up and Wells defeated H. A. Milby, Coos Bay, 3 and 2.

In Class AA Fleskes met Dr. Merle Taylor, Waverley, who won his opener 2 and 1 from Leon J. Ryan, Portland Golf club. Opponent of Gustafson was Rudy Taggesell, Columbia-Edgewater, victor by 5 and 4 over Harry Miller, Salem.

Cummings' Triple A adversary today was Bob Smith, PGC, who won from Harold Murch, PGC, 4 and 3, and Hixson opposed Dr. Roy Reynolds, Salem. Reynolds won from Walter Fisher, Roseburg, 3 and 2.

Clark in his match rallied from an early 3 down situation. He cut the gap with birds on No. 7 and 8 greens and pulled even on No. 10. Clark went 1 up on 16 but Roseblatt birdied 17 to even the game. Provost was four up in his match after 10 holes. Milne was 2 down after nine holes. He took No. 10 and 11. From there a see-saw match developed. Milne went ahead on No. 16 with a bogey.
