Evening Classes For Adults Are Listed by State

Fall term evening classes for adults will begin in Medford, Grants Pass and Central Point the week of Sept. 26. Meetings are scheduled at the high school in each community with most classes meeting once a week from 7 to 9:45 p.m.

College credit courses for off-campus registration are offered through general extension division of the Oregon state system of higher education.

Enrollments in extension evening courses are accepted on either a credit or noncredit basis. Registrations may be completed at the first or second class meeting.

Students who earn credit in extension classes may transfer full credit to any state system institution or elsewhere subject to individual campus requirements.

Fees of \$11 per credit hour, authorized by the state board of higher education, are consistent with charges on state system campuses. All courses and instructors are authorized by the state system institution which originates the extension course.

Classes Listed
The fall term schedule of classes in Josephine and Jackson counties includes:

Medford: Audio-visual aids (Ed 435) (G), three hours, Tuesdays, beginning Sept. 27, Laurence E. Butler, assistant professor of education and director of audio-visual aids, Southern Oregon college.

Central Point: History of the United States (Hist 202), three hours, Tuesdays, beginning Sept. 27, F. D. Haines, associate professor of social science, Southern Oregon college.

Grants Pass: Painting (AA 290), two hours, Wednesdays, beginning Sept. 28, Jean L. Sutherland, assistant professor of art, general extension division.

Methods and research materials: reading (Ed 410) (G), three hours, Friday evenings and Saturday mornings, alternate weeks, beginning Oct. 7, Hazel E. Holboke, assistant professor of education and supervisor of teaching, Oregon College of Education.

General sociology (Soc 404), three hours, Mondays, beginning Sept. 26, Arthur S. Taylor, professor and chairman of social science division, Southern Oregon college.

English composition (Wr 112), three hours, Tuesdays, beginning Sept. 27, Walter J. Arron, assistant professor of English, Southern Oregon college.

Psychiatrist Heard In Trial at Salem

Salem - UPB - An Oregon State Hospital psychiatrist testified Wednesday that he believes James Bird Borden, on trial for first degree murder, "was not psychotic" and "did know the difference between right and wrong" last July 8 when he is accused of strangling Wilma Maxine Spratt.

Dr. William Cloyd said his opinions were based on an interview he had with Borden. The testimony came during cross-examination of Cloyd, who was called to the stand by Borden's court-appointed attorney, Charles Burt.

Burt indicated the defense would conclude its arguments today.

Tillamook Voters To Decide on Bonds

Tillamook - UPB - Tillamook county voters go to the polls Friday to decide on a bond issue that would purchase Pacific Power and Light facilities for the county People's Utility District.

Price of the local facilities has been set at slightly more than \$4 million.

The issue has been controversial in the coastal area, but both organizations agreed they can not continue duplicating power lines.

Don R. McClung, president of PP&L, said "the present situation is harmful to both utilities and customers alike."

Radar Developer Dies in London

London - UPB - Sir Arthur Fleming P. M. Fleming, 80, who made radar possible through his development of electronic techniques, died Wednesday.

A pioneer in the development of submarine-detection equipment, he played a leading role in perfecting methods for manufacturing component parts of radar. He worked with the Westinghouse Electric Company in Pittsburgh from 1900 to 1902.

Wall Street Chatter

New York - UPB - Alan C. Poole of Hemphill, Noyes & Co. says that his technical studies appear no more favorable than the fundamentals and he concludes that the 600 level in the Dow-Jones Industrials will be penetrated before the end of the year and possibly sooner.

He believes there are enough chartists and Dow theorists still around Wall Street so that such a penetration could create a considerable wave of selling.

Obviously sound, long term investments may be held, he says, but the time has come when portfolio holdings should be carefully reviewed to eliminate speculations and emphasis placed on good, sound values.

Moody's Service says to switch out of American Motors because 1961 earnings, they believe, are likely to dip below 1960 results. It also advises sale of Granite City Steel, which seems "fully priced."
