

Lumumba Flees to UN Forces for Protection

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Soviet Ships Raise Speculation Russia Planning New Space Feat

Man-in-Space Launch Possible During K's Visit

Ships Deployed In Both Oceans

Washington—UPI—The presence of missile-tracking Soviet ships in both the Atlantic and Pacific aroused speculation today that Russia may be planning a new space feat to lend a dramatic backdrop to Nikita Khrushchev's United Nations debut next week.

The Navy announced that the Russian ships, bristling with electronic gear, have been deployed in both oceans. The assumption that a Soviet space exploit might be in the offing was based on past Russian practices.

Wide Range of Guesses
Just before Khrushchev's U.S. tour a year ago, the Soviets hit the moon with a rocket. The Russian premier presented President Eisenhower with a replica of the hammer and sickle emblem deposited by the rocket on the moon.

Just what Khrushchev had up his sleeve this time provoked a wide range of guesses. There was speculation it might be an attempt to launch a man into space and bring him back. Or, it could be a new long-range missile experiment.

Rep. James M. Quigley, (D-Pa.), a member of the House Space committee, told a Democratic rally at Hagerstown, Md., that the Soviets might try a man-in-space launch during Khrushchev's visit. He noted that "three times in recent history Russian space exploits have preceded important tours by Soviet personalities."

Moving Across Pacific
The Navy said three ships, electronically equipped and carrying helicopters, were moving across the central Pacific toward the area where the Russians fired intercontinental missiles earlier this year.

In addition, the Navy said, a tanker with a helicopter and electronic gear, accompanied by a tug, had been spotted in the north central Atlantic.

U.S. Asks for Full Council Support For Hammarskjöld

United Nations, N. Y. —UPI—The United States, blasting Russia's efforts to undermine the United Nations pacifying effort in the Congo, formally called on the Security Council today to give full support to Secretary-General Dag Hammarskjöld.

U.S. Ambassador James J. Wadsworth accused the Russians of imperialist penetration of the Congo and warned that if the U.N. Congo action failed there was a threat of unilateral action by "many parties."

Scathing Attack
Hammarskjöld was subjected to a scathing attack in the council Wednesday night by Soviet Deputy Foreign Minister Valerian A. Zorin. Wadsworth told the council today Zorin's attack was "slander."

Boy Admits Starting Four Small Fires

A 12-year-old Medford boy has admitted to city police that he started four small fires in the east Medford area Wednesday.

Three of the fires were started in a compost pile at the residence of Agnes Cecilia Weiland, 2431 East Main st., about 4 p.m.

The fourth fire was started at 2401 Hillcrest rd., the residence of J. E. Inskeep, a half hour later, police said.

All of the fires were minor, according to police, and were extinguished without difficulty.

Means of Keeping Children Out of Pool Are Sought

In an effort to prevent a possible tragedy, City Recreation Supervisor Ken Lyons asked the parks and recreation commission last night if there is some way that children can be kept out of the Jackson park swimming pool during the fall and winter months.

Lyons said that the water will have to be left in the pool all year in order to prevent damage to the pool itself. He said the department is worried about children possibly climbing over the fence to use the pool, which will not be supervised, and then drowning.

Several ideas, including plastic and wood covers and an alarm system that would go off when the pool water is disturbed, were discussed by the commission but they arrived at no decision.

Commission Chairman Russ Jamison asked Lyons to inquire and find out how other cities are meeting this problem, and then report back to the commission at its next meeting.

In the interim, he said, the police department will be required to make periodic checks to make sure the pool is not being used. In addition, he suggested the pool lights be left on during the last "dog days" of summer.

The Hawthorne pool will be drained as it is every year, Lyons said.

Water will have to be left in Jackson pool, Lyons noted, because of its gunite-type construction. If all the water were to be drained out of the pool then ground water would seep through the gunite and in cold weather would freeze next to the plaster inner-coating of the pool, causing it to crack. When the pool is filled the water counteracts this force, he explained.

The fact that the water would have to be left in the pool year-round was known at the time it was constructed, he said.

Chinook Pass Area Fire Uncontrolled

Yakima, Wash. —UPI—Crews fighting a forest fire north of the Chinook Pass Highway about 32 miles west of here hoped to bring the blaze under control today.

Officials at the Naches Ranger Station said 300 men were manning the fire lines, including U.S. Forest Service crews from North Bend and Redmond, Ore., and 60 volunteers from Yakima.

Sawmills and lumber firms also sent equipment and men to battle the blaze, which started Wednesday afternoon, apparently from a cigarette thrown out of a car window.

Two Air Force planes today circled over the capsule, the size of an orange crate, waiting to point it out for the amphibian which was to land and pull it from the ocean.

The Hawaiian-based amphibian, a Coast Guard JC54, was to have arrived at the area near Christmas Island where Discoverer XV's capsule floated this morning.

The instrument-loaded capsule had been expected to come down near Hawaii Wednesday after it was ejected from the orbiting Discoverer satellite.

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Planners Urge Buying Land for Road Crossing

The Jackson county planning commission last night recommended to the county court that it start acquiring right of way property for the proposed highway crossing at Voorhies crossing.

At a meeting Aug. 9 here with state highway department representatives, the planning commission suggested that an underpass or overpass be constructed at Voorhies crossing south of Medford to take traffic across the new Pacific freeway. This would mean extending a road to the Hillcrest-Phoenix rd.

Last night the planning commission also suggested it might be possible to extend Ellendale ave. to connect with the Voorhies crossing road.

Any further recommendations by local groups of signs along the new freeway and at its interchanges should be made to the state highway department by Sept. 15 State Highway Engineer W. C. Williams wrote the county planning commission. The state highway commission will call

for bids on the Seven Oaks, Central Point and Crater Lake interchanges paving contract on Nov. 1, according to the letter.

Williams' letter confirmed most of the recommendations for signs made at the Aug. 9 meeting.

Williams wrote that he understands the city of Ashland wants to use the designation "U. S. 99 Business" route between the north and south Ashland interchanges over the present highway. Medford apparently does not want to use a similar designation for the route between Crater Lake and Barnett rd. interchanges, he added.

Replying to a recommendation by Otto Brown, Crater Lake National park superintendent, Williams wrote, "Our previous and continuing recommendation is to use the words Crater Lake on a sign facing northbound traffic at the Crater Lake interchange and on a sign for southbound traffic at the Rock point interchange."

The words "national park" do not have to be on the sign since Crater Lake's importance enough not to need the additional word, Williams explained.

Planning Technician Jack Eaton was directed last night to set a date 30 days for a public hearing on possible formation of a Sius Valley zoning district.

Petitions bearing 52 approved signatures have been turned into the planning commission office requesting zoning of the area into a single family, agricultural, industrial and commercial area. Fifty signatures are required on petitions.

Eaton suggested the commission decide how much land should be retained for agriculture. This is important to the county's economy since it is primarily agricultural, he said.

Commissioner Gerald Latham said some agricultural operations will have to be abandoned to housing developments when population pressure builds up and tax burdens increase enough to make it unprofitable to operate agriculturally in some areas.

Hatfield Again On Campaign Trail

Salem —UPI—Gov. Mark Hatfield caught his breath today, then launched into the second phase of a statewide campaign tour on behalf of Republican candidates.

He left today for southern and eastern Oregon with Ron Phair of Klamath Falls, GOP candidate for Congress in the 2nd district.

Hatfield planned speeches in Lakeview, Klamath Falls, Burns, Nyssa and Baker.

All of the addresses were to be from the steps of courthouses, with the exception of the Nyssa stop where he was to appear before an American GI forum.

Friday Hatfield and Phair will appear again in Baker, and at La Grande, Ontario, Heppner, Condon and Kinzua. Speeches in John Day and Moro are scheduled for Saturday.

Bomb Reported at Salem Grade School

Salem —UPI—Salem Heights Grade school had a bomb scare Wednesday.

The school was emptied after an anonymous caller telephoned the school to say there was a bomb in the building. A careful search was made by state and county officers and school officials but no bomb was found.

Bright Future Seen For Egg Production

Turkey egg production in the Rogue Valley has a bright future, according to John W. Hough, editor of Turkey World magazine. He spoke Wednesday night at a meeting of local turkey egg producers at the Rogue Valley Country Club.

Alvin Hart, owner-manager of Hart's Hatchery, was in charge of the meeting. Hough, who has degrees from the University of Vermont and Cornell university,

has been editor of Turkey World for 2½ years and has served as extension poultry specialist for the University of Massachusetts.

Speaking of southern Oregon, Hough said that "the people in this valley are fortunate in having a good bird which is well accepted throughout the country." He referred to the over 2 million Hart-Schneider strain turkey eggs which were shipped by Hart's hatchery last year to many parts of the United States and Canada.

Nikita Bringing Disarmament Plans

London —UPI—Soviet diplomats revealed today that Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev is carrying two alternative plans for world-wide disarmament to the U.N. General Assembly in New York.

Khrushchev intends to propose first total nuclear and conventional disarmament in a set period.

The plan broadly resembles the one he put before the United Nations last fall when he visited the United States for talks with President Eisenhower.

Alternately, Khrushchev will offer phased partial disarmament, the sources said.

This plan in turn will follow broadly the proposals made by the Russians at the unsuccessful Geneva disarmament conference this summer.

Hurricane Ethel Hits Mississippi

Pascagoula, Miss. —UPI—Hurricane Ethel slammed into Pascagoula today with 75 mile an hour winds, causing widespread property damage.

Most of the town's 12,000 residents had taken shelter in schools, churches or other stout structures and there were no immediate reports of persons injured.

The streets of Pascagoula were littered with broken glass, felled trees and signs snatched from their moorings by the high winds.

Local weather officials predicted the eye of the storm would pass over Pascagoula or Biloxi, or between them.

Albany Child Hurt When Struck by Car

Albany, Ore. —UPI—Katherine Christman, 5, Albany, was reported in "poor" condition in a hospital today after she was struck by a car Wednesday night.

Police said the girl came from behind a parked car and was struck by an oncoming vehicle.

Ghanian Troops Ring Building To Save Premier

Congolese Forces Invade Katanga

Leopoldville, The Congo —UPI—Angry Congolese troops tried to attack Premier Patrice Lumumba today and sent him fleeing to United Nations forces for protection.

Lumumba, who several days ago threatened to order the United Nations out of this chaotic country, found shelter in the officers' mess at suburban Camp Leopold II. Ghanian soldiers of the U.N. force ringed the building to save the premier from the Congolese troops who were trying to get at him.

Troops Invade Katanga
The attack on Lumumba came as 300 troops of the central Congolese army, supposedly loyal to him, invaded the secessionist Katanga Province.

The violence came during 24 hours of bewildering developments including:

—An announcement Wednesday night by Col. Joseph Mobutu, army chief of staff, that the military was seizing power in a "peaceful revolution" and "neutralizing" Lumumba and President Joseph Kasavubu until the end of the year.

Rumors Fly
—An announcement by a Lumumba spokesman that Mobutu had been arrested, a statement that was seriously doubted by most observers. Mobutu appeared to have the upper hand in his battle with Lumumba.

—An announcement by officers of the Ghana brigade that Lumumba had been in touch with Kasavubu, his arch political rival, and that the two would meet later tonight at Camp Leopold II.

—Disclosure that Gen. Victor Lundula, Lumumba's army commander—or former commander, since he was ordered relieved by Kasavubu—had locked himself in a laundry closet of a Camp Leopold dwelling for his own protection.

A U.N. spokesman said Lumumba fled to Camp Leopold after Mobutu made his takeover announcement Wednesday night.

Embezzlement Case Not Dismissed

The case of Mrs. Eva A. Sanford, Medford, who is charged with embezzlement from the local Montgomery Ward store, will be brought before the Jackson county jury on Oct. 5, according to District Attorney Thomas J. Reeder.

Earlier this week District Court Judge E. Roy Bashaw signed an order exonerating her from bail and releasing her from arrest.

The order was signed by Judge Bashaw on the basis that more than 60 days have passed since she was arrested and brought before the court and the date for preliminary hearing set. No preliminary hearing was held and no indictment was found, Bashaw noted. Charges were not dismissed.

Hugo Blaze Covers 200 Acres of Brush

Grants Pass—A fire which broke out along railroad tracks about 1½ miles west of Hugo in mid-afternoon yesterday spread through 200 acres of brush and some timber, the state department of forestry reported.

The blaze was thought to be under control this morning. It apparently started from railroad equipment, according to forest patrolmen.

Porter Opens Campaign With Talk in City Park; Points To Difference on Issues

More than 75 persons and an undetermined number of mosquitoes attended a talk Wednesday evening in Medford by Congressman Charles O. Porter. Previously announced for the Labor Temple, the hall was unavailable and the crowd gathered in the Medford library park for the campaign talk.

Porter, in his first campaign appearance in the valley this fall, outlined his views on international affairs and cited three issues in the campaign where he differs from his opponent, Dr. Edwin Durno, Medford.

Speaking above the noise of street traffic, and the chimes of the Presbyterian church, Porter said that he hadn't

been backward about telling people where "I stand on issues." He said the first duty of a Congressman is to make himself available to his constituents since he represents the people.

The congressman listed medical care for aging, aid to education, and federal housing programs as the three major issues where his opinions differ from Dr. Durno's. Although, he added, he "did not know Durno's stand on the FHA," he did know "he (Durno) was against public housing and urban renewal."

Porter stated that he supported the Forand bill for medical care for the aging, stressed the need for developing our greatest resources,

students, through federal aid to education, and approval of the FHA.

In explaining his views on international affairs, Porter listed three points. He said that the U.S. should not codify dictators, should increase communications with Red China and should step up its effort to fight for disarmament.

He mentioned that only recently has the U.S. condemned Trujillo, something he has felt was necessary for several years. He explained that in recognizing Red China it would not mean that the U.S. approves of the country. He added that this is state department policy and is a means whereby lines of communication may be kept open.

He stressed the need for vast numbers of people working on disarmament instead of the approximate 100 who are now. He added that since 1958 the White House has not had an advisor on disarmament.

Speaking on Cuba, Porter said that "we are now reaping what we sowed in Cuba." He described Castro as a product of appeasement of dictators and bad ambassadors to Cuba. He said that while he does not believe Castro to be a Communist, "he has sided with the Reds as a way to get at the United States."

It was announced during a brief business session that a Citizens for Kennedy office will open today at 122 East Eighth st.
