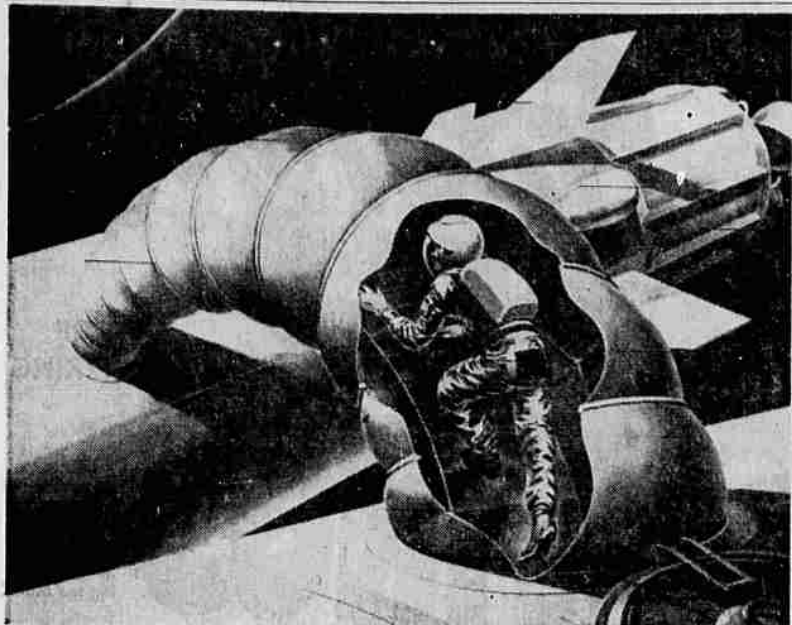




UNIQUE SPACE CRAFT—This is an artist's concept of a General Electric proposal for equipping a spacecraft with means for transferring men or materials to another ship or for use in exterior repair. Named "space hog" after the caissons used by sandhogs, the device consists of a pressure-tight, non-rigid tube or cylinder carrying stiffening rings at selected intervals. When not in use, the device is stored in an air-lock on the spacecraft. To use the space hog for repairs, the device is extended and pressurized.

Then, the spaceman, wearing a light-duty, comfortable suit, crawls into the extension, which can be rotated and flexed so that the working end can sweep over any portion of the mother ship. The outboard end of the space hog would carry such devices as a viewing port, lights, tools, mechanical arms, or an air-lock with traction attachments. The space hog is the concept of engineers at GE's missile and space vehicle department at Philadelphia.

Most Malheur Potatoes Going Into Packages

Salem — UPI — The Oregon Agriculture Department said Wednesday that about 80 per cent of the early potatoes grown in Malheur county this year are going into consumer package products.

The 80 per cent is considerably higher than normal, the department said. Federal Supervisor Pat Murphy said harvest of the Malheur red and white rose potato varieties was all but completed Sept. 7.

Klamath Basin potato shipments began Aug. 3. This crop, normally the biggest potato district in the state, was hit by a freeze Aug. 24 with loss estimates at one-third of the total.

Murphy said the potato harvest in Central Oregon was due to begin this week.

The department said that severe weather conditions earlier this year are showing up in a lighter Bartlett pear crop in both the Medford and Hood River districts, and also in some damage to winter pear varieties.

The department said one unusual development is that 1,000 tons of Anjou pears from the Medford district are going to processors for nectar.

Murphy said the apple harvest, to begin about Oct. 1, appears to be "80 to 90 per cent of the normal crop."

Nixon Woos Votes Of IAM; Kennedy Raps Republicans

Republican presidential nominee Richard M. Nixon stepped in today where his rival left off to court the votes of the million-member International Association of Machinists in St. Louis.

The vice president's Democratic opponent, John F. Kennedy, addressed the IAM Wednesday. The union convention, although still uncommitted, was expected to follow the lead of the AFL-CIO and endorse Kennedy.

But Nixon was ready to indicate that his door would be open to labor if he became president.

After the speech to the IAM, Nixon's schedule was to take him to Atlantic City, N.J., for an address to a convention of the National Federation of Republican Women. His next stop was Roanoke, Va., for a rally at Victory Stadium before moving his whirlwind campaign on to Omaha, Neb.

Visits New Jersey

Kennedy, who spoke at a Liberal Party dinner Wednesday night in New York City, campaigns today in northern New Jersey and Harrisburg, Pa. He scheduled stops at Bergen Mall, Paterson, Newark, Elizabeth, New Brunswick and Trenton—all in New

Jersey—before arriving in the Pennsylvania capital tonight.

At Jersey City, Kennedy charged the Republicans with leading the country to a series of "diplomatic disasters."

"And yet the administration has told us that all is well," he said. "Today, while we stand still, Khrushchev moves."

Nixon unveiled some of his farm ideas Wednesday in a campaign swing through the Midwest. In calling for action to get the farm surplus "off the back" of both farmers and taxpayers, he promised to outline his farm program in more detail at a plowing contest in Guthrie Center, Iowa, Friday.

Nixon also announced the itinerary for a 5,000-mile, 11-state tour taking him into New England, New York, the Midwest and South for the third week of his campaign, starting Sept. 26.

The schedule includes the first of his television debates with Kennedy. It will be televised "live" by the major networks on Sept. 26 from Chicago.

Step Up Pace

The two vice presidential candidates, meanwhile, accelerated their campaign pace.

At Phoenix, Ariz., Wednesday night Democratic candidate Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson wooed the conservative vote on the home grounds of GOP Sen. Barry Goldwater by promising the Democrats "will not increase the present tax rates."

Johnson was due to campaign today in Tucson in a drive to reverse a GOP trend in normally Democratic Arizona, which twice voted for President Eisenhower.

Republican vice presidential candidate Henry Cabot Lodge told audiences in Chicago that Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev had "no vested rights" to move about freely in this country.

Jerry Geisler Hospitalized

Hollywood — UPI — Jerry Geisler, 73, famed attorney who over the years has defended many of Hollywood's biggest stars, was reported in very serious condition today at Mt. Sinai hospital.

Geisler was rushed to the hospital in an ambulance Wednesday after suffering what his physician described as a "major heart attack."

He has suffered three other heart attacks this year.

Dr. Jack A. Sheinkopf said Geisler was under an oxygen tent. He said the attorney had responded slightly to treatment.

Geisler's clients have included Lana Turner, Robert Mitchum and the late Errol Flynn. His most recent case was the behind-the-scenes planning of defense strategy in the murder trial of Carole Tregoff, accused with Dr. R. Bernard Finch of slaying Finch's wife. Geisler's part on Miss Tregoff's behalf was confined to her first trial which ended in a hung jury.

Rudderless Vessel Gets Aid of Tug

Astoria — UPI — The tug Salvage Chief was sent Wednesday to a freighter which lost its rudder about 300 miles west of the Columbia river. The freighter "Willamette" lost its steering gear sometime Tuesday in calm seas on a voyage from the Orient to Portland.

West Coast Steamship Co., owner of the vessel, said neither the 123-foot-long steamer nor its crew of 38 was in any danger.

Owners said the tug would tow the boat to Portland for repairs.

It was carrying no cargo.

Tavern Closing Decision Delayed

Portland — UPI — The Oregon Liquor Control Commission Wednesday postponed a decision whether or not to change the closing time for taverns in Oregon. The matter is to be studied further.

The commission held an earlier hearing Aug. 10 to consider a proposal by the Oregon Restaurant and Beverage Association to extend closing time for taverns from the 1 a.m. now in effect to the 2:30 a.m. closing time of establishments selling hard liquor.

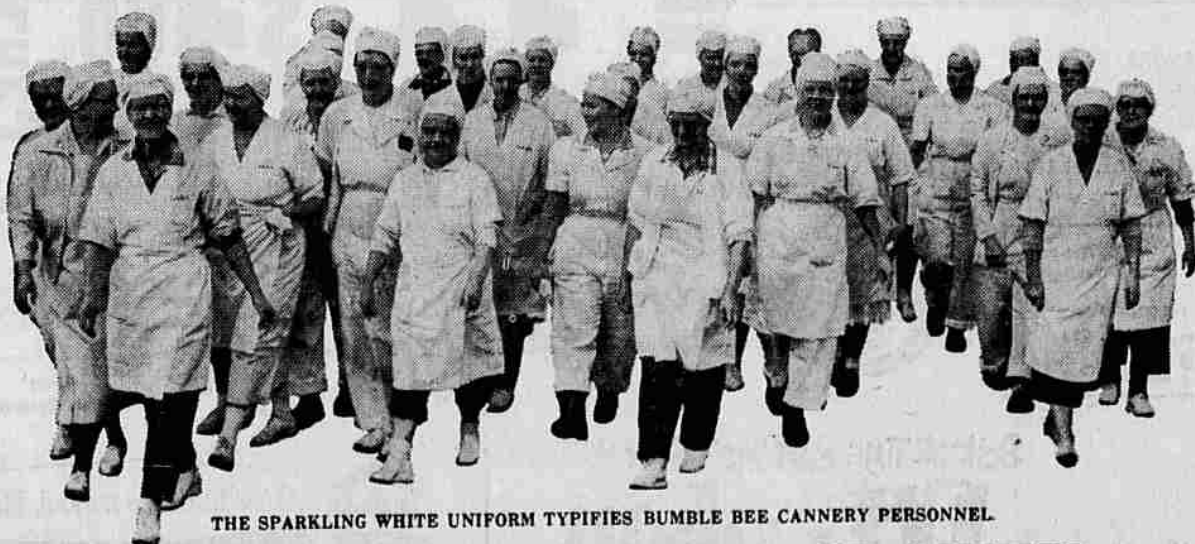
FISHING BOAT CAPSIZES
