Nine States Pick Candidates In Primary Vote

November candidates emerged from nine state primary elections today facing campaign trails equally as rugged and uncertain as those confronting national standard bearers.

There were few surprises. But voters responded enthusiastically, here and there in near-record numbers, to familiar candidates and active politicking.

The primaries decided congressional, gubernatorial and state candidates in Arizona, Colorado, Massachusetts, Minnesota, New Hampshire, Utah, Vermont, Washington and Wisconsin.

Massachusetts recorded a major upset, handing Springfield Mayor Thomas J. O'Connor the Democratic U. S. Senate nomination over Gov. Foster Furcolo.

In Arizona, poll workers reported about a 50 per cent turnout of registered voters. Neither Gov. Paul Fannin, a Republican, nor Rep. Stewart Udall, a strong Kennedy backer and new state party leader, had primary opposition. Observers predicted a light vote might indicate both Udall and Kennedy had lost favor with conservative Democrats in Arizona, home state of conservative GOP Sen. Barry Goldwater.

In Utah, George D. Clyde, a Republican, won nomination for a second term as governor. He will be opposed by William A. Barlocker, 39, turkey grower and St. George Mayor who, if elected, would be Utah's second youngest chief executive.

In Washington, only a small voter turnout was reported in the GOP gubernatorial nomination race where state Schools Superintendent Lloyd J. Andrews defeated Rep. Newman "Zeke" Clark.

Higher Education Budget Request To Be \$49,057,299

Salem-UPH-A recommended appropriation of \$49,057,299 to run the state's colleges and universities in the next biennium was approved Tuesday by the State Board of Higher Education.

The request will go to the governor and the 1961 legislature.

The amount is \$6,338,079 more than the appropriation for the current biennium but reflects a reduction of \$1,002,654 in original request from various schools in the state system.

The board's finance committee said the cuts, mostly in additions to teaching and service staffs, are in line with a request from Gov. Mark Hatfield to all departments stressing the need for holding money requests for the 1961-63 biennium to the "lowest possible amount," consistent with a satisfactory quality of service.

Estimated income from student fees and other non-state sources for the next biennium total \$22,424,431, bringing the proposed expenditure of all funds for campus instruction and general services to \$71,481,730. The proposed budget represents an increase of nine per cent over the present annual operating level.

The budget covers all operating costs of the University of Oregon, Oregon State College, Oregon College of Education, Southern Oregon College, Eastern Oregon College, Portland State College, the statewide General Extension program and Oregon Technical Institute.

Additional budget breakdowns, by category, include: Teaching hospital and clinics \$5,531,581; agricultural research \$4,861,412; federal cooperative extension \$4,803,561; crippled children's division \$1,295,455; and university state tuberculosis hospital \$1,176,435. No state money was requested for dental clinics. The estimated costs of \$460,000 are expected to come from non-state sources.

A total of 171 new teachers were requested, 124 of them in the first year of the biennium. This would make Oregon's student-teacher ratio 16.1 to 1 compared to the national average of 13 to 1.

The board noted the governor requested that no salary adjustments be included in the biennial budget. Hatfield has indicated he will recommend separately a salary adjustment program for all state employees.

The board awarded equipment contracts for operation of Channel 10, KOAP-TV, in Portland. Two contracts totaling \$110,566 are for a transmitter, antenna and auxiliary and studio equipment to link Channel 10 with Channel 7 in Corvallis, to Motorola Communications & Electronics Inc., and a contract for \$7,200 to Valley Construction Co., Portland, for strengthening and modifying the radio tower at Healy Heights in southwest Portland.

The board also approved: Creation of a school of social work at Portland State College with classes to begin in fall, 1962, pending action of the 1961 legislature. Establishment of a water resources research institute at Oregon State College costing \$11,500, under administration of the agricultural experiment station. Establishment of a department of research in teaching and learning at Oregon College of Education costing \$17,069.
