

Long Time Between Septembers, Khrushchev Will Find on U.N. Visit

Washington - UPI - The cast is the same. So is the scene, and it's September again - but now the script has changed! Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's forth coming visit to the United States will emphasize in dramatic terms the change in the international climate since the bouncy Russian leader visited this country one year ago.

The wreckage of a moth-like American plane deep inside Russia, the summit conference in Paris that collapsed before it began, gun fire in The Congo and chaos in Cuba - it's been a long time between Septembers.

The once-promising nuclear test ban talks in Geneva are stalled. East-West disarmament negotiations have broken down in complete disagreement. American tourists, warmly welcomed in Russia only a few months ago, now are expelled from the country as spies.

No Warm Welcome
American officials are ready to give Khrushchev the big chill when he arrives in New York Sept. 19 to lead his country's United Nations delegation. They pointedly explained that he is coming to the United Nations and not to the United States as such. He has not been invited to Washington.

President Eisenhower has said there is but a very slim chance he will agree to meet with the man who has called him a dangerous incompetent, fit only to run a children's home. Eisenhower is expected to time his own visit to the United Nations to avoid the possibility of being maneuvered into a meeting with Mr. K. It was all very different on the sunny morning of Sept. 15 a year ago at Andrews Air Force Base near Washington when Eisenhower extended warm greetings to the ebullient Soviet premier and subsequently was praised by Khrushchev as a truly peace-loving man who enjoyed the support of the majority of the American people, likewise peace-loving.

After a hectic tour of the United States, Khrushchev left Washington with words of tribute for his host. He and Eisenhower, in intimate discussions at the U.S. presidential retreat at Camp David, had laid the basis for the summit conference which the United States had so long resisted.

Some Are Cautious
True enough, some Cassandras in the State and Defense department warned against placing too much reliance on the "detente" - the lessening of tensions which Khrushchev insisted on calling the "Camp David Spirit." These cautious ones warned that the deep basic differences between the two countries made it extremely dangerous to assume that any real progress could be made toward eliminating the flash points in the explosive world situation.

Some officials think Khrushchev may really be deluded in the belief that the majority of American people are taken in by his approach to the world scene and are ready to reject some of the major position taken by the U.S. administration. If he should give evidence of making such an assumption, both Democratic and Republican leaders are expected to disabuse him of the idea - if the coolness of his reception by the American people this time doesn't accomplish it first.

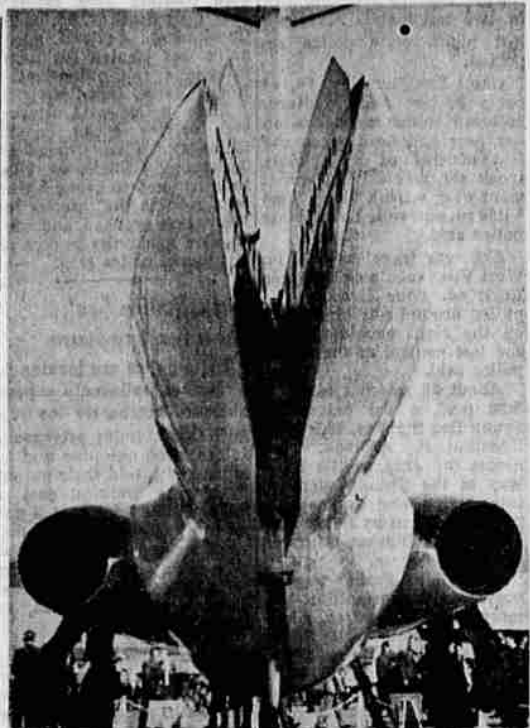
Bruce Manley, Medford, was appointed attorney for Jack Jones, 27, of Fremont, Calif., who is involved in the same case.

Brother, Sister Are Reunited in Medford

A brother and sister were reunited in Medford this week after being separated for 33 years without knowing each other's whereabouts.

The sister is Mrs. Gladys Milford, 55, of 1005 West Main st., who has lived here since 1930. Her brother is Percy T. Webb, Glendale, Calif.

The reunion also involved a number of introductions. Mrs. Milford had never met her brother's wife. He had never met his sister's grandchildren.

Following a letter to Medford Police Chief Charles Champlin, the Medford police asked the Mail Tribune to publish a story that Webb was looking for his sister, believed to be living in this area.

The paper was not long of the press when a friend at Sacred Heart hospital, where Mrs. Milford works as a practical nurse, saw the story and showed it to her. Following a letter to Webb Sept. 3, the brother wired he was coming to Medford.

Urged to Seek Sister
"I thought she was dead all these years," Webb remarked. "Why she is more alive than I am!" The 60-year-old man was urged by his wife to look for his sister when he kept remarking he was the only person left in his family.

There were two other brothers and another sister, all of whom have died. Webb is an industrial caterer in Glendale.

Higher Education Board Has Big Plans for OTI

Salem - UPI - A joint meeting of the state boards of education and higher education was held Tuesday that the state system of higher education has big plans for Oregon Technical Institute, which came under the system's wing July 1.

The Klamath Falls school has been under the board of education for the past 13 years. The 1959 legislature ordered the institute to be placed under higher education.

Chancellor John R. Richards said architects are working on plans for a new OTI campus.

Tied With High Schools
Richards said the board of higher education feels that at the present time OTI should remain closely "articulated" or tied-in, with high schools.

He remarked that this is a continuing problem at other colleges in the system, partly because professors tend to "look down their noses" at high school curricula. He described this as an "intellectual conflict."

Richards said there are no plans to establish full professorships at OTI for the present, but that its current staff is in a better position because it has been taken into the "more stable tenure program" offered by the state system of higher education.

WAR ON RATS
