

Jet Bombers Collide Over Atlantic

One Limp Into Shannon Airport; Other Disappears

Shannon, Ireland—UPI—Two U. S. Air Force jet bombers collided in flight over the Atlantic Ocean today. One plunged into the sea, presumably killing its crew, but the other limped safely to Shannon airport with a dangling engine.

British and United States rescue craft sped to the scene but officials said there was little chance any crewmen survived the crash.

Flying in Formation

The two planes were B47s—six-engine turbojet bombers. They were flying in formation with a third B47 when the collision occurred about 240 miles off the west coast of Ireland. A B47 normally carries a crew of three.

Capt. John Brennan of Evansville, Ind., managed to pilot his crippled plane to Shannon with the undamaged plane escorting him.

A spokesman at the Plattsburgh, N. Y. Air Force base said the two bombers that collided were en route from Plattsburgh to England as part of a normal "deployment exercise" at the time of the accident.

Vanished Into Seas

"After the accident it appeared that the other aircraft went into a whirl and vanished into the rough seas below," Brennan said.

In London, officials of the Transcanada Airline said it received six messages from a civil airline reporting that two planes had collided and that one was ditching in the sea.

Plattsburgh officials said the planes were unarmed. The planes are the same as the type shot down last July 1 over the Barents Sea by Soviet fighters.

West Tells Russians Aircraft Will Be Kept Flying To West Berlin Despite Harassment

Berlin—UPI—The western allies warned the Russians today that they will keep aircraft flying to isolated West Berlin, and rejected the Soviet attempt to limit use of the airway lifelines to the isolated city. They also warned that they would hold the Russians responsible for Communist interference with traffic into the city. This followed a Russian go-ahead to the East German Reds to interfere with anything other than military traffic on highways going into Berlin. The East Germans said they would bar all their "enemies" from the western outpost.

The Big Three also stood firm on their occupation rights under the four power agreement with the Russians and flatly refused to accept the Soviet contention that these

Andrews To Face Gov. Rosellini

Seattle—UPI—Gov. Albert D. Rosellini and Lloyd J. Andrews were matched in the Nov. 8 general election today after the Republican challenger rolled up a landslide victory over State Rep. Newman Clark in Tuesday's Washington primary election.

With 4,788 of the state's 5,142 precincts, more than 90 per cent, reporting, Andrews had outpolled Rosellini while swamping Clark by a majority of nearly 85,000 votes.

Andrews' total was 233,932, Clark had 149,180. On the Democratic ballot, the governor had 216,490, John Patric had 26,340, and Bruce Sigman had 21,558.

The United States, Britain and France expressed their firm stand on Berlin in statements made by government spokesmen in London, Bonn and Berlin.

The western allies and West Germany are considering a trade embargo against East Germany in retaliation against Communist harassment, a government spokesman said today.

A West German spokesman said after a press conference in Bonn that his government would refuse permits to all would-be exhibitors at the next East German bi-annual trade fair in Leipzig as part of the plan to discourage West German businessmen from taking part.

This reprisal was expected to hit the East Germans hard because there were more than 1,000 West German firms represented at the last fair. It closed last Sunday.

Salem—UPI—Purchase of the Karafotis property at 1855 SW Broadway in Portland by Portland State college for \$25,000 was approved Tuesday by the State Board of Higher Education.

The property immediately adjoins the south classroom building now under construction.

The board also approved purchase of the Wyatt property in La Grande near the Eastern Oregon college campus, for \$1,200, and the Cutting property in Corvallis within the campus boundaries of Oregon State college. The state has an option for \$6,450.

Swimming Team Transfers Its Swim to YMCA

Medford's municipal swimming team has transferred its "300-mile swim to Portland" to the local YMCA this week due to closure of the city's swimming pools.

The team, which is swimming the 300 miles within the confines of local swimming pools, has undertaken the "herculean" task as a means of keeping in shape throughout the fall and winter months.

Ahead in the marathon at the first of this week was Ted Lyons, 18, son of the municipal swim coach, Ken Lyons, who has so far swam 18 1/2 miles of the necessary distance.

Each of the some 40 members of the team are attempting to swim the 300 miles in their leisure time before the swimming competition begins next year. Lyons estimates that the journey will take from four to five months to complete.

Under YMCA Auspices

During the fall and winter months the team will be swimming largely under the auspices of the local YMCA and will compete in some eight to 10 swim meets that will be held throughout the state during the off-season months.

The team is working out three nights a week at the YMCA: on Mondays from 6 to 8 p.m., on Thursdays from 6 to 7:30 p.m., and on Fridays from 9:30 to 11 p.m.

Lyons says that all persons who are interested in swimming for the team should turn out at these practices. Boys and girls of all ages are eligible, he said. Team members will have to attend at least two of the three practices to continue team membership.
