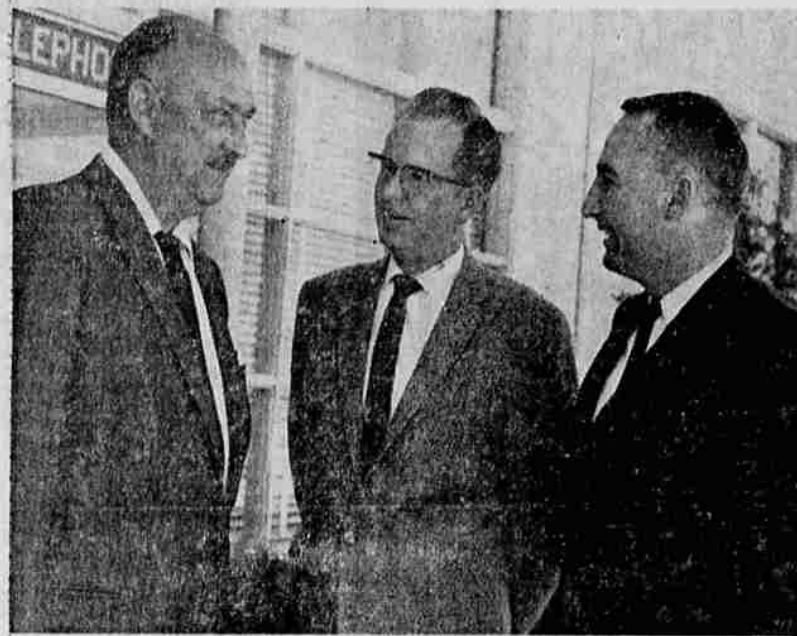

Kennedy Declares Republicans Saying 'No' To Next Decade

Jersey City, N. J. — Sen. John F. Kennedy, appearing before more than 6,000 wildly cheering Hudson county, N.J., Democrats, lashed at the Republicans today as "a party which says 'no' to the next decade."

The presidential candidate told a breakfast rally at the armory in this Democratic stronghold that his party says "yes" to the nation's need for housing, education, adequate income and secure defenses.

He said that so long as there is need for action on those fronts, "there is need for the Democratic Party."

"And there is need for the Democratic Party today," he said.

Aided by Jersey City police, Kennedy had to struggle through a crush of admirers when he entered the vast armory and walked to the platform.

Kennedy highlighted his Manhattan appearance Wednesday night by proudly reciting his own "liberalism" credo and accusing Vice President Richard M. Nixon of "fighting a rear guard action against the 20th Century."

The Democratic nominee appeared again to be hitting at Nixon, his Republican rival, by sounding a foreign policy theme in a speech prepared for delivery at Bergen

Mail in heavily Republican Bergen county, N. J. Nixon has hailed the administration's program as evidence that only the GOP can guarantee peace.

"Four years ago the cold war was being carried on thousands of miles away," Kennedy said.

"This year it spread to within 90 miles of Florida, to Cuba. And next week when Mr. Khrushchev and Mr. Castro arrive in New York they will bring the cold war to within 12 miles of the Bergen Mall."

"And yet the administration has told us that all is well," Kennedy declared.

The nominee said that "in the 1930s while England slept, Hitler armed."

"Today, while we stand still, Khrushchev moves," he asserted.

To "reverse direction" and "move ahead" he said America must:

— "Set our own house in order" through assurance of full civil rights, full employment, improved education, medical care for the aged, and liberalized immigration.

— Rebuild the nation's defenses because "it is not a question of quarrelling with Mr. Khrushchev (another indirect reference to Nixon) it is a question of making ourselves stronger than Russia," Kennedy added: "Talk is cheap."

— Help "the rising peoples in the underdeveloped regions of the world to find their way to free self-government."

— "Seize the initiative in the cold war with bold imaginative programs launched with good will and launched from strength."

Court Decision Saves Convicted Man From Death

Salem — Harry William Braley, convicted of a Portland murder two years ago, was saved from death in the gas chamber by the Oregon Supreme Court Wednesday.

The court overturned Braley's first degree murder conviction and ordered a judgment of second degree murder.

The 38-year-old cook was sentenced Sept. 9, 1958 for the knife death of Judith Violet Knutsen in a Portland apartment May 19, 1958. He has been on the Oregon penitentiary's death row for two years.

Braley's appeal was automatic.

McAllister Dissents
The opinion was by Justice Keith O'Connell, with dissenting opinions by Chief Justice William McAllister and Justice George Rossman.

Multnomah County Circuit Judge Alfred P. Dobson was affirmed except for modification to second degree.

Braley claimed he had not intended to kill the Knutsen woman, and said he was drunk at the time.

O'Connell wrote that the "most serious defect" in his trial was the trial court's failure to instruct the jury with respect to the legal significance of intoxication in adjudging the defendant's intent at the time he killed the deceased.

Had Fair Trial
At the same time the high court said it felt Braley had a fair trial and evidence did not warrant a new one.

He will be returned to Multnomah county for resentencing.

In another case the court denied a petition for review of the dismissal of Robert K. Wampler from the state police force.

Wampler, a former private, was fired in October, 1958, by a state police trial board on charges of insubordination. Wampler requested a review in Clackamas County Circuit Court but the Supreme court in an opinion by Justice Harold Warner said that court had no jurisdiction to hear the matter.

Circuit Judge P. K. Hammond was affirmed.

Leonard Receives Plaque for Service

Morris B. Leonard Sr., county chairman for the U.S. Savings Bond program, received a plaque this week at the Rotary luncheon for his 12 years of leadership.

The plaque was presented by T. S. Prideox, vice president of the United States National Bank of Portland and chairman of the state savings bond program.

Prideox is in the valley speaking before various civic and service organizations.

Japanese Fish Experts To Visit

Portland — Six top Japanese fisheries experts will arrive here tonight for an eight-day tour of Oregon fisheries installations.

They will also have conferences with federal and state fish officials.

The Japanese are seeking knowledge in the fields of conservation and propagation of fish with special interest in salmon and trout.

The group has also expressed interest in legislation, both state and federal, to conserve the fish resources of their homeland.

During their stay in Oregon, the Japanese will visit fish hatcheries and fishways along the Columbia river.

Leader of the group is Koichiro Kobayashi of Tokyo, president of the Japan Salmon Resource Conservation Association.

Grain Unloading Short of Year Ago

Salem — Close to nine million bushels of grain were unloaded at Portland in August, the Oregon Department of Agriculture said today.

This was five million bushels more than in July but four million bushels less than a year ago.

Wheat accounted for 7.4 million bushels of the grain receipts last month.

Export grain loadings slowed to nine cargoes, down about half from August, 1959.
